The Political Situation in Marion County is Very Mixed.

Why Mr. Buford Traded Off His Mule for a Candy Cane.

Durbin for sheriff.
An united legislative ticket against the Republicans.
A mixed county ticket from county judge down.
That is the way it looks now as the probable outcome of the Democratic and Populist conventions.
The refusal of the Republican organ to support part of the ticket in disorganizing party lines somewhat in Marion county.
The Republicans are studying the lay of the land to see how much of an effort it will require to safely land the weak men on their ticket. It is conceded that there is a fighting chance to beat some of their men if the opposition name good men.

A Populist delegation are calling on Republican nominees for the legislature in Marion county and asking them to sign a pledge to support the initiative and referendum amendment. Lot L. Pearce, of this city, declined to accept their pledge when approached today, but may make some other pledges.
The feeling among the better class of citizens and taxpayers is growing more firm every hour in favor of having a closer business administration of the business affairs of Marion county.
The big interest continues to center around the candidates for county judge and commissioner. It is thought a non-partisan ticket will be made up and following names are being canvassed:
Geo. Griswold, J. P. Frizzell, S. Farrah, Scott Riggs, W. W. Culver, M. W. Hunt, of Salem; E. P. Morcom and Jas. C. Johnson, of Woodburn; Geo. Cusimer, Mathew Small, of Silverton; Wm. Pate, of Jefferson; B. F. Hall, of Croton; W. T. Grimm, of Hubbard; A. A. Gleason, of Hubbard; John A. Ditter, of Sublimity; N. J. Judah, and T. L. Davidson, of Salem.

THE JOURNAL advocates and will sustain a county ticket from county judge pledged to a strict business program, regardless of politics, and a legislative ticket pledged to retrenchment and the referendum amendment and reform in taxation to secure a more just distribution of state taxes, and to relieve property as much as possible of direct taxation.

AMUNVILLE POPULISTS.

BICYCLE PATH CASE

Can the Paths Be Protected From Destruction?

Wording of the Law is Very Loose. Second Trial of Samuel Ramp.

The bicycle path case in which Samuel Ramp is defendant, which was tried in Justice Johnson's court, Wednesday, resulting in a disagreement of the jury, and is on trial again today in the same court, has aroused a great deal of interest among all classes of people in Marion county. Many seem to consider it a case of causeless prosecution; while many bicyclists look upon it as a test case to show whether the paths can be protected or not, and say if not they'll be qualified if they pay any more bicycle tax.
The facts seem to be that Mr. Ramp had no intention of injuring the path; that he drove upon the path but a short distance, and that to get by two wagons which practically blocked the road, which was 27 feet wide; that he had a horse and light buggy.
There was no evidence that the horse was shod and none whatever was introduced to show that he injured the path or left a mark upon it.
According to the wording of the law, it would seem that injury to the path would be a very necessary thing to prove. Section 10 which alone would support a prosecution of this kind reads as follows:
Section 10—Such paths shall be constructed in such a manner that they will not materially interfere with any road, street or crossing, and when so constructed it shall be deemed a misdemeanor for any person or persons to in any manner injure or deface said path, to place glass, wire, iron, sticks, stones, or any other object or substance upon said path whereby the safety of the path is imperiled or injury to the bicycle or any part thereof, or to the rider, or to a pedestrian, results, or is liable to result. This provision is not to prevent ingress or egress to any field, yards, lot or other place, to road crossing or driving of loose stock; providing the loose stock is not wantonly driven upon said path and due care is taken to prevent injury to paths by loose stock being driven along highways. Any person injuring any path provided for by this act shall, upon trial and conviction, be fined not less than five (5) days, or both, in the discretion of the court.
It will be observed that "wantonly" driving loose stock upon the path is forbidden, but not the driving of a horse and buggy, or a load of hay, for that matter, as such. Injury to the path is the thing which is forbidden, whether it is done with a horse and buggy, a wheelbarrow or a pick and shovel.
The law is unquestionably weak in its wording. If the legislators intended to forbid the use of the paths to equestrians, which they probably did, they should have phrased the law to cover the point in unmistakable language.
Section 11 merely shows what they had in mind and ought to have been put in mandatory form. It is as follows:
Section 11. These paths when so constructed shall be exclusively for pedestrians.

POPULIST CONVENTION

Met At the City Council Chamber Friday Forenoon.

Proceedings to Form a Ticket for the People's Party of Marion County.

Chairman Weeks of the Populist county central committee called the convention to order at 10:40, there being about 50 delegates present.
For temporary chairman John Jory was nominated by Mr. Libby, of Jefferson, and Geo. W. Weeks by Capt. J. M. Payne, T. C. Jory was called upon to act as temporary secretary, and D. E. Swank and Capt. Payne to act as tellers, and the vote for chairman was taken by ballot.
The ballot resulted Jory 18, Weeks 27, blank 1, and Weeks was elected temporary chairman.
T. C. Jory, was elected temporary secretary. On motion of J. P. Frizzell a committee of five on order of business was appointed by the chair, as follows: Robinson, Libby, Stevens, Mathews and J. W. Jory, Mr. Frizzell asking to be excused.
On motion of John A. Jeffrey a committee of three was appointed on order of business, as follows: Jeffrey of Salem, Robinson of Turner, and Jones of Jefferson.
A committee of three on permanent organization was appointed, consisting of Payne, Eoff and Weaver.
After a recess of fifteen minutes Chairman Weeks called the meeting to order and suggested that there were many questions to be discussed and it would be well to get at them.
A number of speeches were made by Populist leaders, all favoring a citizen's movement.

Notes on the Pops.

This is Populist day at Salem—fifteen cent meals and no whisky.
The highest wind of the season blew over the city today when the convention was called to order.
The Union Veterans' Union did the handsome thing by as many of the Populist delegates as wanted to eat beans.
At 1:30 the convention was again called to order, and the committee on credentials made its report, which was adopted.
Committee on permanent organization recommended that the temporary organization be made permanent, which was done.
Committee on order of business recommended, 1st permanent organization; 2d election of delegates to state convention; 3d consideration of nominations. Adopted.
