COUNTY POLITICS

Developments in the Two Opposition Conventions.

Populists and Democrats to Confer at Salem on Friday and Saturday.

County Politics.

Durbin for sheriff.

An unfilled legislative ticket against the Republicans.

A mixed county ticket from county judge down.

That is the way it looks now as the probable outcome of the Democratic and Populist conventions.

The refusal of the Republican organ to support part of the ticket is disorganizing party lines somewhat in Marion county.

An effort will be made in the opposition conventions Friday and Saturday to get them to put up a non-partisan ticket for county judge and commissioner, pledged to give the county a strictly business administration for the next four years. Figures will be presented to show that while valuations of property and values of crops have declined, more money has been collected and expended the last four years than for the four years preceding. A definite reform program will probably be adopted instead of resolutions on national issues.

A SPLIT TICKET

may result from the Tongue-McElrath organ's fight on County Clerk Hall. The ex-chairman's handling of the campaign fund in 1908 is still the theme of contention and Republicans generally want no portion of that kind of management. They will refuse to contribute unless assured of square deal. Chairman Wrightman will soon call a conference of the candidates and the county committee to map out the plan of campaign.

SILVER REPUBLICANS.

Friday and Saturday will indeed be busy days in Salem. In addition to the Populist Convention Friday and the Democratic convention Saturday, there will be a conference of Silver Republican leaders in the city Friday afternoon, at one o'clock, in response to a call by Chairman Bigdon.

There will be no state convention of Silver Republicans, but delegates to the National convention appointed by the state committee will be accredited. The State committee will meet in Portland April 12th for this purpose and for the transaction of such other business as may come before them.

FOR COUNTY JUDGE.

The statement of Scott and Needham as to their policy, if elected, county judge and commissioner, has met a popular demand and strengthened those aspirants where they were weak, in having no platform to stand upon.

Their statement does not, however, amount to a program for conducting the county finances for the next four years. The people appreciate the pledges made by Scott and Needham, and if honestly carried out will reduce taxes considerably. Their position will no doubt be further developed in the canvass if any discussion of county matters is permitted.

JUDGE JUDAH'S POSITION.

City Recorder S. J. Judah was approached on behalf of a citizens' movement. He says if the Republican party is reasonably well satisfied with the Republican ticket, he will not become a candidate for county judge. A citizens' program to be successful must be endorsed and supported by well-known and substantial Republicans and taxpayers of all parties. If the Democrats and Populists refuse to make party nominations and Republicans demand a specific reform program in county affairs he might accept, but on no other terms.

FROM SYDNEY.

The Populist primary met at Fairview and selected the following delegates: A. Light, Prof. T. C. Jory, John Jory, J. Colby, O. Butler, Geo. Elgin. Committeemen, Prof. Jory, A. Light, O. Butler. Fusion was voted down unanimously. Prof. Jory will not oppose a union ticket, but wants some places left blank and will have some resolutions to offer to the convention.

VERY LOW FIGURE.

Contract for Remodelling Hall of Representatives at \$9,844.

After the bids for remodeling the hall of representatives were opened at the capitol Wednesday, Mr. Erb, of the firm of Erb & Van Patton, whose bid of \$9,844 was the lowest, was called in and satisfied the board that himself and partner could fulfill all conditions as to bonds etc.

The board decided on the use of oak rather than yellow fir, there being but \$600 difference in the cost.

The contract will be formally entered into with Erb & Van Patton on next Monday.

Their bid is considered very low, a Portland bidder going no far as to say that it will hardly cover the cost of material, but the gentlemen have the reputation of knowing what they are about.

Foresters of America.

Wednesday night about 30 of Salem's Foresters of America went to Independence via steamer Modoc, to institute a court of Forestry. The Salem Foresters were met at the landing by a delegation of prospective members, headed by Grand Secretary S. Kafka, and State Organizer C. B. Clement, who conducted the company to the hall and they immediately proceeded to organize Court Independence No. 30.

