Y. M. C. A. RALLY

Business Men of Salem Discuss Ways and Means to Lift the Debt.

An Able Address Delivered by the State Secretary and a Big Audience at the M. E. Church.

F. A. Wiggins opened the ball on Sunday evening for the Y. M. C. A. rally at the Methodist church. He briefly presented the cause to the large audience that filled every seat.

Secretary Stone, of the association for the Northwest, spoke of the general work for social reforms, and especially of the temptations that beset young men who come from the country to the city.

He told of the material development of the organization, and stated that the railroad corporations were giving \$300,000 a year toward this work. This work was extended to all countries, and in some cities in heathen lands there were fine buildings dedicated to this purpose—something Salem could not boast of.

Young men who have to be kept must be provided good environment and be kept doing something good—the improvement of the body and the mind—development of physical, mental and spiritual. They were maintaining two schools to train men as physical directors. The purpose of this was to make better men physically to withstand the more strenuous life of today.

The gymnasium and hygienic body-building work of the association was the greatest means of saving men from vicious habits. He made a plea for extension of their night schools. He stated that 95 per cent of boys left school before the age of 14. The average night school fell off in attendance for want of good association and fellowship. The social side of life was the strongest factor in solving the problems of existence. The men paid from \$7 to \$20 a piece for a term at these night schools. Salem could have a night school with 200 students if we would support the Y. M. C. A.

The great weakness of the churches was that the members did not study the Bible. The Young Men's Christian Association was setting young men to work studying the word of God. He closed with an appeal for the Y. M. C. A. as a means of bringing men to a knowledge of Christ.

Before circulating the slips for subscriptions Mr. Dunnet offered a prayer for the prosperity of the past to be continued for the Salem association.

Mr. Damon made one of his happy and spirited addresses in behalf of liberal treatment. They had to raise \$750 and he called for \$25 subscriptions. A number of liberal Salemites had their names read as subscribing from \$25 to \$100 each. E. C. Cross, Jos. H. Albert joined the \$25 list. A number of \$15 men were added and then Mr. Damon woke up the laggards by asking them if they wanted this institution dropped out of the life of the city. A strong list of \$10 men were read off, and then several of the brethren doubled their money to help a very worthy institution. The crowd seemed to have come out mostly to hear what was to be said rather than add their name to the list.

The \$5 shots rattled in now like a discharge from a machine gun. The ladies showed their hands in this class and the conscience of more than one fair wearer of an Easter hat or Portland shopper asked her to the extent of letting go a quarter eagle.

Mrs. Kauffner addressed the audience briefly in behalf of the association and showed the interest that all women had in this work of social reform for the young men. Her appeal resulted in a volley of \$250 subscriptions from the Salem women.

The exercises closed with a few dozen \$1.00 subscriptions. \$310 was raised and in all \$930 is subscribed.

A BI-PARTISAN TICKET

Now Completed and Endorsed by the Reform Forces.

Populists Fill Vacancies on the Ticket—Leave Clerk and Recorder Blank.

The Marion county People's party central committee Saturday to fill blanks in the bi-partisan ticket nominated Geo. L. Brown, Populist of Stayton to fill vacancy caused by withdrawal of John A. Jeffrey for the legislature; T. I. McClelland, Populist, of Silverton for Assessor to take place of J. W. Hobart withdrawn; and J. J. Krapp, Republican, for county superintendent of schools, vice A. J. Garland, withdrawn.

The Populist committee refused to ratify the Democratic nominees for clerk and recorder and expressed the unanimous sentiment of their party to be for N. J. Judah for county judge as the nominee of a nonpartisan citizen's mass convention if such could be had and adopted a form of petition to that effect.

IN POPULIST COMMITTEE.
T. C. Jory offered a resolution to call a citizens' mass meeting to endorse a citizens' ticket. It called for certain pledges from candidates for the protection of the people. The ticket made was purely too much a partisan movement. It would be snowed under. It would result in a real citizen's movement. That was what the people wanted. Such a call would meet with many endorsers.

Mr. White of Monitor urged that they go ahead and complete the ticket. They could fill vacancies and make the ticket as full as possible.

