FUSION COMPLETE

**Presidential Electors Divided Evenly
Between the Parties.**

**Democrats Take Two Congressmen and
and Supreme Justice—Populists
Dairy Commissioner.**

PORTLAND, Or., April 13.—The fusion
movement between the Democratic and
Populist parties, which was set on foot
yesterday at their state conventions, be-
came an accomplished fact this morning
when both conventions adopted the
respective reports of their conference
committees. The distribution of candi-
dates is as follows: Democrats—Two
presidential electors, justice of the
supreme court and two congressmen.
Populists—Two presidential electors and
food and dairy commissioner.

The Democrats made the following
nominations: Presidential electors—Wal-
ter M. Pierce, Umatilla; Dell Stuart,
Multnomah; Justice of the supreme
court. W. M. Ramsey of Yamhill coun-
ty. The Democrats adjourned until
afternoon.

D'Arcy Men Shut Out.

The only difference between the dele-
gates and those reported by the com-
mittee was in the names of George
S. Downing and D. J. Fry, of Marion.
Downing had the proxy of W. H.
Downing, and Fry that of J. R.
Fairbanks. Fry and Downing be-
long to the D'Arcy faction in Marion
county, which was turned down in the
primaries and again in the county con-
vention. To keep it out of the state
convention, the Marion County dele-
gation elected six alternatives to the state
convention, who were authorized to be-
come the regular delegates in case of the
absence of any of them. Under this
ruling the credentials committee gave
Downing's seat to Webster Holmes, al-
ternative, and Fairbanks' to Henry
Pape, alternative. Fry was effectually
closed out, for he had been a member of
credentials committee.

**in State Convention and Nominate
Candidates.**

**Endorse Acquisition to the Philippines,
the Panama Canal and the
State Administration.**

PORTLAND, April 13.—The Republican
state convention nominated following

The Platform.

"The Republicans of Oregon, in con-
vention assembled, reaffirm their belief
in and loyalty to the gold standard. We
commend the Republican congress for
its recent legislation making the gold
standard a part of the statutory law of
the land. So long as either of our great
political parties advocates the free coin-
age of silver, the maintenance of the
gold standard is the most important po-
litical issue, affecting as it does the
value of the farmer's crop and the la-
borer's wages. We call upon all who
believe in sound money to unite with
the Republicans of Oregon in the im-
portant elections of this year in order
that a victory may be won for the gold
standard so decisive as forever to pre-
clude the debasement of our currency by
the free coinage of silver.

"We endorse the policy of the adminis-
tration in securing the Philippine
Islands, and demand that they shall be
retained as American territory. We
have confidence that the American peo-
ple, without departing from their tradi-
tions, will give security to personal and
property rights, justice, liberty and
equality before the law to all who live
beneath its flag.

"We endorse the policy of the Adminis-
tration in suppressing the insurrection
in the Philippines, headed by Aguinaldo.
We point with pride to the honorable
part played by the families of Regi-
ment in this war. They met with vic-
tory in every combat and covered their
state and country with glory on every
field. We condole with the families of
those members of the regiment who lost
their lives in the conflict and extend our
congratulations to the survivors of the
regiment on the brilliant and honor-
able record they have made.

"We regard trade with the orient as
one of the great sources of our National
wealth in the future, and an open door
in China as an important aid to growth
of our trade in the orient. We com-
mend the successful efforts of the pres-
ent Administration, and especially of its
Secretary of State, to secure by treaty
with the several European powers, the
right to the free introduction of Ameri-
can goods into that great Empire.

"The Republican party in Oregon
recognizes the vital necessity of control
of the organization and curtailment of
the powers of trusts and combinations of
capital by the state within its borders,
and pledges its support in the approach-
ing legislature to laws defining and car-
rying out these objects.

"We are in favor of retrenchment and
reform in the expenditure of public
money; we pledge the Republican party
to favor the enactment of all legislation
looking to an economical administration
of public affairs.

"We point with pride to the legislation
adopted by the last legislature; it abol-
ished the railroad commission; it re-
duced the legal rate of interest to 6 per
cent; it passed an act for the submis-
sion to the people of a constitutional
amendment providing for the initiative
and referendum; it enacted a registra-
tion law for the protection of the purity
of the ballot. As experience demon-
strates this last act to be cumbersome
in some particulars, we pledge the Republi-
can legislators to make an effort for its
amendment to the end that the registra-
tion of qualified voters may be facili-
tated.

"We are unalterably opposed to any
measure looking to the leasing of the
public domain, believing that such a
system would have an undoubted ten-
dency to hasten the concentration of
land ownership in the hands of a few
individuals and against the long estab-
lished American policy of encouraging
home building.

"We are in favor of the immediate
construction of a canal between the At-
lantic and the Pacific at the Isthmus of
Panama, and we instruct the Oregon
delegates in Congress to labor earnestly
and continuously for the enactment of
such legislation as will lead to the con-
struction and operation of the canal un-
der governmental control.

"We urge the immediate passage of
the bill now pending in congress to pen-
sion the Indian War Veterans, and we
pledge the support of the Oregon dele-
gation in congress to the same."

"We heartily endorse the administra-
tion of Governor Geer and the state offi-
cials of Oregon, as economical, wise and
credible to the state."
