AS TO "THE GODLESS" PUBLIC SCHOOL SYSTEM.

Rev. Peter C. York, who has been lecturing at Portland, is against the public school system. He says:

"The public schools are founded on a neutral religious system. The effect has been a decay of morality. If we are to build up character in children and make them men and women of duty we must begin with religious training. The first step should be to train the child to walk in the presence of God to make him aware of the divine sanction of moral law, without which the latter becomes forceless and ineffective."

Rev. Peter C. York evidently knows nothing about the public schools of this state. There is no more "decay of morality" therein, where it is against the constitution to preach any religion, than there is in any of the schools dominated by any of the creeds where religion is pounded into the pupils day after day.

The boys and girls in the public schools of this state are just as good and just as bad as the boys and girls in religious educational institutions, in convents or anywhere else—whether these institutions be dominated by the Catholics, the Methodists, the Presbyterians, the Jews, or any other sect.

The children will generally be what their mothers have made them. The place to teach religion is in the home and not in the public schools, and the absence of Bible lessons and injecting of religious instructions has not made the public schools any more immoral than any other schools anywhere.

THE JOURNAL has frequently had occasion to comment against the public school system, but its criticisms have been based upon the fact that they are improperly graded and the pupils are stuffed with too many unnecessary and worthless studies. But any one at all familiar with public school life and with college life as well, knows that the heaven of morality in the public schools is just as strong and just as healthy as it is in any college of this state, no matter by whom conducted.

Rev. York, we are quite sure, does not reflect the opinions of the most intelligent Catholic people, many of whom are sending their children to the public schools.

THE SOUTHERN PROBLEM

The March issue of The International Monthly is well up to the standard set by the preceding number. It is if anything more interesting than either of the preceding issues.

Mr. Edward P. Clark of the Evening Post, treats The Southern Question in his usual unbiased and faithful manner. He shows how the Southern question is really a race question; that the steps taken by the Republican party after the war were inevitable, and the results which have arisen from that policy just as inevitable. Comparing the ignorant vote of the North with the negro vote of the South, he shows that the North must work out its own salvation, and would resent interference by Southern theorists; and that the North now realizes that reform in the South must spring from Southern sources. The Mississippi plan which restricts the suffrage is perfectly legitimate and honorable, and has stood the test of the Federal Courts, and appears to be well adapted to meet the race question of the South. Mr. Clark touches upon the question of representation from the South as well as the suppression of the negro.

"The wisest friends of the blacks—Northern men, who, as soldiers in the Union army, had helped to emancipate them, and then, as teachers and advisers, had helped to educate them—were the first to perceive and confess that the 'hands off' policy was the only one to adopt. As long as a dozen years ago, the ablest representative of this class, Gen. S. C. Armstrong, the founder of the Hampton, (Va.) Institute, declared against all further attempts on the part of the North at either coddling the blacks or hampering the whites. He opposed alike Federal Election Laws designed and administered in the interest of the blacks, and Federal Education Laws, appropriating money for the South in the same interest. He urged that a negro could never become an ordinary citizen until he should cease to be 'the ward of the nation.' He would have the blacks, poor, ignorant and despised, though they were, left to depend, for the very schooling which he thought absolutely essential, upon the provision which should be voluntarily made for them by the race that must pay the most of the taxes being levied on this would be better for both races than to have the nation relieve the whites of the burden."

"Mr. Booker T. Washington, a black pupil of General Armstrong at Hampton, who has become the most prominent leader of his race, takes essentially the same view. General Armstrong did not regard it as a serious misfortune for the negro that he was discouraged and even prevented, from voting. He condemned unfair methods, but he believed that the cure of such methods might and should be left to local public sentiment. Mr. Washington opposes unjust race legislation, like the recent proposition in Georgia to disfranchise
