DUTY OF REPUBLICANS

This is a Republican city and Salem is a Republican city. Republicans and taxpayers who want relief from high taxes must go to the common people for relief. They can get no relief from the Republican machine or from any machine. In the final running up and analysis the machine of any party is the same. The machine is non-partisan, but it uses loyalty to party as the cloak to ensure its personal graft. The court house or city hall or state house graft is loyal to party principles only to get his graft started. If he can't start his graft he loses all interest, and many of these grafting patriots, who are loud-mouthed partisans about this time of the year are prepared to move to other parts of the nation the moment a convention turns them down. If the Republicans could get it through their heads that the real friends of good government are citizens who earn an honest living and have a substantial interest in the community in the way of property, business, families and homes to protect, and who are virtually stockholders in the community and share in its liabilities, they would put up for office a more substantial sort of men. Last time the whole Republican ticket did not represent over about 15 cents a piece as taxpayers. The affairs of Marion county have been too much in the hands of men who paid no taxes and had nothing to lose from extravagance at the public crib. The middle class of population, who own homes and cars as honest living by furnishing some real service to their neighbors, ought to be more considered in making nominations for office by the dominant party in this county. Between the open-mouthed grafter and the hoodler the taxpayer has been kept between the devil and the deep sea.

THREE REFORM ITEMS

At the national convention of the Socialist Labor party at Rochester, N. Y., it was voted to take steps to consolidate that party with the Social Democratic party and a committee of nine appointed for that purpose.

Editor Hofer of the Salem Journal has returned after a six weeks absence in Chicago. If he had stayed away six weeks longer the Journal would have got quite a reputation as a reform paper.

The Porter Divorce

From the Corvallis Times.

Saturday last a decision was announced by Judge Boies, of Marion county, which gave to Mark Porter and wife a legal separation. Proceedings in this case have not received the publicity which the standing of the parties would ordinarily warrant, and the circumstances which led to the hearing having been heard in Marion county is not known to the Times. In truth the paper has not exerted itself to ascertain and publish minute particulars on account of its respect for the private affairs of those people, who are pioneers and highly esteemed. While Mr. Porter appears as the plaintiff, it is understood that the proceedings were instituted by mutual consent and that a partition of the large property has been arranged. This phase of the case, however, does not appear of record. Mr. and Mrs. Porter's estranged relationship has been generally known for years, and while the affairs of each regret it, there is some measure of relief to all in the legal separation.

It will be some weeks yet before the actual work of putting in Walla Walla's new sewer system will begin, and the Union advises laborers not to go there until the work is ready for them.

FROM THE BIG WINDY CITY.

The great event of this year will always be the turning of Lake Michigan into the Chicago river, and starting the current of that maddest stream toward the Gulf of Mexico. In the early Seventies, when as a young man I carried a chain on the survey of the Milwaukee & St. Paul railroad, between the Crenshaw City and the Garden City, as those big towns were then called it was a great puzzle to the engineers to determine which way the water courses north of Chicago emptied themselves. It was a wet spring, and the whole country seemed to be under from six inches to six feet of water, and as we approached Chicago the amphibious character of the country seemed to increase.

Now the drainage canal, built at a cost of over thirty millions, has solved the problem, and the river, within two days after the locks down in Central Illinois were opened, poured along a clear greenish stream—what seems clear to them—still not what we would call clear water by a long shot out West. The current is quite marked and the little tufts that puff and snort up the river with a string of barges or schooners, will take considerable longer time to go through the bridges. It was told in the papers that perch were caught in the river a few days after it was opened to the health-giving floods from Lake Michigan. It will be a great sanitary improvement and will open water navigation through to the gulf. But it will not drain the awful cesspools of filth that are still emptied into the lake from 10 to 20 miles of city water front and the city is now building a new sewer system to carry all the sewage east to the canal. The city water is still taken from the cribs out in the lake, and is more or less contaminated from the filth of the city. It seems that we cannot enjoy pure air, pure water, pure religion or pure politics in this world without an effort to get it.

Padewski, Bryan and some kind of a German Ambassador were in the city. The ladies as usual went crazy in a mild and effervescent manner over the first. The politicians went wild over the second and he spoke at a Jackson banquet with other notables. The feud between the Harrison and the Albigel democracy became so keen that Mayor Harrison would not attend the banquet. The German Ambassador met the society people and at Chicago University he was lionized, and pretty things about the American women, and got off a lot of stuff about the universities in both countries providing the respective nations unlimited brain supplies to run the whole world with. I did not meet any of these notables because in every case a ticket was required and the crush of tourists is already too great in a Democratic country. The people have lost no interest in Bryan. They realize that he is outspoken and unequivocal on all the great questions, and right or wrong you can always tell where he stands. This is what the politicians in the Democratic party do not like and if they cannot defeat him at the convention they will sell him out afterwards. Back of all this is a feeling that a more conservative candidate would come nearer being elected, and that having endorsed the ratification of the treaty with Spain by which we acquired rights in the Philippines it would be wrong to throw them away. I only state those views in a general way, from conversations had with people of all kinds and shades of political opinions.

He is without a doubt the greatest musical director in the world and Chicago people who are his backers put up a large bonus to keep his services. I was present at the first appearance of Leonora Jackson, the Chicago girl who was sent abroad to be educated as a violinist with the best masters of Europe. She has played before the crowded house, as they call them, and is undoubtedly the greatest player for her age in the world. Her welcome on her home-coming was something tremendous and I imagined it rattled her a little. She is a slender American girl without any stage affectations. She wore a plain gray dress, no jewelry and a plain head dress. The orchestra played an introductory and at the right moment she struck in on one of the most difficult compositions of classical music. She had planted her feet nearly three feet apart, braced her body as if to resist an avalanche and then she tore off great strings and sheets of music and at every moment you felt that Miss Jackson, M. UNJUST BRITISH MINING LAWS.

American miners have a just and deep grievance at the Canadian government for the restrictions, taxes and general oppressiveness of the laws enforced upon them.

"Each new law from Ottawa," says our correspondent, "makes the lot of the prospector and mine owner more arduous." When it is remembered that these laws have from the first been much more stringent and oppressive against Americans, the "Outlanders" of the Klondike, than those against the subjects of Great Britain revolted in the Transvaal as unjust, discriminating and intolerable, another reason for the proposed rush from Dawson to Nome in the spring will be apparent. Either the action of a prominent business man of Dawson that "unless the Dominion government make better and more equitable laws for the government of the miners, the only and the last will be making nests in the business houses after the rush to Nome is over," will be verified, or the American "Outlanders" will take a stand for their rights in emulation of the British "Outlanders" who resented the "get off the earth" attitude of the Transvaal authorities toward them.

That there has not been a serious clash between American miners and petty officials of the Canadian government on the basis of the simple equity that demands everywhere a right to live and to work in an orderly, self-respecting way, is due to the ingrained respect for law that underlies the American character, in mass. Those outrageously oppressive laws should be the subject of special inquiry at Washington, with a view to the protection of American miners in the far north in their property and personal rights. The insolent attitude of the Canadian government, as exemplified in its treatment of American citizens in the Klondike, should have been resisted by our government from the first, instead of which the abuses have been allowed to grow from month to month, unchecked and unchecked.
