Who Was a Contemporary of Abe Lincoln and Col. Ed Baker of Oregon

He Was in Salem a Few Years Ago With
Vice-President Stevenson—Lectures
at Salem Thursday Evening.

Judge Wm. G. Ewing is what the
British would call one of those "bloom-
in' Yankees" with a smooth shrewd
physiognomy, a fine forehead and fea-
tures that remind one of "Pap" Waite
and Abraham Lincoln, both pretty good
Americans of sacred memory. He ar-
rived in the city this morning and is the
guest of Christian Science friends, for
whom he is billed to lecture at Reed's
opera house Thursday evening this week.

He was called on by a number of
newspaper men and chatted freely
about his present trip. He was on the
coast in 1893 as one of Vice-President
Stevenson's party and passed through
Salem early one morning. His oldest
brother was for thirty years a law part-
ner of the late Vice-President and was
appointed Minister to Brussels.

"Our family resided in Bloomington
and I lived there until I was a young
man when I removed to Chicago," said
Judge Ewing, "where I have lived ever
since. My father was a lawyer and our
home was a kind of headquarters for all
the lawyers when Abraham Lincoln was
practicing. Lincoln made his home at
our house and I knew him intimately
from the time I was a boy until he was
elected president. My father was a
"locofoco" in politics and Lincoln always
said he would make a whip of one of his
boys. So for a starter he gave me the
nickname of "Whig" and it stuck to me
a great many years. I knew Col. Ed
Baker of Springfield, afterwards U. S.
Senator from Oregon, as well as I knew
my father. The man who became
U. S. Senator Jas. McDougal of Califor-
nia."

One has to look at Judge Ewing twice
to realize that he was a contemporary of
a generation that is past and gone. His
bright eye and fresh complexion would
indicate a man of about fifty, as mortals
count time and as notes run at the bank.

Asked how Christian Scientists "treat-
ed" such a matter as the South African
War, he said they had nothing to do
with it except to hope that it would
soon stop. Asked how he reconciled
Christian Science with politics, he said
the question was how to reconcile poli-
tics with any religious belief. Asked as
to what practical advantage Christian
Science claimed over any of the other
many Christian forms of belief, he said—

"I claim great practical advantages
flow to any individual, and especially to
the head of a family. Every Christian
Scientist may be assured of constant
health and every one may be his own
physician and be free from the loss of
time and interruption of business
caused by illness, to say nothing of the
actual cash expenses that are heaped
upon a family, which in the case of a
laboring man sometimes results in the
loss of employment and loss of home. I
was healed about fifteen years ago. My
wife was an active scientist before I was.
Before we investigated Science medical
and drug bills were one-third of the cost
of our living. Since then our expense
in that line has not been fifteen cents in
fifteen years.

The Judge had a great many callers
today, among them a number of the pro-
fessional men of the city. Attorney
Chas. A. Park found him to be his old
law professor at Michigan University,
where he was the one teacher all the
boys liked. He has been busy most of
the day with a stenographer clearing up
correspondence, which is very large, as he
is one of the national board of lecturers.

CITY COUNCIL

Wades Through Routine Business—
Needs of the Fire Department.

At the regular meeting of the city
council Tuesday evening, all the abler-
men were present. In the absence of
Mayor Bishop, Recorder Judah pre-
sided.

The committee on ordinances was
granted more time in which to report on
the three ordinances in the hands of the
committee.

Committee on streets and public
property reported adversely on the
proposition to put dustbins on the floor
of the police court room; also in regard
to leasing certain land to H. S. Gile,
that the council has no right to do so.
A request from the state for the priv-
ilege of putting in a crosswalk across
Court street, at the northeast corner of
the state property was acted upon
favorably.

Liquor licenses were ordered issued to
F. Lallbranch, Geo. Neal and S. C.
Singletary.

recommended the employment of W.
H. Sellwood as hoseman in place of A.
T. Kruse, resigned.
Chief Duncan asked for 800 feet of
Maltese cross rubber hose; also reported
that the fire department team is getting
the worse for wear; also that the Sibley
engine needs a new boiler. Referred to
committee on fire and water.

A motion of Alderman Griswold that
the chief of the fire department be
sworn in as a special policeman without
pay, was adopted.

A motion was adopted that of the
\$10,000 insurance to be placed on the
city hall and contents, 10 per cent be
placed on the contents and 90 per cent
on the building.

The recorder was instructed to allow
certain credits to Jefferson Myers upon
amount due on street improvements.

The matter of putting in the hydrant
some time ago granted to the Salem
Woolen Mill was referred to the com-
mittee on streets and public property.

The recorder announced the mayor's
appointment of a committee on revision
of ordinances, as follows: Aldermen
Walker, Burrows and Allen.

Certain suggestions from Mrs. Van-
dervoort, president of the W. C. T. U.,
communicated to the council by Rec-
order Judah, relating to curfew ordinances
were referred to the committee on health
and police.

on hand he had since deposited with the
city treasurer \$800.

'HOPS ARE MOLDING
But Proper Treatment Will Yet Reduce
the Loss to a Minimum.

The Oregon Hop Growers Association
are occupying the new double office,
though the second room is not yet
fully furnished.

The officers report that the association
is flourishing and that the growers gen-
erally recognize the fact that the O. H. G. A.
is all that now stands between them and the
collapse of the hop market here. Were the
association not in existence, the mold that is
making its appearance on the baled hops would
undoubtedly prove the last straw, and the
grower would be absolutely helpless.

No one needs to be told how dealers
and buyers would take advantage of
such an excellent excuse for beating the
price down to nothing were growers, as
usual, at their mercy. But the association
is in a position to still get for the
hops all that they are actually worth.

It is an undeniable fact the blue mold
has done and is still doing a great deal
of damage to hops not stored in properly
constructed warehouses. Owners of
hops are strongly urged to attend to
them with the utmost vigilance, and to
get them into dry warehouses if not
already there.

Where the bales are already affected
the burlap should be removed and the
outside of the bale scaled off to the
depth that the mold has penetrated.
The bales should then be dried thor-
oughly and the burlaps replaced, after
being also dried to kill the fungi.

Energetic action will reduce the dam-
age to a minimum and certainly the
Oregon hop growers can not afford to
lose more than is absolutely unavoidable
this year.

Secretary Bonis says that the clean-
ing process need not be expensive; that
responsible parties have offered to treat
the association hops at 20 cents per
bale.
