A. buildings at junctions and terminal points on their lines, that their employees might be provided with clean resorts for their leisure hours. This, merely as a business proposition. Their immense business properties are safe in the hands of men whose leisure hours are spent amid the wholesome environments of a Young Men's, Christian Association.

Citizens of Salem, we may not have the business sagacity of a railroad corporation to compute the value of our Y. M. C. A., in dollars and cents, but we, who have sons or brothers, who are, or ever will be interested directly in young men, can we consent to close the only resort on the streets of Salem open to young men, to which they would not be ashamed to take their mothers and sisters.

"If the verdict is to continue, we shall take immediate steps to secure a good all-around man competent to take charge of the physical as well as the secretarial department of our association. Such a man we endeavored to secure last year, but our efforts were fruitless, no such man being found that was available, but by beginning early we are confident we can find the man our association needs.

"Our present secretary has rendered faithful service, and he is anxious to have the association secure the kind of man needed to carry on our work most successfully.

The following communication is from the directors of the Salem Y. M. C. A. "Shall the Young Men's Christian Association of Salem close its doors? That is the question which we are compelled to put seriously to the people of Salem.

"In doing so, we feel it our duty to state plainly and frankly the exact condition of the association, a statement of which we herewith submit, believing that when the good people of this city realize that the Y. M. C. A. is actually in need, and has arrived at the point where it must have help, or close its doors, they will come to the rescue.

"The association debt, aside from the deficiency in current expenses, now consists of two notes, originally for \$700 each, the unpaid principal on each of which is now \$255. This debt is practically provided for by the holders of the notes who subscribe \$100 per year each to the Y. M. C. A. work, which amount is applied on their notes.

"The expense of running the association during the last three years was as follows:

1897 \$1,688.88
1898 2,063.88
1899 1,864.57

"Making a total of \$5627.32, from which, after deducting \$440, the expense of moving to the present quarters, the actual running expenses for the three years is seen to have been \$5187.32, or an average of \$1729.11 per year.

"Without a dollar in the treasury, our assets and liabilities are as follows:

Bills due and unpaid \$400
Estimated expenses May 1st to January 1, 1901 800

Total \$1200
"To meet this we have assets:

Pledges due during the year \$250
Estimated income from membership and night schools 200
Deficit \$150

Total \$1500
"This means we must have at least \$750 to carry us through the remainder of the year.

"The reason for this deficit lies, not in the fact that the canvass for subscriptions did not come up to past years, but in the fact that we cannot hold a membership contest this year, a means which before the novelty wore off, netted the association from \$500 to \$1200 per year.

"We are therefore compelled to resort to a new means for raising funds.

"Some one may say: 'The association ought to be self-sustaining, those who use the privileges ought to pay for them.' Were the Y. M. C. A. to charge a sufficient fee to pay the actual cost of the privileges it gives, it would bar from its doors the very ones whom it seeks to attract. If self-sustaining, it would be only a club available for the few who could afford to pay high rates.

"During the past winter we have conducted a first-class night school, with an enrollment of 37 students, most of whom are young men who work during the day and are anxious to have this opportunity for self-improvement.

"We have a well-equipped gymnasium, hot and cold shower and tub baths, a well-stocked reading room, open to the public; a library, parlors and game rooms, and everything that we can provide with the means at our disposal, to attract and instruct young men.

"The average daily attendance at our rooms since October last has been about 75 to 100; our present membership being about 175.

"The Y. M. C. A. is an antidote for the temptations thrown out to young men by the numerous pitfalls and disreputable places that infest this city, and if it accomplished nothing else would be worth many times its cost.

"We believe that the Y. M. C. A. is needed in Salem. We believe that it pays. As nearly everyone knows, there is no other place in this city provided for the use of young men where they can spend their evenings with profit.

"The people of Salem will be given an opportunity to say whether or not they think the Y. M. C. A. is worth maintaining. A mass meeting will be held in the first Methodist church next Sunday evening. Nearly all the churches have kindly consented to omit their evening service for that occasion.

"Secretary Stone, of the Portland association, will give a short address, good music will be provided, and every one who is interested in the welfare of the young men of this city is urged to be present.

New train service on the O. R. & N.

The double train service to be established between Portland and Chicago April 22, in which the O. R. & N., the Union Pacific and the Oregon Short Line are interested, will shorten the through time 21 hours. Train No. 2, leaving Portland at 9:15 a. m., beginning on the date named, will be known as the Chicago-Portland special. Its equipment will be new, making it fully the equal of any train now in service from the Pacific Coast to the east. It will consist of a mail-car, baggage-car, a library-car, a dining-car, two chair-cars, and a tourist sleeper. There will be but one change of cars to all Eastern points. The full time will be three days through to Chicago, or four days and two hours to New York.

The second train, known as No. 6, will leave Portland at 6:30 p. m., connecting at East Portland, with the Southern Pacific's overland train from San Francisco, and will carry through equipment to Chicago via the Union Pacific and the Chicago & Northwestern, and also the equipment for the Washington division of the O. R. & N., in connection with the Great Northern for St. Paul. This train will reach Spokane at 10 a. m. A dining-car will be furnished for breakfast into Spokane, and for dinner on corresponding train leaving Spokane at 5:45 p. m. The new schedule as arranged, will supply the most complete service ever furnished on the O. R. & N., as provides increased service in Eastern Oregon, where it is greatly needed, and gives immediate connection with the Washington division at Benton. At this point there is a large interchange of traffic, on account of the various mining districts of Baker County, the Coeur d'Alene, the Republic and Kootenai mining camps; Portland is greatly benefited by this change in as much as increased service is given from Eastern Oregon and Idaho.

No. 2, will arrive in Chicago in 9:30 a. m.; No. 6, at 7:45 a. m., as at present.

The Westbound train out of Chicago, corresponding with No. 2, is No. 1. This train will arrive in Portland at 4 p. m. The train corresponding with the east-bound No. 6, is No. 3, out of Chicago. This will reach Portland at 7:30 a. m. Westbound train No. 1, will leave Chicago at 9:30 p. m., and Omaha at 5:30 a. m. the following day. This time will be reduced two hours and 45 minutes. No. 3, westbound train will leave Chicago at 10:30 p. m., and Omaha at 4:25 p. m. the next day.

The service on the Union Pacific on all these trains include Buffet smoking, library cars, and dining cars. No. 6, will carry a daily ordinary sleeper to Kansas City, with change enroute to ordinary cars to Chicago.
