### HOP GROWERS' ASSOCIATION.

What is Proposed in the Matter of Sales and Proceeds.  
GROVES, Or., March 28.—The directors of the Oregon Hop Growers' Association have decided to make a radical and very important change in the plan of dividing the proceeds of the sales of association hops. According to a circular letter that has been received by hop growers who turned their hops into the pool, it has been found impracticable to divide the proceeds pro rata, and it is now proposed to pay each member of the association the net proceeds of his hops as soon as they are sold.

Under the original plan, which has been in force until now, the hops turned over to the association were classified and the owners of hops in each class were to receive the proceeds of the sales of that class of hops, in proportion to the quantity of hops each man owned. Each man who put his hops into the pool signed an agreement that the division should be made in that manner. Although the association has been selling hops for several months, no division of proceeds has been made, and growers have become dissatisfied.

According to the circular letter received today, there are several reasons for the change in the plan. It is stated that growers want their money as soon as their hops are sold, and that men who hold mortgages upon the hops are unwilling to consent to the pro rata arrangement. It is also stated in the letter that the time limit which has appeared makes it impossible to sell hops as of the class under which they were listed when received.

This being the case, it appears that if the old plan were adhered to, a grower who turned in first-class hops would be cared for so as to be clean now would have to accept the same price as a man who turned in hops that were apparently first-class, but are now moldy and of little value.

Each circular letter is accompanied with an agreement, which growers are asked to sign, thereby consenting to the new arrangement. How the new plan will be received by those whose hops have become moldy since being turned over to the association, is a question.

President Jones was seen at Salem today, and reports that this action is being taken at the behest of the growers themselves, and that the proposition is being almost unanimously accepted by them. He says this involves no change in the contract of growers with the association, except as to the division of the proceeds of the sales.

A Mr. Bishop and other buyers are here from New York, making inquiry for a large number of hops.

### SENATOR SIMON.

Making a Record in the Senate that an Independent Might Be Proud of.  
Senator Simon is pronounced in his antagonism to the Hanna-Payne subsidy graft. In a letter to a resident of Portland he writes:

I have from the start been opposed to the Frye Payne bill. I cannot conceive why this government should pay these proposed large subsidies to a lot of wealthy shipowners. The producing classes of the country will derive no benefit from the payment of these subsidies, but a great burden will be cast upon them.

Mr. Simon's courageous utterance on this momentous question, like his position on the Puerto Rican bill, is in marked contrast to the mouset-like stillness that has been Oregon's portion in the senate during the past three years. His attitude toward the Puerto Rican bill has been given heretofore, but will bear restatement. In the letter before mentioned he says:

I have been from the first in favor of free trade with Puerto Rico, while it may be true that the United States has the Constitutional power to impose the tariff that is now proposed, I think it very injudicious thing to do. If it was proper in the first place to secure colonial possessions, and now to retain them, they ought to be treated in the matter of imports and exports in the same way we treat our own states and territories. The president's message on the subject, upon the conveying of congress, must have my hearty approval, and I am very much disappointed that the administration now seems to have changed front on the subject. I have been arguing the matter very earnestly with my colleagues, and may have something to say about it before the debate closes.

In the face of partisan demands, Senator Simon represents the economic intelligence of his state and the city on the two great matters that have risen to claim the attention of congress. It is difficult to restrain reflection as to the attitude of Oregon on the Puerto Rican bill and the Hanna-Payne subsidy graft, had the legislature of 1897 organized and yielded to the demands of Senator Mitchell. The good results of the veto of '97 are far-reaching. Opposition to the subsidy graft is one of the most beneficial of them.


