PURBLIND PARTISANSHIP.

When the conference of the Populist and Democratic central committees was over Saturday the only two party spokesmen who were agreed and perfectly satisfied with their own conclusions were two very worthy citizens and friends of ours—George Allen, Democrat, and John P. Robertson, Populist. Mr. Allen had made the brilliant remark that any pretension to non-partisanship was evidence of a lack of brains, and Mr. Robertson stated there was no such thing as a non-partisan business administration of public affairs possible. And having agreed, these two conservators of political wisdom fell upon each other's necks and wept over the perversity and lack of harmony produced by not accepting their enlightened and progressive dictum.

Pulver Judge, N. J. Judah, had just appeared before the conference and declined a party nomination and had stated that he had not been identified with any party movement for twelve years, had been absolutely an independent, and was elected to office as such. He has given this city for two years an absolutely non-partisan business administration of city affairs, so far as lies in the power of one man. What is more, strong Populists, Republicans, Democrats and Unionists, have for the past two years laid aside their partisanship and given this city the same kind of service as Mr. Judah has. This accomplished feat will weigh far more in the minds of thinking persons than the antiquated theories of purblind partisanship advocated by non-regressive politicians.

What the people of Marion county want is to free the county government from the party pull of the past, that no few public officials of any party have been able to resist. The better class of Republicans want that. The rank and file of the Democratic party and all of the People's party want that. They want county officials to be above the clamor of the spoils element, above the terror of the machine, FREE TO SERVE THE PEOPLE without party dictation. It has got so that a bicycle path cannot be built without forcing one of their expensive pets on the county board. The people want a county court freed from these methods and to employ the man to do the work regardless of the McKisley or the Bryan push. The world do progress. Business methods are improving. Journalism is improving. Politics of our grandfathers

don't go down. The people can get all of that they want in the Republican party, and have to fight that party and often defeat its horses and its candidates because it does not recognize progressive principles. The world do move, in spite of the assertions of Brothers Jousing Allen and Robertson. The people want a citizen's ticket put up in the right way, free from all partisan trammels and factions of the past. The bi-partisan ticket that has been made is clean and able as a ticket, and if it is nominated in an open election, it is a meeting and relieved of all party dictation, so that county officials elected will be free to give the people an absolutely non-partisan business administration, such as we have not had, but must have to secure reforms that shall be lasting and of any value to the people, it can still be elected in spite of the factious clamors of advocates of party harmony. There is no reform in the purblind party cry of government for party or parties. Government must be for the people. Reform must be for reform's sake.

QUAY DETHRONED.

By a vote of 33 to 32 the great Republican, Matthew Stanley Quay, of Pennsylvania, was refused a seat in the United States senate to which he was appointed by the governor of that state after a deadlock which all the corrupt influence and administration present could not break. Mr. Quay has treated the Pennsylvania senatorship as his personal property, very much as certain losses in Oregon treat those offices in this state.

The senate has engaged in two good house cleanings, the rejection of Clark, of Montana, a Democrat, who bought the office with Republican votes, and now a Republican who has held his power by virtue of cold cash taken from the people's treasury. The Lawn and Flowers.

The planting of the lawn and the bedding of the flowers is just as important in its way as the arrangement of a pleasing picture by the artist. The color-scheme, perspective, fitness of color and arrangement are as important an undertaking as the make-up of a good picture. Plants that are coarse and have brilliant blooms and foliage are like people who dress gorgeously, they look better at a distance, those having more delicate coloring and foliage, under a closer observation. One can make a perfect maze and a source of constant surprise of a small town lot or two by a careful study of arrangements of shrubs and trees. Plant a bed of shrubs or a tree to shut off an unpleasant view of a barn or outbuilding in a dining room window to obscure whatever may prove unwholesome. The kitchen door or window can be surrounded by vines and bed of annuals to keep up the cheerful spirits of the good housekeeper.

We cannot give too much attention to our native shrubs and every yard in the state ought to boast of at least two or three, say, the wild current, grape, and some variety of the spirea as well as all the others one can make room for. Don't omit the lilies nor a few of the ever-green shrubs.

The early spring and late fall colorings of foliage has as much to do with the beauty of shrubs and trees as do the flowers. It is a good plan to carefully work these or bear in mind their particular style, and in the fall or spring a id them to your collection.

If every one would turn camera fiend and he offered a large sum for the best and most artistic view of their home and surroundings, they would be surprised to find out what homely, unglorious, hideous things they had been living in. You know the camera never tells a lie.

Make a habit of taking the pruning shears with you, to cut off a dead limb here and pluck out a "sucker" there. Don't get in the habit of breaking off flowers, such as roses or any other blooms, as it tears the vines and often destroys a whole plant by lifting it from the roots.

Learn to love your plants and watch their peculiarities. Observe that plants with a smooth, glossy foliage will reflect the same texture in the bloom, while those having a hairy appearance will give to the flower either a soft, velvety appearance, or the peculiar hairy effect. Notice that all climbing vines never bear flowers on stiff, upright vines. By keeping up these little studies your own dooryard will be a never-ending source of pleasure.

Economical Floor Covering.

