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VERMONT REPUBLICANS

Will send an Uninstructed Delegation
to Philadelphia.

BURLINGTON, V. T., April 19.—The
Republican State Convention for the
election of four delegates and four al-
ternates to the National Republican Con-
vention, was held here and resulted in
the choice of General J. F. McCulloch, of
Burlington; Lieutenant Governor Hen-
ry C. Bates, of St. Johnsbury; Edward
Wells, of Burlington; and Lamont M.
Read, of Bellows Falls, as delegates.
The delegation was not instructed.

The resolutions reaffirmed allegiance
to "all the great historic principles for
which our party has stood from its
foundation as the consistent advocate
and champion" expressed belief in the
policy of protection, with such reciprocal
trade relations with friendly nations as
seem wise; favored the upbuilding and
protection of the American merchant
marine; an adequate and constantly
improving system of coast and har-
bor defenses; a firm, vigorous and
dignified foreign policy; the rea-
sonable regulation and restriction of
immigration; a just and lib-
eral administration of the pension laws;
the continual improvement and enlarge-
ment of the navy, an isthmian canal
under American control, and a cable
across the Pacific. The financial plank
pronounced "strongly and heartily in
favor of the maintenance of the single
gold standard." Concerning the re-
cently acquired islands, the platform
says:

"We believe that this country should
manfully accept and shoulder the in-
creased duties and responsibilities that
have come to it during the present ad-
ministration through the wish and free
choice of the people concerned in the
acquisition of the Hawaiian Islands,
through the fortunes of war and as the
fruits of the glorious achievements of
the American sailors and soldiers in the
island possessions that became ours by
the terms of our treaty with Spain.
"So long as any of the inhabitants of
any of these islands continue in acts of
insurrection against the authority of
the United States, it is the duty of the
government to establish there peace and
tranquillity."

THE FIRE HYDRANTS.

Insurance Agents Object to Reducing the
Number.

At a special meeting of the Salem
board of underwriters, held at the office
of Boise & Barker this morning, notice
was called to the possible action of a
committee appointed by the city council
at its last session, to consider the
hydrants throughout the city with a
view to dispensing with a number of them.

On motion of R. F. Boise, Jr., C. D.
Gabrielson and J. M. Taylor were ap-
pointed a committee, as representatives
of this association, to interview the com-
mittee of the council, to ascertain what
they are likely to take and they
propose to reduce the number of hydrants
or in any other way impair the efficiency
of the protection now afforded property
owners by the location of hydrants or
other means of securing a supply of
water for fire protection purposes; that
then the said committee protest against
such action and point out to the com-
mittee that the present rates of insur-
ance are based upon the efficient fire
protection now had, and that if the same
be in any way lessened an increase in
rates might be made.

It is possible that the insurance men
are kicking before they are spurred.

STATE BAND ASSOCIATION.

Will Be in Salem During the State
Fair--300 Musicians.

Chas. E. York, of Portland, and A. C.
Shute, of Hillsboro, president and
secretary, respectively, of the Oregon
State Band Association, are in this city,
and have closed arrangements with the
State Fair officials to hold their annual
meeting here during fair week. They
will bring 300 musicians here and on
Saturday day will concert in one grand
musical combination. These mu-
sicians will give concerts at the fair, will
have a daily parade and will also give a
concert here. They expect to arrange
to occupy tents on the grounds,
and are busy perfecting their arrange-
ments.

CASE DISMISSED.

Mrs. Joe Bassy Appears in Court and
is Discharged.

At two o'clock this afternoon Mrs. Joe
Bassy against whom her husband, Joe
Bassy had made a complaint charging
her with assault with a dangerous wea-
pon, appeared in Justice Johnson's court
for preliminary examination.

She had just sufficiently recovered
from the effects of last Sunday morn-
ing's fracas to be able to be out.

District Attorney Hayden appeared
for the state and asked that the case be
dismissed, which was done by Jus-
tice Johnson.

In addressing the court Hayden said
that the state witness, the husband of
the accused was reluctant to prosecute
the case, and the other witnesses to the
affair would be antagonistic to the state.
Under the circumstances he thought it
wiser to try to get out a case that would
justify the binding over of the ac-
cused.

This dismissal of the case in Justice
court will not preclude its prosecution
at the next term of the circuit court.

hands of the Boers.