Mr. Robertson said the convention two weeks ago had put out a ticket and endorsed it afterwards. An electors mass meet to get it on the ballot according to law.

After discussion the resolution was adopted as follows:
Form of Petition by Citizens of Marion County, State of Oregon, for a Non-Partisan Citizens' Convention:

We whose names are hereto annexed hereby unite in calling a citizens' convention to be held at Salem, Saturday, May 5, 1900, at 10 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of nominating candidates, or endorsing administration, thoroughly free from party political parties, who shall be pledged to follow:

First: Legislative candidates of unquestioned fitness, who have been endorsed by the several parties, may be endorsed by the Citizens' Convention on making, in writing, a personal pledge to support the Referendum Amendment to the State Constitution.

Second: Legislative candidates nominated by the Citizens' convention shall be pledged to support said Referendum Amendment, to make no anti-election promises of support to any senatorial candidate, and to refuse to enter any party caucus held for the purpose of selecting a party candidate for United States senator.

Third: Candidates nominated or endorsed by the Citizens' convention for the office of county judge and county commissioner shall pledge, in writing, to give the county a just and economical business administration, thoroughly free from partisanship in the selection of judges and clerks of election.

Fourth: All other candidates whether nominated or endorsed, shall be pledged in writing to a non-partisan, economical and efficient administration of their several offices.

It is further recommended that all persons who desire to secure for any candidate either the nomination or endorsement of the Citizens' convention be prepared to present to said convention satisfactory proof of the special fitness of said candidate.

All citizens of the county, irrespective of past or present political affiliations, and especially all Republicans who favor a strictly non-partisan, economical and efficient business administration of county affairs, are hereby most cordially invited to attend and take part in the proceedings of the Citizens' convention.

TICKET COMPLETED.
On motion it was decided to take up and act on the ticket made by the Democrats.

E. Hofer, J. B. Dimick and J. W. Jory asked to have their nominations on the legislative ticket declared vacant to leave the committee free to act.

Geo. L. Brown of Stayton, Dr. Swanik of Astoria and Geo. W. Weeks were voted on to fill the vacancy in place of J. A. Jeffrey. Mr. Brown was nominated the nomination of Hon. J. B. Dimick, A. B. Hudson and E. Hofer were filed by the committee.

Mr. Hofer stated that he approved the referendum amendment but could not accept the legislative nomination unless a citizen's ticket was completed of an entirely non-partisan character.

Prof Jory nominated Judge N. J. Judah as a clean, competent and gentlemanly official, who would be elected if nominated. The county was bigger than the city of Salem and had a right

POLITICS AND POISON.

The Citizens' Ticket in Multnomah County in Danger.

The Citizens' ticket in Portland is threatened with disintegration from the quarters. D. P. Thompson, on the legislative ticket, threatens to resign, and Dr. A. C. Smith, also on the legislative ticket, is dangerously ill with blood poisoning. Dr. Smith was performing an operation Saturday, when his instrument slipped, inflicting a slight wound on one finger. Symptoms of blood poisoning set in that evening. A consultation of ten or twelve physicians has been held; the finger was amputated; but the patient is in a very critical condition.

ITALIAN PRUNES ALL RIGHT.
Liberty Neighborhood Reports Prospects Better Than Expected.

Postmaster W. W. Stephens, of Liberty, in company with Grove Hemley, yesterday visited quite a number of prune orchards and they report finding Italian prunes in unexpected quantities. The late blooms, it appears, have very generally fertilized, and this insures considerable of a crop of itself. The two gentlemen estimate that with the other varieties this will give all the dryers in that section more than they can do to handle the crop.

Misunderstanding Corrected.
There seems to be a misunderstanding among the people of Englewood and Howell precincts as to the location of the boundary between the two. The boundary line follows the west fork of Pudding river and the country between the west and middle forks is in Howell precinct. In registering at the clerk's office, many living between the two forks have given their precinct as Englewood, instead of Howell, and some of the delegates to the county conventions from Englewood have been residents of this strip in Howell precinct. This is liable to result in complications, and the location of this boundary should be better understood by those living between the west and middle forks of Pudding river.
