DEBT CREATING AMENDMENT

Amendments to the Oregon constitution to be voted upon at the coming election is one to legalize about a million dollars of county and city warrants, and school and bridge and sewer warrants, all issued in violation and excess of the following wise provision of the present constitution:

"No county shall create any debt or liabilities which shall singly or in the aggregate exceed the sum of \$5000, except to suppress insurrection or repel invasion; but the debts of any county at the time this constitution takes effect shall be disregarded in estimating the sum to which such county is limited."

That is the old limit on running in debt, and while it has been violated with impunity, it has probably been the means of preventing an accumulation of millions of dollars of bonded debt.

Following is the amendment to be voted on as a substitute:

"No county, city, town, school district, or other municipal corporation shall be allowed to become indebted in any manner for any purpose to an amount, including present existing indebtedness, in the aggregate, exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property therein, to be ascertained by the last assessment for the state and county taxes previous to the incurring of such indebtedness."

As we sense it, this new provision would wipe out all the past illegality and make all the present excessive and illegally contracted debts binding and collectable in a common justice court and prepare the way to run gratis in excess of the new limit. It will be setting a bad example by the people themselves of sanctioning by their vote the unconstitutional excesses of officials sworn to obey the constitution. Everywhere the influence of the taxpayer is exerted to throw off all limits on debt creation and create more debt and new debt and saddle the people with interest bills for future generations to pay. As a business proposition this amendment should be defeated.

A DEAR BOUGHT VICTORY.

One must regard the publication of British floggers over Cronje's surrender, with a sentiment not far removed from pity. In London there was continual cheering before the war office, and as the British army 40,000 strong, and with 100 guns, had, after fighting ten days and losing 1,500 men, surrounded and captured 4,000 Boers with a gun of inferior size! It was a victory, to be sure. But is British prowess so low a grade that British floggers must go into transports of enthusiasm over such a victory?

Those who respect the British people, as we sincerely do, have a higher opinion than that of British prowess. A modest arithmetical calculation might have a sobering effect. It takes 40,000 British troops under the best proved British

general 10 days to win a splendid victory over 4,000 untutored Boers, how many British troops will it take, and how long, to win a splendid victory over the entrenched Boer armies of 70,000 men or more? The importance of the victory over Cronje is belittled, along with the dignity of the British nation, by Englishmen who insist upon regarding this triumph of overwhelming numbers as a prodigy of British strategy and valor. It is inconceivable that so much could be made of it, if the preceding British defeats had not stung British pride to the quick, and made any kind of reversal of the fortunes of war thrice welcome.
