KING L. HIBBARD'S FUNERAL.

Impressive Services Largely Attended.—Interment at Warren Cemetery.

The funeral services of King L. Hibbard, at the First Congregational church Wednesday afternoon were largely attended and were very appropriate and impressive.

Rev. W. C. Kantner, pastor of that church officiated, assisted by a quartette consisting of Mrs. H. B. Holland, Mrs. H. S. Gile, Walter Jenks and H. S. Gile. The last named gentleman sang a solo, "Abide With Me," and Miss Lillian Roblin also sang a solo.

The pall-bearers were H. G. Guild, Dr. J. C. Griffith, L. H. McMahon and Dr. L. E. Griffith.

Dr. Kantner's address was brief but very appropriate, and showed a discriminating appreciation of the character of the deceased pioneer. Among other things, he said:

"Mr. Hibbard has been one of the state builders, a man who has always led an active life, energetic, earnest, purposeful. Concerned for the material prosperity of Oregon, he was also always interested in the civil and social welfare of the country and state. He was not to be numbered with those who are galled to accept and profit by the service others may render, and then go their way forgetful of their duty to the state and nation. He was not at all fitted to be a mere cipher in the body politic. At the cost of personal sacrifice Mr. Hibbard manifested an interest in the high welfare of our country and his own state."

"He was a man of convictions, and those convictions he followed wherever they led him. Ridicule, persecution, social ostracism nor anything else would be able to swerve a man of his strong feelings from strictest fidelity to his conscientious convictions of what he believed to be right, politically, socially and morally. Sometimes these convictions led him away from those of his best friends and most intimate associates but such was the integrity of the man, that those who differed with him, nevertheless honored and respected his unquestioned honesty and nobleness of purpose and character. Mr. Hibbard was everywhere and at all times a man, and as a man he endeavored to be an expression of his convictions. Men could always know and that quite readily, where he stood."

The speaker referred in the highest terms to the Christian character of the deceased, and drew conclusions of the brightest hope for the future of such a character.

Shortly after eight o'clock this morning the funeral procession started from the residence in New Park on its way to the Warren cemetery, where the remains were interred with a brief ceremony conducted by Rev. Mr. Kantner.

In spite of the threatening weather, many friends went from this city, and at the cemetery the people of that neighborhood were gathered to pay the last sad respects to a man who was universally esteemed and respected.
