THE UNION TICKET.

The state conventions have been held and the opposition to the Republicans have very properly united their interests on a state and congressional ticket. At the head of this ticket stands Judge W. M. Ramsey for supreme justice. He made the race two years ago and received a very good vote. He is a gentleman who stands high at the bar and has recently become a resident of Salem. The only other state officer to be elected is food and dairy commissioner and the Union nominee is Wm. Shumacher, of Washington county. He is a practical dairyman.

For congress the united opposition have put up Senator Smith, of Baker county, and Senator Daly, of Lake and Klamath. Both are able campaigners and men of more than average ability and good legislative records. For district attorney in this district, John A. Jeffrey, of Salem, was nominated. W. T. Slater, of this city, would have been the nominee if the office had been apportioned to the Democrats. But it fell to the Populists. Mr. Jeffrey served acceptably in the first district as public prosecutor, and having many friends among the Populist leaders of other counties, he was the choice of his party for the place. Mr. Jeffrey had already been placed on the Fusion ticket for the legislature in Marion county and he is now in possession of two nominations and will have to decline one.

Mr. Jeffrey's place on the county ticket will have to be filled by the committee. It was hoped he would be on the county canvass as he is an able campaigner, but will probably now have to take the campaign in hand on a larger scale. Whoever is put on in his place for the county ticket should be prepared to discuss the necessity for a non-partisan business administration such as Lin county has had. That is far more important than the national issues, which have properly speaking been the county canvass. While the Fusion ticket will support the Union state, congressional and district ticket, it will contend to a finish for the Citizens' county ticket in Marion county. The people have a right to help themselves in their local affairs and to have men put in office who place the welfare of the people above the party pull that is exerted by men entirely for the graft they can work in the name of politics.

THE CITIZEN'S MOVEMENT.

The Populist central committee meets at Salem on Saturday of this week to complete the work begun by the Populist county convention and the Lemo county convention. First the Populist convention nominated two men for the legislative ticket and adjourned, with the understanding that the Democrats would put up the other three men on the legislative ticket, which is political, and also adjourned and let a Citizens' county ticket be made up from county judges down. At least that was the expectation of the Populists when they adjourned to meet on Saturday, April 21.

But the Democratic county convention was made up of delegations in some cases taken from all the reform parties, as from Woodburn and Silverton and other precincts. This convention completed the legislative ticket, by naming three more men and endorsing the two named by the Populists, but also went ahead and made up a complete county ticket after holding a conference with Populists. The two legislators named by the Populists are the only candidates who are fully nominated by the reform elements of the county. The rest of the ticket put up by the Democrats will have to be considered by the Populist county central committee at Salem Saturday. Whatever of that ticket is acceptable to them they will not doubt ratify. If they can improve the ticket by refusing to endorse whatever does not suit them they have a perfect right and it is their duty to do so. The ticket cannot be improved in some respects. In others it can. The people are going to elect the Citizens' county ticket if it is right. They are going to introduce new life and a new order of things into our county government.

They are going to have taxes reduced and stop piling up debt. They are going to have better roads and bridges instead of some of the worst in the state. To do those things they are going to ask that the best men possible be put on the Citizens' ticket and then select them to serve the people instead of the old dirty political ring that has run things in Marion county.

The people in the country know what the citizen's movement in Salem stands for. They know that the people want what is right, but the push politicians do not. If it had not been for a few men put in office by the people, like Judge Hubbs, Dist. Attorney Hayden, Sheriff Durbin, County Clerk Hall, the Salem citizen's administration, this county would have had a debt piled up on it twice as high as it is now, and all the jobs and grafts that have been broken by those officials would have been carried out.

What the people of the county want, regardless of party, is officials elected at the coming election who will work no graft on the taxpayer. Boise, Hayden, Durbin, Hall and the Salem city officials work no graft on the people. That kind of officials will put the county out of debt and reduce taxes below a dollar an acre where they now stand. That is what the citizen's movement stands for, and that is what the people want. Let political managers of all parties take notice and not obstruct the only means to give the people relief.

COUNTY POLITICS

TAX REDUCTION PROGRAM

TO WHICH THE CITIZENS' CANDIDATES FOR THE COUNTY COURT

Form of a Citizen's Ticket That Would Be Satisfactory.

