SOME FIGURES

The Eugene Guard prints the following:

Linn county, with more population, more voters and some more taxable property, runs the county on less than \$35,000, and only has a tax levy of 15 1/2 mills, and does not have an outstanding warrant, although six remained for a courthouse at considerable expense last year.

Linn county spent the following amounts for county purposes in 1898 \$59,075.48, 1897, 488,520.03.

Linn county has outstanding unpaid warrants and interest amounting to over \$115,000.00. Lane county has a tax levy of 23 1/2 mills. Lane county erected a courthouse two years ago at an estimated cost of \$14,000.

Voters and taxpayers should compare the above figures. They are official.

In the Linn county levy about twelve mills is for state school and state taxes, leaving the Linn county levy a little less than three mills.

Linn county on this low tax has built a new court house and hospital, and bought 120 acres of the best land in the county and paid for it all, and has issued no warrants and paid no interest on county warrants for four years.

To be perfectly fair about Marion county it should be stated that the county court claims it has put the bridges and roads in a better state of repair than ever before, and that for the last two years the warrant debt has been reduced materially.

The county tax levies in Marion county, with state tax levy in column at the right indicated for eight years past, have been as follows in mills:

FOR COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

This most important office has usually gone begging at the tail end of a convention, and been snapped up by some second or third-rate wire-pulling politician. He has then used the place to make what he could out of it and dole out pickings to other petty political workers. This has been carried so far that the people, particularly of Marion county, have lost interest and enthusiasm in public school work. Institutes and conventions are run in a rut and the public has no vital concern about them. A few manipulators and supposed educators are kept busy grinding out amateur teachers and armed with certificates they are turned out to experiment on the rising generation. Only here and there in the county, where a real educator is accidentally employed, is there any real life and enthusiasm in the public school work. This is not altogether the fault of a county superintendent, but is due to a mechanical heartless system managed by not the best type of educators. This system slowly but surely drives the best educators out of the county to more salubrious atmosphere where higher and better standards prevail. It is to be hoped the Republican convention will name the highest and best type of a man or woman for the place.

THE INEVITABLE

Organization and Co-operation Forged On the American Farmers.

Without discussing the good and bad points of the trusts, it is evident that industry is embarking upon a new departure. The old idea that competition was the life of trade was wrong. Economists of all schools are now agreed that competition was too often the death of industry. Co-operation has taken its place very successfully among millions of laborers and producers, especially in England and on the continent, resulting in a decrease of expenses in production and in getting goods from producer to consumer, this saving being shared between the two to their mutual advantage.

In the United States, our business men and capitalists have been the first to realize the possibilities of co-operation or combination, but have too often abused the idea through over-capitalization and attendant abuses. Our farmers and the producing classes generally have been forced to consider this matter in all its bearings. They now realize the possibilities of co-operation in agriculture is now the great problem that is agitating farmers and farmers' organizations every where.

What the producer or farmer wishes to accomplish is this: He wants to get his goods to the consumer, and get his pay for the same, with the least expense, without unnecessary delay, and in such manner that supply may be regulated to the demand, and the farmer receive a fair return for his labor without obliging the consumer to pay exorbitant prices. Now this is a hard nut to crack, but several cracks are being made in it. In Orange Judd Farmer, Jan. 20, for instance, on page 77 a short paragraph noted the remarkable success of the California raisin growers' association. While some of the improvement in values would have come anyhow, it is true that through co-operation this great industry in California has been lifted out of the slough of despond and put on a substantial basis that the land devoted to raising vineyards has advanced by \$50 to \$125 per acre in value. The Five States milk producers' association has enabled the farmers who shipped to Greater New York to get \$5000 a day more for their milk, for weeks at a time, than by the old method, but for the
