doubt as to his lapse from a perfectly
clear mentality.
Smith has been at the asylum before,
and his appearance indicated he had
been drinking. He will probably soon
be restored to his family.

NARROW ESCAPE

Mrs. D. A. White Takes Wrong Me-
dicine by Mistake.
Mrs. D. A. White, of North Salem,
had a narrow escape and suffered severely
for several hours, as a consequence of
taking internally some medicine in-
tended for external use. She had been
suffering from erysipelas and her phy-
sician had left some medicine to be ap-
plied internally and a lotion to be ap-
plied to the skin. Last evening, be-
ing somewhat worried and in haste, the
lady took a dose of the wrong medicine.
The doctor was summoned at once
and by midnight Mrs. White was re-
lieved, after suffering intensely. This
morning she was resting easily but had
not entirely recovered from the effects.

He Didn't Rubber

On further and exhaustive investiga-

State at Kroonstad today, Presi-
dent Steyn denounced Lord Roberts'
proclamation as "treachery," and de-
clared that as Great Britain's ob-
ject was their destruction their last hope
was to appeal to the civilized powers to
intervene.

AT DR. DALY'S HOME.

How Nomination for Congress Was Ie-
caved—Confident Election.

LAKEVIEW, Or., April 13.—Dr. B.
Daly's friends, irrespective of politics,
are congratulating him today on his
nomination for congress. All day yes-
terday and all this forenoon telegrams
were coming from the leaders of the
different factions requesting Dr. Daly to
accept the nomination.

He had declined to enter the field this
year for any office, but the pressure was
so great that he finally telegraphed his
friends that he would accept the nomina-
tion from the First Congressional
District if it should be given unani-
mously. The next telegram congratulated
him upon his unanimous nomination
and was signed by the leaders of the
three fusion parties. He said to a
reporter today:
"Yes, I am going to be elected to con-
gress from this district. I have not the
slightest doubt of it in the world."
Dr. Daly came to Lakeview in 1887
and since that time he has built himself
up from a stranger to one of the most
prominent men in the state. He stands
well at his own home. He has repre-
sented this district in both branches of
the legislature, and is and has been at
the head of educational matters in this
county for ten years.

He has filled the office of mayor of
the town, and has been county physi-
cian, and health officer for 10 years.
He has also been president of the Lake
county agricultural society, and its prin-
ciple promoter for a dozen years.
Although this county is largely Republi-
can, Dr. Daly has never failed to carry
it for any office to which he aspired.
