FIRE FOUR SHOTS

But Only Hit Him Once--Mrs. Basy's Poor Marksmanship.

A Sunday Morning Family Jar Disturbs a Commercial Street Neighborhood.

At about 7 o'clock Sunday morning Mrs. Joe Basy took four shots at her husband with a .38 calibre revolver, inflicting a flesh wound in the left shoulder, and searing the poor fellow nearly to death, but otherwise doing no great damage.

This seems to have been the culmination of a series of family jars, extending over a year or so. The couple had been man and wife just ten months to a day when the shooting took place. The woman was a widow with four children when she met young Basy, and it seems to be one of those cases of a woman, who is not so young as she once was, who is desperately enamored of a man several years her junior. They have been living on Commercial street north of Division.

The woman's statement to a JOURNAL reporter is that Basy has been cruelly misused here; that he has beat her; that he beat her till she was sick two weeks ago; and that he has beat her 16-year-old daughter. She says she had stood all she could of that kind of treatment, and had told him so, and that if he continued it she would do something desperate. Sunday morning, while dressing, he told her that he was going to give her a whipping, she had done without one for quite a while and he was going to give her one. He knocked her back against the window. She then went out and got the pistol and came back. He kicked it out of her hand and it went off. That's all she knew about it, she was so excited. Then she fainted away--on the bed. Asked about the report that she had taken poison immediately after the shooting, she said she thought too much of her children to do that.

Henry Tarpley who lives just across the alley was out in his back yard and heard the four shots. They sounded like a horse kicking the side of his stall. A few moments afterward he heard groaning in Basy's barn and called out to ask what was the matter.

Basy called back to come quick and then he thought the horse must have come one down; but he found Basy in his night clothes with a bleeding shoulder. Tarpley went in and got Basy's clothes, seeing the women lying on the bed, and Basy then dressed and walked up town and had his wound treated.

One who professes to know, hands the JOURNAL the following statement, which is given for what it is worth.

Since Mr. Basy has moved back to Salem, a relative has been trying to persuade him to return. Home she said it was too hard work for him to support some one else's children. He has never bought an article of clothing for any of the children; their own father has clothed and almost wholly supported them, since the marriage of their mother to Mr. Basy. Mrs. Basy has paid the house rent; therefore Joe had nothing to do in the way of supporting the family except to help pay the grocery bill which was \$2.50 last week. He has the advantage of his wife, in having relatives to help him spread the untold about this matter. He has threatened her several times, and has abused her in a brutal manner. There may be a great deal of truth in that, the partial cause of his conduct is his relative always talking to him about returning to her home, and trying to get him to stay away from his own home. His wife might have had some comfort and help in her oldest daughter, but he has driven her away from her mother's home, and because he did not succeed in driving the others away, he has caused his wife all the trouble possible. Mrs. Basy has now, many times said she will be glad to help her in any way, and we hope that she shall soon be able to be up, but not to think of her trouble any more, for it shall go with the winds.

Basy's somewhat different story of the shooting. He had risen in the morning and done some work about the house. Had breakfast and was changing his clothes preparatory to going down town. She protested against his going and then wanted to go with him, which he declined to allow. She then left the room and returned a moment later. He was lacing his shoes, but looked up in time to see her pointing the revolver at him, gripping it with both hands. He sprang up as the pistol was discharged, the bullet passing where he had been sitting. He grappled with her and the next shot went into the ceiling. Then he broke loose and ran, but found the kitchen door locked and had to come back through the room, when she took a couple more shots at him, the last one striking him in the shoulder. He then ran out and went to the barn.

He says she has threatened to do such a thing several times before, and their married life has been far from happy. The daughter mentioned by the woman is married and has a good husband with whom she refuses to live, so he considered she had no right there. He has been working steadily and has spent all his wages on his family, and has squandered no money on the outside; that the woman's unreasonable jealousy has been the cause of all the trouble.

RAILROAD FORECLOSURE

Big Suit for Possession of the Salem Light and Power Plant.

The London & San Francisco bank has begun a suit to foreclose a mortgage given by the Salem Consolidated Street Railway Company to the Northwest Loan & Trust Company in 1892, to secure the payment of a promissory note for \$100,000, about that amount being alleged to be now due. The property covered by the mortgage is now owned by the Salem Light & Traction Company and includes the power-house, lighting system and the street-railway lines and cars, commonly known as the "big car line." An attorney fee of \$7500 is also asked for in the complaint.

The note on which suit is brought was given for six months May 11, 1893, at 8 per cent and the mortgage covers all the property. The filing fee in this suit is only \$5, the same as in a \$50 suit.

THE COLLEGE CADETS.

Arrive From Mt. Angel and Make a Splendid Impression.

The Mt. Angel college cadets and band of 33 pieces arrived in the 11 a. m. train and made a splendid impression by their parade and open air concert on Commercial and State streets.

A Big Foreclosure Suit.

The Salem Consolidated Street Railway Company is defendant in a foreclosure suit filed in Department No. 2 of the Circuit court. Judgment is asked for \$100,000, less \$27,429.99 paid, and for \$7,500 attorneys' fees. The mortgage sought to be foreclosed covers a large portion of the company's property in this city. Dolph, Mallory, Simon & Geary are the attorneys for the plaintiff.

REPUBLICAN MANAGERS.

Elect Officers and Will Frame a Platform to Make the County Canvass Upon.

Republican County Chairman F. T. Wrightman held a meeting of the county central committee Saturday to arrange for the county campaign. J. W. Roland was made secretary.

A committee, consisting of W. H. Savage, C. L. McNary, S. A. Hughes, E. M. LaFors and Frank Davey, were appointed to confer with the candidates in relation to the campaign expenses. The committee and candidates withdrew from the hall to an adjoining room for a conference, and in a short time returned with the following report:

"We, your committee, would respectfully report that we have been in consultation with the several candidates on the Republican ticket, and have come to a satisfactory agreement, whereby the chairman of the county central committee is authorized to levy a voluntary assessment, the amount of which has been agreed upon, the same to be expended for the legitimate expenses of the campaign."

The report was adopted by unanimous vote of the central committee.

Upon motion, the chairman was directed to arrange an itinerary for a joint discussion with all the opposition parties.

The central committee ordered further that a committee, consisting of Frank Davey, C. L. McNary and the county candidates, of which Chairman F. T. Wrightman was made ex-officio chairman, be charged with the duty of drafting suitable resolutions and a platform for the county campaign. The committee adjourned subject to the call of the chairman.

The workingmen's Republican club of Salem held its biennial meeting and elected the following officers:

President, S. A. Hughes; vice-president, C. A. Bort; secretary, B. F. West; treasurer, W. I. Staley; captain, Walter Lennon; color-bearer, C. A. Bort.

Addresses were made by L. D. Henry, S. B. Ormsby and E. H. Flag. The club adjourned to meet Monday evening, April 23d.
