A CITIZENS' MOVEMENT.

May Still Materialize in Marion County
for County Offices.

Rank and File of all Parties Demand
a Non Partisan Mass
Convention.

The action of the Populist County Central Committee in filling vacancies on the Democratic Citizens' ticket meets with general approval.

The Democratic committee would have preferred an endorsement of their candidates for county clerk, county recorder, and county judge and were disappointed at not getting it. But the fact remains that a large following in the Populist party, besides practically all the committee favored endorsing County Clerk Hall, not because of his Republicanism, but to set the example of approving a faithful official.

There is the same feeling among a large number of Republicans towards Sheriff Durbin. They believe he should be upheld in a fearless, faithful discharge of the duties of his office and will so vote on election day.

The Democratic nominee for recorder was a fine young man but admitted that he stood little show of election, and the people generally have no desire for a change in the efficient conduct of that office.

For school superintendent all admit that no better man was ever named than Prof J. J. Krappe and all concede that as an educator pure and simple and standing on an independent citizen's ticket he would stand a good show of election.

The action of the People's Party central committee, which was taken purely as citizens, and not in their political capacity, towards holding a Citizens' non partisan mass convention to name a county ticket shows the sincerity of the leaders of the Peoples' party in demanding an independent ticket stripped of all party machinery, men to be put in to serve all the people to the best of their ability. The rank and file of the Democratic party and a great many others want that kind of a ticket.

Talks with some of the Democratic leaders indicate that they are favorable to accepting the invitation to join in that kind of a movement. One prominent Democrat, who holds a high office, says: "If I could not go before a Citizens' mass convention and be nominated I would not want a nomination and could not expect an election."

TO BREAK FIRST GROUND.

The Odd Fellows, of Salem, Will Officially Begin Work On Their Temple.

Work will begin on the new Odd Fellows Temple on Thursday of this week, which is the 33rd anniversary of the order in the United States. This ceremony of breaking the first ground will be performed by Chemeketa Lodge officers, or some past grand master of the order. The details of the program will be perfected at the regular meeting on Wednesday evening, after which full particulars will be made known, and the public invited to witness the ceremony. This will be one of the greatest events in the history of the order in this section.

This afternoon the site is being surveyed and the corners established by A. Gobalet, the surveyor; Erickson & Van Patton, the contractors; and Gray & Lugh, the architects.

HEAVY FLOODS DOWN SOUTH

LOUISVILLE, Ky., April 24.—The rains continue throughout the flood districts of the South, and danger to lives and property is becoming more grave. It was thought Saturday the crisis was passed, but in many localities there have been heavy rains since. It was estimated last Saturday that \$3,000,000 worth of private property had already been destroyed, and it is now thought probable this damage will be heavily increased.

Mail and telegraphic communications have been destroyed between the smaller towns in Mississippi and Alabama. Many farm-houses have been swept away, their occupants barely escaping with their lives and the drowning of a family of seven negroes is reported from Jackson, Mississippi.

The first district is roughly bounded by a line drawn from Mobile up the Tombigbee to the center of the State of Alabama, then west through Jackson, Miss., to the Mississippi River. Around Columbia, Miss., every railroad and wagon bridge is reported washed away, and first crops are a total loss. At Enterprise, Miss., the water stands five feet in the houses and stores.

At Meridian, Mississippi, the water is reported at six feet in the streets, and rising. Timber and buildings are reported destroyed at Ellenville, Meridian, De Soto and throughout the Bayou Pierre district, in Mississippi, and numerous small points in Alabama report great damage.

Trains on railroads into New Orleans which have not been abandoned entirely are running only in the daylight, owing to the dangerous condition of the track. The Louisville and Nashville New Orleans line, which was in fair condition until last evening, is now cut in two by the destruction of a four-span bridge over the West Pascagoula river, near Scranton.

Arrangements have been made to ferry passengers across the break. Thousands of people in the small water-bound towns of Mississippi are reported on the brink of starvation.

NEW ORLEANS, La., April 24.—Conditions in the flooded sections of Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama show some improvement.

JAPANESE TO STOP COMING

WASHINGTON, April 24.—Information has reached Washington to the effect that the Japanese government itself, and without waiting a request from the United States, is about to take steps to restrict the immigration of Japanese coolies to the United States. It is asserted that the figures relative to this immigration have been magnified and that as a matter of fact, there are not more than about 15,000 to 16,000 Japanese within the limits of the United States, outside of Hawaii. It is said that such immigration has lately occurred has resulted entirely from the competition of the two great Japanese immigration societies; that the laborers have been practically brought here under the decision that there were untold opportunities for work at great wages. The Japanese government is interested in protecting its people from the hard-bitten results from such importations, and that is the reason it intends to establish restriction upon the outward flow.
