**British Garrison is Relieved**

which at the best had been intermittent during the last three days.

A heavy rain has caused great discomfort to the British, but greater to the Boers, and cold winds have killed many sick animals. Last night the river rose and brought down a great number of dead Boer horses. When the history of Lord Roberts' movement is written it will be found that the marching power and magnificent endurance of the British soldier is as great as ever. The march itself as seen on the map would be nothing very marvelous, but it must be remembered that the whole original plan of march was changed when General Cronje made his magnificent night trek on the 15th. The whole army swung to the left in hot pursuit.

Some of the regiments marched 27 miles in 24 hours, outstripping the transport supplies and living for days on almost quarter rations. Yet the fatigue and incessant hardship were borne with wonderful cheerfulness. There has been a drenching rain for the last three days, the men lying fully exposed to the rain and the subsequent cold winds, all of which proved their admirable pluck and endurance.

Every day, owing to the enormous extent of the British lines, news is brought of some little action which had passed unnoticed in the excitement of General Cronje's investment. Last Monday night a brilliant piece of work was performed by the Gloucesters. During the afternoon they approached a kopje containing a body of Boers. They waited till nightfall, when 120 men charged the kopje with the bayonet and drove off the enemy with loss, bayoneting several of them. The positions taken, however, were evacuated during the night.

Last night the rattle of musketry showed that the Boers had discovered our nightly rush forward in the river bed, which they have been unable to stop. Yesterday they were shelled intermittently. The Boers possess two Vicker-Maxim guns, two 15-pounders, and are supposed to possess a big gun, all of which appear to be sedulously hidden. The war balloon is doing good work.

**Boer Returns From Ladysmith.**

London, March 1.—Boer returns from Ladysmith. He adds that the whole country south of that place is cleared of Boers.

**Buller's Official Report.**

London, March 1.—Following is the text of Buller's dispatch:

"Methuene—I have just returned from Ladysmith. Except a small guard north of surprise hill, the whole enemy that lately besieged the town have retired in hot haste and to the south the country is quite clear of them.

The garrison was on half a pound of meal per man per day and supplementing the meal with rations of horses and mules. The men will want a little nursing before being fit for the field."

**RAINY SEASON SETS IN.**

London, March 1.—A Dispatch to the Daily Mail from Pieter's Station, dated February 29, and describing the 12 days' continuous fighting of which the attack upon Railway Hill by the Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers was one of the supreme moments says:

Public schools where the common branches are well taught and a model city government would make Salem famous and prosperous. The San Francisco Chronicle of Feb. 25th says:

Salem, Ore., recently refunded its bonded indebtedness by the issuance of a 4 per cent call bonds payable on or before ten years from the date of issue. The new bonds range in denomination from \$50 to \$500 and the interest is payable in Salem. The issue was subscribed for four times over and a preference was given to the smallest subscriptions. It is believed to be the first time such an experiment has been attempted anywhere in the country with a municipal indebtedness, and future bond issues of the city are likely to take the same course, which means that Salem's debt will soon be distributed among its own citizens exclusively.

An exchange says: If our imperialistic friends would look around home for room to expand, they would find something within the United States on which to expend their energies. Government surveyors agree that there are 71,000,000 acres of public land which could be reclaimed and made highly productive by irrigation. This land would, when brought under cultivation, be reasonably worth \$10 an acre or \$710,000,000. This land would furnish homes for 700,000 families or perhaps 3,500,000 more people.
