DIRECT FROM NOME.

C. D. Campbell Makes a Mid-Winter Trip Overland.

He Left Nome December 5th. With Dog Team. About 3000 People At Nome City.

C. D. Campbell, who has spent the past three years, in Alaska in the city, having just arrived from Cape Nome.

He left Nome on December 5th in company with Carl von Knebelstorf. They had a team of five dogs, for "hookies" and a Scotch collie, the latter in the lead. They made Dawson in 57 days, after a trip not nearly so severe as one would expect.

Mr. Campbell kept a diary of the whole trip, in which every detail of interest to persons contemplating going over the ground is recorded—the number of miles they traveled, their character of the trip, the weather, and most important of all, the stopping places, their frequency and character.

It is somewhat surprising to learn that on the trip from Nome to Dawson they were compelled to sleep out of doors but three times. They found cabins and friendly shelter at nearly every point on the road. Indian villages, steamboats, woodchoppers' cabins and mail stations lie within a day's travel of each other, or closer, over the entire distance, and there is plenty of wood all the way.

They carried with them at the start both a stove and a tent. The tent they cut up for a sled cover when a day or two out, and the stove they disposed of a day or two later.

Between Nome and Dawson the men met many travelers going in, estimating the number at about 300.

The travelers had the south wind in their faces nearly all the way. At times the thermometer registered down to 45 degrees below zero, but frozen noses were the worst damage suffered on that account.

One day Knebelstorf had a narrow escape by falling through a crack in the ice, but he was pulled out by Campbell.

From Dawson to Bennett the men made 40 miles a day, doing the 460 miles in 90 hours of traveling. At Bennett they expected to take the train and ride to Skagway, but the train was snowed under and they continued their promenade to tidewater.

Mr. Campbell went first to Alaska in January 1907, sailing from Seattle on the steamer City of Seattle, for Skagway. He stayed in Skagway until the spring of 1909, when he returned home for a short visit, and then again went north. He sailed on the steamer Hayden Brown for St. Michaels May 25th and arrived there July 23, laying in Dutch Harbor a couple of weeks on the trip.

After three days in St. Michaels he left with a party which had been made up on the steamer for Golovin Bay, 80 miles across Norton sound.

This bay lies in the Summer peninsula north of the mouth of the Yukon and about equally distant from St. Michaels and Cape Nome, which is farther north and west on the same peninsula. The party went up Fish River and its tributary, the Neenack, about 60 miles. There are rich diggings in this section. About \$50,000 to \$75,000 were taken out last season.

Later Mr. Campbell made his way with a companion and a dog team back to the coast, skirting the coast to Nome.

Mr. Campbell says the Nome beach is rich as far as it has been prospected, and there are rich diggings on the rocks which find their way into the ocean from the back country. Some good prospects have also been found on the tundra or plateau which extends back from the beach.

The pay streak in the beach diggings is a thin layer of ruby sand which lies on a bedrock of clay under two or three feet of beach sand. The gold is coarse and is saved with the crudest appliances. The largest nugget found was something over \$100. Three nuggets were found on Avul creek which weighed \$1000 each.

The creek diggings pay streak is black sand and the gold is also coarse.

On Dexter creek Leo Linpenhart opened up a spot so rich that he picked out 42 ounces dry the first day. Then he brought in water through a hose and washed out 88 ounces, the second day.

Nome is a full-fledged city with a city government, mayor, council, chief of police, fire department, etc. The last named consists of a bucket brigade. Good order is preserved, though the town is "wide open" at all times.

Wages are from \$7 a day up, according to occupation. There has been some difficulty in getting good water in Nome. Now an enterprising citizen has sunk a large well and put in a steam pump and two buckets of good water can be had for a quarter, where it used to be two bits a bucket. But beer is 50 cents a drink.

Mr. Campbell talks very interestingly of his trip and of the conditions in the far North. He did no mining on the Canadian territory, but knows the conditions and says that the treatment accorded by the Canadian officials is unbearable. Extortion and corruption are the rule, and an outsider has no business there.

He intends to return to Nome in May, probably sailing on the Gnam from Seattle. In the meantime he is visiting his mother and sister in this city and enjoying the refinements of civilization.

SUBSTANTIAL IMPROVEMENTS

The City Will Enjoy a Building Boom This Summer.

The plans for the remodeling of the opera house block have been completed by the architects, Pugh & Gray, and are now in the hands of E. P. McCormack, the owner of the block, who will soon advertise for bids for the work.

When the work has been completed the old opera house building will be one of the finest business blocks in the city.

The whole lower floor, back to where the Japanese store opening on Court street is now located, will be thrown into one large store room, with plate glass front from floor to ceiling all around on both Court and Liberty streets.

Brick pillars will alternate with iron in the frontage. This will leave over 100 running feet of the finest show windows in the city. The main entrance will be on Liberty street, where the stairs now lead to the second story, and there will be a side entrance on Court street. The basement will be fitted up also for a store room and sales room for heavy goods.

The stairway to the second story, which will be divided up into office rooms, will be on Court street, at the rear of the large store.

West of the stair way a smaller room will be fitted up for a jewelry store or a similar business.

The upper story of the building will be fitted up for lodge rooms and will probably be occupied by the Masonic lodge.

It is understood that the magnificent store described above will be occupied by Joseph Meyers & Son, whose business demands more room than is available in their present location.

With this improvement at the corner of Court and Liberty Streets and the Old Fellows' new opera house building on the corner of Court and High, Court street will begin to rival State as a business street, especially as the new location of the post office will cause a great increase in the travel on that street.

It is very gratifying to see these substantial and costly improvements being made. It not only shows the faith of solid business men in the future growth of the city and their enterprise in helping it along, but presages other improvements in business and residence property.

LOCAL POLITICS.

Some of the Objectors to the Democratic Conventions Work Weakening.

Some of the prominent Populists who on Monday were seriously objecting to the way the Citizens' ticket was put up are said to be willing to support it if the endorsement of the People's party county central committee can be secured.

That committee meets on April 21st at Salem. The main objection is raised at Finzer for clerk (who is practically placed on the Republican ticket by the Statesman), and Hobart for assessor who received one vote for that office before the Republican county convention. It is possible that the Populists will demand to put straight Populists on the ticket for one or both of these.

It is reported on the streets at Salem today that if Tongue is renominated the Statesman will put up the whole ticket, including Hall for clerk. Hall says he will make the canvass for re-election on his record as an official. He speaks in the highest terms of Mr. Finzer as a friend and neighbor and will only make a canvass in self-defense.

A number of Republicans are expressing themselves in favor of the Citizen's ticket and are outspoken in declaring they will support Frank Durbin for sheriff as "one of the clean young officials who is entitled to a second term."

The general desire seems to be to make the ticket as strong as possible and have but one ticket in the field against the Republicans.
