



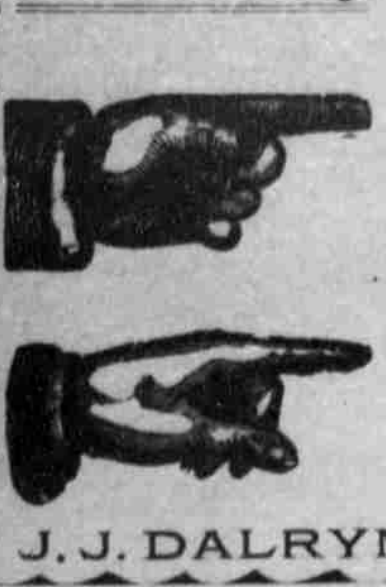

CREAMERIES FOR SALEM

Portland Man Will Start One; Farmers Talk of Another.

Oregon Begins to See the Great Opportunities in Dairying—Many Creameries Projected.

T. S. Townsend, who will soon establish a creamery in this city, came up from Portland Tuesday, to confer with farmers relative to the operation of his creamery plant in this city. In view of Mr. Townsend's visit farmers, in this community turned out to meet him and report to Secretary Thielens, of the Salem Chamber of Commerce, the amount of cream they will be able to supply the plant when it shall be established here.

C. M. Elspass, of Washougal, Wash., agent for the Moody-Sharpley system of improved creamery machinery, is in the city. He has been interviewing farmers concerning the creamery proposition, with the view of introducing his machinery as an economical and labor-saving device.

PRO-BOER MEETING

Salem Citizens Who Sympathize With the South African Republics.

Preliminary Meeting Called at the City Police Court for Saturday Evening at 7:30.

A number of citizens of Salem, in private as well as public life, have received invitations to assist the pro-Boer organizations of New York and Philadelphia in their labors of charity and encouragement to the South African Republic in their war for independence. It has been thought best to give everyone who sympathizes with the Dutch Republics of South Africa an opportunity to join in the efforts and following subscription paper has been quite generally signed:

"The undersigned sympathizers with the struggling South African Republics hereby call a public meeting to form an organization for the purpose of extending all proper encouragement to them in their efforts to establish their complete independence."

Kerr, Erasmus F. Tucker, S. T. Northcutt, P. F. Minnemyer, F. Van der Bann, J. H. Elgin, John Heidecker, Robert Baey and others.

By the courtesy of City Recorder Judah the police court room at the city hall will be thrown open Saturday evening at 7:30 p. m. for the purpose of holding a preliminary meeting.

AN OFFICIAL LETTER
has been received by Governor Geer, from the National Boer Relief Fund Association, asking him to permit the use of his name as a member of the Association, the object of which is to raise funds for the benefit of the widows and orphans of Boers, who may lose their lives in the present South African war. The object is considered a worthy one by many people, irrespective of where their sympathies are in the war.

THE JOURNAL is also in receipt of a letter from Geo. W. Van Sicler, American treasurer of the fund for the widows and orphans of the Boers, at New York, enclosing a copy of an official note from D. Hendrik Muller, Envoy Extraordinary of the Orange Free State at the Hague, in reply to the statement circulated in England, that the Free States were abandoning the Transvaal. Here is his reply in part:

"On the contrary! The Jameson raid had already brought the two republics together as it had shown the designs of the present British administration as regards the independence of the two South African Republics. And now this war is making one nation of the two states and brothers of their burghers, who before were treating each other as enemies."

The policy of the present British administration has exasperated my people, the most peaceful in the world. There war and it is no choice; my people have to fight or to die. For our independence is dearer to us than our life."

How could we separate from our Transvaal brothers now that all told, men, women and children; both states together have not more souls than a small British town, who now have been forced to war by the largest empire the world has ever seen?

We could not separate and we do not want to. God would not continue his visible protection of our just cause. The Transvaal people are our brothers and kinsmen, not only figuratively speaking but also in reality. And we have availed ourselves of the experience of the last months and put right whatever was not in perfect shape in the beginning of the war."

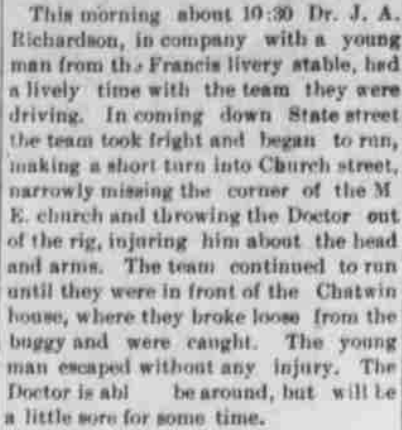
