Silver Republicans.
A meeting of the central committee of the Marion county Silver Republicans was held Friday evening at Popular hall. After general discussion it was held that as the money question was not the issue in this campaign, they take no action as a party in the pending campaign.

The following resolution was unanimously passed:
"Resolved, that the Silver Republicans of Marion county do not take any party action in the present county campaign, but that the members of said party be free to act according to the dictates of individual judgment."

The committee then adjourned.

RAMP ACQUIRED.
Second Jury Makes Short Work of the Bicycle Path Case.

The case of the state of Oregon vs. Samuel Ramp charged with driving on a bicycle path, went to the jury yesterday at 5:30 o'clock, and after being out thirty minutes the jury brought in a verdict of not guilty. On the first trial, the jury on first ballot stood 3 to 3, but afterwards drifted toward conviction until on the last ballot 8 to 1 Northcott stood alone for acquittal. As he was too red-headed to give up when he knew he was right, the result was an agreement to disagree. On the last trial, the jury, which included at least three bicyclists and one bicycle repair man made short work of bringing in a verdict of acquittal. The general opinion seems to be that it will be extremely difficult to protect the paths from injury under the law, which is very loosely drawn besides being of doubtful constitutionality.

A New Front.
The old Wash Stimpson saloon building, next door to S. W. Thompson & Co. belonging to some eastern relatives of Col. N. R. Knight, for whom J. T. Allen is guardian, and the Plamondon estate, is undergoing repairs. A new front is to be put in and E. R. Colgan will conduct a saloon there. J. P. Hops Advancing.
A Portland dealer this week bought a large lot of hops at six cents. He was offered 6 1/2 but is holding for seven cents. The Oregon Association sold 100 bales for six cents this week. A number of growers are placing a limit of seven and eight cents on their holdings.