Those who live in rented houses where the floors are of pine, well sprinkled with unsightly knots and rough spots, are often puzzled to decide what to use as a floor covering outside the margin of the central rug. The carpet-filler is expensive because so perishable, every spot showing quickly on its plain surface. Drums of strong, firm quality wear longer and show soil less. It has the advantage also of costing only a small fraction of the price of the filler. Of course it would hardly answer as a background for a choice rug, but where the material is a rug, or linoleum, or it is of the home-made bit-or-mix variety, the denim surface, provided the colors harmonize, will be entirely suitable. The denim may be had in shades of dull blue and brown.

Appetizing Diet.

The fine flavor of French cooking is due to their careful use of herbs, combining them in many cases until the flavor is so delicate that no one perceives them. Among herbs most common are sage, summer savory, sweet marjoram, parsley, thyme, chives, tarragon, sweet basil and rue. These can all be bought at the grocers, but a corner in your garden devoted to them gives the housekeeper opportunity to use them fresh from the garden, hence the more delicate their flavor.

TAX REDUCTION PROGRAM

TO WHICH THE CITIZENS' CANDIDATES FOR THE COUNTY COURT

Will be Pledged if They Accept the Nominations Made at Salem Saturday

The Citizens' ticket contains the names of two excellent citizens for county judge and commissioner—W. W. Elder of Station, and W. W. Culver of Liberty. Mr. Elder is a successful business man from the eastern side of the county, a man who will defend the interests of the farmers. Mr. Culver is one of the model farmers and business men in the county.

Following plan for reducing taxes and putting Marion county on a sound financial basis was adopted by the convention:

Whereas, The total amount of taxes collected in Marion county for the past four years amounts to \$621,052, as against \$605,794 for the four years preceding, while the value of property have been constantly diminishing, we pledge the county judge and commissioner nominated on the citizens' ticket to reduce the total amount of cash taken from the people annually for the next four years instead of increasing the amount any further.

We pledge the candidates for the county commission's court nominated on this citizens' ticket to put the county on a cash basis at the earliest possible date, by ordering the prompt collection of taxes when they become due, by reducing the rate of interest on the county debt by the use of money at four per cent if the same can be obtained.

We pledge the candidates for county judge and commissioner to conduct the affairs of the county on a business basis and on a strictly non-partisan basis. Whereas, County and state taxes have been constantly increasing, we pledge the citizens' county court to reduce taxes as far as they are in their well-governed control adjacent to Marion, and that they shall pledge themselves in writing to this effect.

We pledge the citizens' legislative ticket to later to reduce the state tax materially.

WEATHER AND CROPS

Official Bulletin of Conditions in Oregon.

GENERAL SUMMARY.

PORTLAND, April 23.—But little rain has fallen during the week, which opened and closed pleasant and mellowing with an intermediate period of from two to three days of cloudy and threatening weather. It has averaged about 4 degrees warmer than last week and the season has been made principally in the daytime rather than at night, as in some sections the nights have even been cooler than they were last week. The day temperatures in Western Oregon ranged between 54 and 80 degrees and in Eastern Oregon between 48 and 74 degrees, while the nights over the entire State varied only between 34 and 49 degrees.

The beginning of the week was the warmest, and the coolest weather occurred during its closing days, which were marked by frosts in all sections of the state. How damaging these frosts were it is too early to yet determine, but it is thought that they have not done very much harm, as in most sections they were light and were followed by a fog, which shielded vegetation from a too sudden change in temperature. Spring seeding is now well advanced and corn planting has begun. The ground is moist to its surface and everything is growing fast.

Winter wheat and all kinds of grass continue thrifty and promising. Hops are doing nicely and the fruit prospects continue about the same, the damage by the late frosts being confined mostly to peaches, cherries, plums and Italian prunes. The latter and silver varieties of prunes have suffered, but little damage and give promise of good yields. Apple trees and strawberries are in full bloom, and the latter will be in the market in a week or two. The wool clip is large and fine. Gardens are doing nicely.

WILLAMETTE VALLEY.

Tangent, Linn county, J. H. Scott.—Fall grain is looking fine, although the average is small. Little spring grain has been sown up to this time, as cloudy and showery weather has prevented the ground from drying. Fruit prospects are excellent. Cherries and prunes are setting on the trees nicely, while apples and other late fruit are now in full bloom. Frosts did no perceptible damage.

Hubbard, Marion county, M. G. Sen.—The weather favorable for all crops during last week. Fall and early spring grain are making an extraordinary growth, and much seed was sown. Potato planting is in progress. Fruit is doing very well and promises to be a large crop. Apples nearly in bloom. Hops are high enough to train, and most yards are here will be worked as thoroughly as usual.

Engle, Lane county, J. G. Stevenson.—Fine growing weather for spring seedings and pastures. Spring seedings going forward slowly. Fruit of all kinds has been badly damaged by cold rains; Italian prunes and cherries have been the most damaged. Apples are hurt some, but think there will be a full crop.

Liard, Clackamas county, S. C. Wright.—Fall wheat is turning yellow on account of rain. Wheat aphid is very bad on the blades; also a small black fly on the leaves, which is doing much damage. Spring seedings are progressing slowly on low land.
