KING L. HIBBARD AUCTIONEER ORDINANCE

Dies Tuesday Afternoon After a Long Illness.
Was a Pioneer of '47, and Man of High Standing in the Community.

King L. Hibbard passed away at 3 o'clock on the afternoon of Tuesday, Feb. 20, aged 62 years. Death occurred at the Salem hospital where he had undergone an operation about two weeks ago, for the relief of kidney and bladder troubles from which he had been suffering for several years.

King L. Hibbard was born near Pekin, Tazewell county, Illinois, November 18, 1837. In 1847 he crossed the plains with his parents and settled the same year in Marion county on the farm in the Walden hills where he has since lived and raised a family.

In December 1859, he was married to Julia A. Griffith, who with three sons and three daughters survive him, an other son, Corporal Hal G. Hibbard, having laid down his life while serving with the Second Oregon in the Philippines.

King Hibbard was a man of sterling integrity and was universally respected. He was for many years quite prominent in county politics, and was a man of independent opinion and sincere convictions. He served one term as county assessor, 1876.

He was a member of the Willard Congregational church.

About three years ago his health began to fail, and he gave up active farming. He moved into this city, and sought to regain his health, but without avail. In January he went to San Francisco, but continued to grow worse and returned three weeks later.

Besides the widow, the children who survive are: O. S. Hibbard, of Sumner; Dr. L. E. Hibbard, of Burns; Claude Hibbard, of Salem; Helen Hibbard, of LaGrande; Gertrude Hibbard, of Portland; and Josephine Hibbard, of Salem. The deceased also leaves one sister and three brothers, viz: Mrs. E. I. Knowles, of Silverton; T. B. Hibbard, of Silverton; Geo. D. Hibbard and Dr. Charles W. Hibbard, both of San Francisco.

Funeral services were conducted by Rev. W. C. Kantner at the First Congregational church, in this city, at 3 o'clock this afternoon. The funeral was largely attended.

About 8 o'clock Thursday morning the funeral cortege will leave Salem and proceed to the Warren cemetery, nine miles from town, where interment will take place by the side of his son, Hal. A short service will be conducted at the grave by Rev. Kantner.

A grand masquerade ball will be given at the new Masonic hall by the Jefferson lodge, February 22. A general invitation is extended to all.

The Jefferson boys have organized a band and they made their first appearance on the street Monday. The band consists of sixteen pieces and are under the leadership of Prof. Art Shoemaker. The boys appeared in full uniform and for the short time organized they are doing well.

Phillip Kattoff was arrested in Jefferson yesterday upon a warrant issued out of the justice court of Albany, charging him with disturbing a religious meeting in Lion county, near Jefferson, Sunday. The young man was taken to Albany, where he will have a hearing today. Kattoff has always been considered a good boy and his friends are sorry to learn that he has got himself into trouble.

Grand Master Hobson, of the Masonic Lodge, gave a very interesting lecture here Monday night, and a large audience was in attendance. A beautiful luncheon was served and those present report a very enjoyable time.

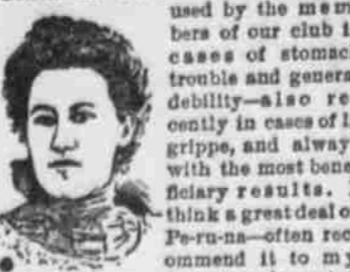
