**OBSERVATIONS ON OREGON**  
A Former Iowa Newspaper Man Discusses His New Home.

From the Des Moines Register.

The city and state at large are trying to sober up financially, to rub out the old burdened past and take a new start in the race of life. In boom days, some years back, prices went up kicking, inflation and speculation were fashionable, especially in real estate, and there was extravagance in nearly all public affairs. Men with supposed fortunes in hand indulged in every luxury and lived like princes. Nothing was too good or too expensive, and public business was conducted on the same liberal scale. Costly improvements were made by towns and cities, public debts were piled up and whole communities went dashing ahead as if there never could come a day of reckoning and settlement. But the day came, notwithstanding, and it has been hard sledding to get back to led rock, but that necessity is upon us.

Oregon has about 400,000 inhabitants, and Portland has a fourth of them. This city is largely the state, but its business has been badly and extravagantly managed. Its debt is in the vicinity of \$8,000,000, drawing 5 and 6 per cent., and taxes have not been collected promptly, many of them being delinquent for ten years or more. Men bought real estate in flush times on speculation and when the crash came and sales could not be made, they stood the collectors off, year by year, hoping that something would happen to rescue them from their peril. But they have waited in vain. Of course this state of affairs could not continue and a decided effort has been made, the past year, to clear up the record. Tax collecting began in earnest for back years, and the assessor's valuation for 1899 was greatly reduced. The valuation was \$31,559,771 at \$11,210,693 below that of 1898. The heaviest reduction was \$9,139,526 in town lots, and \$2,214,307 on improvements on lots, and on household furniture from \$910,000 in 1898 to \$465,310 for 1899, a cut of nearly one-half. Getting sober is not pleasant, but it is profitable and necessary. It will take years to clear up the record, but in spite of this handicap I believe there is a grand future before this Northwest country, and the disabilities and burdens of old and involved citizens will give additional opportunities to immigrants who come here with means in their hands and foresight enough to keep out of debt. It is not a pleasant thought that one man's loss is another's gain, but such seems to be the way of the world, and I am not philosophizing, but trying to state facts for the information of your readers who may be interested in this part of the Pacific coast.

A large per cent of the property of this city and state has been and is yet under mortgage. It came about as I have described above, but up through the Willamette valley, the first generally settled portion of the state, other causes must be sought. The early settlers from the Mississippi valley were generally men of force and energy. They worked hard and made comfortable homes. It turned out, however, that the climate here enabled them to live with half the effort required in Illinois or Missouri and this spoiled the next generation. They grew up in comparative idleness and when the old folks died and the children got hold of the property, when they wanted money, they mortgaged it. As an old settler said to me a few days ago, "They just turn the calves to the cows and go down to the coast fishing and hunting." The consequence is that many neglected or poorly conducted farms are for sale at reasonable figures, and in the hands of experienced farmers who are used to work would certainly prove to be profitable investments.

Only about one-quarter of the area of the state can be turned to agricultural account, but these available areas produce good crops of all kinds—grain except corn. They told me down at Ashland, the southern border of the state, last summer, that as much as fifty bushels of corn had been raised to the acre in that vicinity, but what I saw growing did not seem to promise more than ten or fifteen bushels. It looked puny and stunted that I sighed for the cornfields of Iowa, with two large ears and a nubbin to each stalk. But it would not be fair to have all the good things in one place, not even to accommodate Anglo-Saxons who spread the "higher civilization."

To show something of the grains that are sutured here at Portland, from over the state, and to illustrate production for shipment to foreign lands, I present some facts. During the week ending January 20, 1899, eight vessels left this port for ports in England, Germany and France, with cargoes made up of 776,317 bushels of wheat and 129,540 bushels of barley, altogether nearly

900,000 bushels valued at a half million dollars. With the Nicaragua canal completed, the grain business of this port and state would be quickly doubled at least, and trade with China and Japan greatly increased. While Portland is 100 miles up the Columbia river from its mouth there is plenty of water all the way down. Only ten days ago a vessel left this port whose length was nearly 400 feet and she was drawing 24 feet, with 600 tons of freight on board. The people here have not learned how to work the government at Washington for river and harbor appropriations, as they do in the east and south, but they are catching on and will be heard from in this respect. The intention is to deepen the grand old Columbia from here to Astoria to a channel depth of at least thirty feet. Levi W. Myers.

**SOME TEXAS LYNCHING**

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Feb. 13.—A Times special from Port Arthur, Tex., says: "James Sweeney (white) was lynched at 1 o'clock this morning. Sweeney was a cotton screwman foreman, and had killed Charles Crumbac, a fellow-laborer, by jamming a bayonet through his neck. The crime was committed on the afternoon of February 1, in a room with no witnesses present, and is said to have resulted from a saloon fight that took place a few hours previous. Monday Sweeney was indicted for murder, in the first degree.

He was placed on trial at Beaumont, Tex., Friday, and last night the jury returned a verdict of not guilty. As soon as he was released, Sweeney returned to Port Arthur, arriving here at 12:30 this morning.

Word had been telegraphed ahead that he was coming, and a mob met him at the depot, marched him up town and strung him up to a telephone pole with out ceremony. In the first attempt the rope broke. The second attempt was made successful by tying Sweeney's legs so his feet could not touch ground and drawing up the rope taut. Their work accomplished, the mob, which was made up of Port Arthur citizens, dispersed quietly.
