AS TO ROAD SUPERVISORS.

How They May Be Nominated to Get
Names Printed on the Ticket.

As road supervisors are to be elected
at the June election, some question has
arisen as to the manner in which they
should be nominated.

Of course a formal nomination is not
essential, as the voter can write in the
name of his choice; but in order that the
certain forms of law must be complied
with. Nomination by a convention of a
party with the required standing, or by
petition will be necessary.

County Judge Terrell suggests that at
the primaries a vote be taken on each
supervisor, and that the person in each
road district receiving the highest num-
ber of votes be formally nominated for
supervisor of that district by the county
convention insuring the printing of his
name on the ticket.

THE CURFEW ORDINANCE.

The W. C. T. U. and Ministerial As-
sociation Propose Co-operation
With the Police.

At the city council last evening the
matter of the curfew ordinance, which
is now a dead letter, was brought to the
action of the council and it is likely that
some action will be taken which will
result in the enforcement of the regu-
lations which forbid the roaming of
the streets by children at late hours.

The W. C. T. U. and the Ministerial
Association have taken the matter up
and suggest a practical way of co-op-
eration with the city officers.

Mrs. E. M. Vandervort, president of
the W. C. T. U., called upon Recorder
Judah yesterday and requested him to
bring before the council suggestions to
the following effect: That it was recog-
nized as practically impossible for the
present small police force to enforce the
curfew or license; that it was also seen
to be inadvisable to increase the force;
that the enforcement of the curfew or-
dinance was considered to be of the ut-
most importance; that as a solution of
the difficulty, if the council would agree,
the members of the Ministerial Associa-
tion would call for volunteers among
their young men to act as special police-
men, without pay, for the enforcement
of the ordinance.

The proposition seemed to strike the
council quite favorably, and it is prob-
able that it will be favorably reported on
by the committee on health and police,
to whom it was referred.

A practical suggestion of this kind,
which recognizes the fact that city offi-
cials are not quite omnipotent, and of-
fers valuable co-operation, is made all
too seldom by people who complain at
the non-enforcement of law. This is one
of the pleasant exceptions.

AWFUL SENSATION

Another Blood-Chilling Mystery Cleared
Up Without the Police.

"A MAN" STATUETTES

They are Proving Attractive Advertising
Features for Rock Island.

The statuettes adopted some time ago
by the Rock Island passenger depart-
ment as an unique and attractive man-
ner of advertising the Rock Island road,
are being sent out extensively to agents
and representatives and placed by them
in the offices and depots of the company
and in hotels and other public places.

These statuettes are a departure in the
way of advertising. They are proving to
be a success, and being a novelty as well
as an ornament are much sought after
by hotel keepers and others who have
space for something of this kind. On
this account they are used in places
where other forms of advertising would
be entirely out of place.

The statuettes are made of plaster of
Paris and tinted with a color which is
pleasing and at the same time durable.
They represent a man standing before a
map of the Rock Island route with a
Rock Island time table in his hand,
while at his feet is his valise. The ex-
pression of the face is that of a man
making up his mind which train to take.

The "A Man" picture, which these
statuettes copy, have been used by the
Rock Island road for a great many years
as a sort of trade mark. Nearly all the
folders and time tables which the pas-
senger department has issued bear this
picture. This "A Man" picture has ap-
peared in nearly every daily paper in
the United States and is familiar to
everyone.

Another Pioneer Laid to Rest.

At the home of her son in Hazeldell,
near Silverton, Mrs. Sarah English died
March 2nd, 1900 aged 88 years and 4
months. Deceased was born in Tennes-
see in 1811, and when about sixteen
years of age her parents moved to Wash-
ington, Davis county, Indiana, then in
65 crossed the plains to Oregon, and
with her only son settled in Marion
county where she has since resided. Her
maiden name was Sarah Smiley and was
joined in the holy bonds of wedlock to
John English in Indiana in about the
year 1831. At an early age she united
with the Cumberland Presbyterian
church and has since lived the life of a
devoted christian. Besides one son she
leaves three nieces and one nephew
to mourn her loss, namely Mrs. M. Graham
of Monitor, Mrs. J. Broyles, of Wood-
burn, and Mrs. B. Wiesner, and N.
Cawood, of Laurens. Remains were
interred in Willard cemetery. Indiana

New Through Train Service.

The schedules of the new through
trains between St. Louis and Portland,
which the Burlington and Northern
Pacific railroads will establish May 1st,
have been made public. West-bound
the new train will leave St. Louis 9 a. m.,
arriving at Lincoln about 10:30 p. m.,
same day, and at Portland at about 8 p.
m. third day thereafter. The trains will
run through from St. Louis to Portland
without change. Railroad men gener-
ally look upon the new move as a good
deal of an innovation. Through cars are
common enough, but there are not half
a dozen instances of railroads combining
to operate through trains.

A Buddhist Mission to the United States.

The Buddhists of Asia have raised the
funds to support a body of missionaries,
who are sent to the United States, for
the purpose of converting Christians to

Lawyers Ethics.

There are a lot of lawyers in Portland
who seem to stickle about professional
ethics, and the following declaration of
principles was given out for publication
by William W. Banks and Claude
Strahn, press committee of the organi-
zation:

"The objects of this organization are

to advance and disseminate among our
members and the bar generally the
ethics of the profession and to prevent
the prostitution of said profession by
any of its members in the seeking or
soliciting for business or practice therein
or in the securing of the same by means
of political or official connections; to
secure a just, fair and honest adminis-
tration of the affairs of our city, county
and state, and to use our best endeavors
to prevent the diversion by our county
or city officials of any of the moneys col-
lected or realized by taxation or other-
wise, except as by law allowed; to pre-
vent the illegal draining of our city and
county or any of their departments by
any one, and especially by any member
of our profession, for the purpose of
providing for or assisting such or any
who are not officers of our said city or
county with the law; to prevent the
creation of perpetuities in our public
offices; to see and insist that crimes
and misdemeanors are prosecuted and
punished and not disregarded or com-
promised; to demand of the machinery
of elections of the dominant political
party or parties that honest men only
be urged or nominated as candidates for
the offices to be filled from the ranks
of our profession; to assist in the en-
actment of good laws and the reinforce-
ments thereof, and to promote econ-
omy in the administration of our gov-
ernment and affairs."