The institution ceremony and initiation was performed by Court Sherwood's efficient officers and officers from the Grand Court of Oregon, Salem Court having charge. The following officers were elected and installed: C. R. Wm. H. Kelly; S. C. R. N. S. Hayes; Treas., I. L. Smith; Fin. Sec'y., D. A. Madison; Rec. Sec'y., E. L. Hedges; S. W., Geo. Atkins; J. W., J. B. Hildabrand; S. B., C. T. Mulkey; J. R. F. L. Gale. John M. Chase was elected deputy for the new court.

After the business of the evening was over a bountiful supper was served to which all did justice. The evening will long be remembered by members of Independence Court No. 30 and Salem Foresters will ever have a warm heart to greet Independence Foresters.

Profit in Goats.

As an illustration of the profit to be realized in the Angora Goat industry, the following instance is given: Ed. Jones of Shelburne Linn Co. bought 12 head of ewes in January last, paying \$5 per head for them, \$60 for the lot. He turned them on 10 acres of land, where they have made their living ever since, and have helped grub the land at the same time. There hasn't been a dollar of expense connected with their keep. Now the 12 ewes have brought forth 20 kids, which are all alive and doing well. They will be worth \$3 a piece in the fall, \$60 for the 20. The hand will have doubled in value, and the owner will also get about \$1 worth of fleece from each ewe. At the same time the goats have been a positive benefit to the land. It is no wonder that the farmers are waking up to the possibilities of the goat industry.

Fred Wiggins' Musical.

Fred Wiggins' clever opening of the musical department of his new store Wednesday evening was a brilliant success. The store was beautifully decorated and brilliantly lighted, and the musical bill of fare dished up to the visitors was exceptionally good, both vocally and instrumentally. The store was crowded for a couple of hours, and the sidewalk in front was blocked with ladies and gentlemen who were unable to gain admittance, but captured some of the melody which overflowed through the doors. It was a brilliant send-off for the new music store and displays enterprise on the part of the proprietor at popularizing the civilization art and its culture in our midst.

New Reading Room.

A free reading room has recently been fitted up by the ladies of the Salem Church of Christ, Scientist, on the upper floor of their building at 299 Liberty street. The room has been renovated and decorated and put in very attractive shape. WASHINGTON REPUBLICAN CONVENTION.

By Associated Press to the Journal.

ELKSVILLE, Wn., April 5.—Promptly at 10:30, Chairman Schively, of the state committee, called the Republican state convention to order. His opening sentence contained the name of Wm. McKinley, which called out a heavy round of applause. Schively spoke at some length and aroused great enthusiasm. Before the convention met C. B. Hopkins withdrew as a candidate for delegate to the national convention from King county.

As a result the caucus dropped Hughes and decided to present only the name of Neufelder. E. H. Guis, of King, was made temporary chairman and J. W. Lyons temporary chairman. The convention then took a recess.

WHEAT TELEGRAMS

None Were Read at the Lane County Convention This Year.

In commenting on the Lane county Republican convention held Wednesday the Eugene Guard says:

Two years ago when the Lane county Republican convention met, Mr. Friendly, on taking the chair, made a star play before the convention by reading a San Francisco gambling stock board telegram that wheat had advanced two and one-half cents a bushel that day, and was worth 71 cents a bushel in Eugene.

Of course it made no difference to the delegates, or county at large, as there was no wheat in the county for sale, and the advance was simply a gambling proposition, no wheat changing hands, the gamblers simply settling differences of their buying and selling contracts. But the convention cheered 'very lustily, even though it was not aware of what it was cheering about.

Mr. Friendly did not read any wheat telegram today. If he had it would have informed the delegates that wheat in Eugene could be quoted at only 38 to 40 cents a bushel. So Mr. Friendly kept his wheat telegram in his pocket. He is aware of the fact that the farmer is not a member of the McKinley trust scheme.