Citizen's Tax Reduction Program Would Not Prevent Necessary Improvements.

A great many Democrats and Populists have called at The Journal office and say a Citizen's ticket like this will be satisfactory.

County Judge—W. W. Elder, of Stayton.

Sheriff—Frank W. Durbin, of Howell.

Clerk—W. W. Hall, of Woodburn.

Recorder—J. H. Roland, of Jefferson.

Treasurer—A. L. Downing, of Sublimity.

Assessor—Commissioner—W. W. Culver, of Liberty.

Coroner—J. W. Whitlock, of Silverton.

School Superintendent—A. J. Garland, of Salem.

Surveyor—A. G. Gable, of South Salem.

Notary Public—Constable, John H. Lewis.

For assessor there should be a competent and popular candidate proposed to the Populist central committee that meets Saturday to complete and ratify the ticket. The name of T. C. Davidson of South Salem, the Populist who ran for assessor two years ago, is proposed. He is a competent and popular farmer, and an independent man.

Homer B. Holland of Salem, an independent Republican, is also suggested. Neither of these men is seeking the place, and it is not known that either would accept. But this office is seeking a proper man. While Mr. Hobart might succeed on a Republican ticket, he is not acceptable to the people on a Citizen's ticket. Mr. Holland is a business man and a man of such character and integrity that no one would improperly influence him in placing values on property. His clerical ability and knowledge of values would ensure a first-class administration of that office. The citizen's county ticket will be the only ticket in the field against the Republican ticket, and the people have a right to have the best men on it who can be found as candidates.

THE TAX REDUCTION PROGRAM adopted by the Citizen's county ticket is being discussed. The main features are accepted by men of all parties as just.

The Stayton Mail (Republican) says: That part of the resolution tying the "Citizens' ticket" nominees for judge and commissioner is a piece of political rot. On that platform the officers of the county court, in case of their election, would have to call a special election to repair the Stayton bridge or the Jefferson bridge, either of which will require an expenditure of more than \$1,000.

The above is not stated fairly, but let that go.

Examination of the county records, as to the Stayton bridge, shows this: Contractors offered to rebuild the whole bridge, one span of 200 feet and two spans of 150 feet each, for \$2,300. Half of this would fall on Lin county, but they refused to go ahead. The Marion county court considered it too high, as it would take 100,000 feet of lumber at a cost of \$500 and they considered \$1,000 enough for the work. The Stayton bridge ought not to cost over \$1,000, and that would be \$800 for this county, and under the resolution of the Citizen's convention could be built without submitting it to a vote of the people.

The Jefferson bridge would not cost over \$500 to \$600 to rebuild, and as Marion county's share would be \$250 to \$300 it would come under the resolution.

The Stayton and Jefferson bridges are the only two large bridges that are likely to be rebuilt for several years, and, as the facts show, could be built whenever Lin county gets ready under the citizen's program.

The heavy expenditures in Marion county have mostly been made. The demand that improvements costing over \$1,000 be first authorized by the people comes from the people and is for the protection of the people. It is recalled that Judge Hubbard ordered an improvement of the courthouse and grounds, at first estimated at \$1,500, but in the aggregate before completion amounting to nearly ten thousand dollars.

The present county court entered into a contract for courthouse improvements that experts afterwards said could be done for much less. It cost a great deal more than was contemplated, and the litigation that grew out of it cost the county hundreds of dollars. It is that class of improvements the people need protection against and will have it.

It is a well known fact that combinations of push politicians are generally backed of the clamor for improvements and after the work is once begun, by their processes of expansion, they rob the taxpayer. If these enterprises are checked by the resolutions of the citizen's convention it will have accomplished a good purpose.

Against the Referendum.

We are not inclined to be very enthusiastic over the plank in the Republican platform in which the last legislature is praised for adopting the resolution for submitting to the people the constitutional amendment for the initiative and referendum. This resolution must have a majority vote in each house submitted to the electors, at the general election two years hence, however. We are not in favor of either its submission or its adoption at this time, and we are not willing to attempt to "point with pride" at the act of the last legislature in putting the matter in the shape in which it is now found.
