A PRO-BOERS SERMON.

Continued From Fourth Page.

sion or conquest is utterly repugnant to Christian religion, and those engaged in such war proclaim in acts which can not be misinterpreted that they are heathen.

I remember a little over two years ago, the suffering of the people of Cuba were brought to our knowledge. We had known of it before, now it was forced upon our consciousness until we really suffered with the Cubans. Then there came a voice raised demanding that the wrong be righted and calling upon the president of the United States to interfere, if need be, with an armed force. These efforts seemed in vain; but more and more united, until at last the voice of the people in Washington, every paper echoed the cry, every pulpit resounded with sermon and prayer, and the wrong was righted. I call this incident to your minds to prove to you that even the president must listen, if enough say the same thing and say it often enough.

Now what more and more of the people of the United States are demanding is that the war between England and the Boers cease, and cease too with no change in the form of government for the Transvaal and Orange Free State and they are also demanding that the government of the United States in the interest of outraged humanity protest. When we were weaker than we are now, we protested in the case of Hungary, of Greece, of Crete, of Armenia, of the South American republics, and our protests were heeded, Cuba appealed for help and in answering the appeal we showed a strength both on sea and land that surprised the world.

Now as never before, does the world listen to what America has to say; now our voice is far more influential in the councils of Christendom than ever before. A solemn, earnest and determined demand from the United States, that the peace conference at the Hague be something more than a farce, will have weight that no utterance from Washington has ever had before. We are told that such a protest would be ineffective, would be discountenanced, might involve us in trouble. These considerations have never prevented protest before; why should we be restrained now? A strong protest from the United States, the only friend which Great Britain possesses; backed as it would be by a protest from European powers, would have great weight with the English government, which cannot afford to disregard the voice of the civilized world. And the voice of the people of the civilized world, in the interest of the highest civilization, is, cease a war which will cost an immense treasure and a fearful loss of life, to the lasting injury both of the English and the Boers—and the good of no one.

We have contradictory reports from South Africa as to the social condition of the Boers. No worse opinion can be formed of them than was entertained of the Americans, by the French, about the time of our war for independence, as evidenced by a letter of Tallyrand. But we are not concerned with the question of civilization. All that concerns us is that two republics, perhaps quite unlike our republics, but governments erected by the Boers, with which they are content and for which they are willing to pour out their blood and spend their treasure; that two republics are struggling to maintain their existence. We may rightly think that English civilization is a great improvement on Boer civilization; but the Boers do not want it, and he that great republic to help them. Have we no duties as a republic? Does the status of Liberty enlightening the world mean nothing as it stands at the threshold of this century? That the Boers are in earnest in this matter is proved by the fact that old men and children and women are fighting side by side to defeat the British. Such unanimity has never been seen anywhere for a long time. Surely the Boers have something which they prize dearer than life; and we know that it is neither the diamonds of Kimberley nor the gold of the Rand. It is the same for which we fought Great Britain; an independent government, the right to live our own life after our own fashion. We are told that the Boers stand in the way of the progress of civilization in Africa. What voice from Heaven tells us this? What voice of this live in the assertions of those who covet Boer gold and jewel? Then the question may be asked, have we the right to remove what we feel stands in the path of civilization? Civilization is something which man can give or withhold; it is a matter of growth under higher than human law. No nation has any right to declare: "I am the God-appointed civilization of the world."

world." Nor has any people the right to claim that their social state is, above all other social states, truly civilized.

We know that the Boers have virtues possessed neither by English nor Americans. To be sure, their civilization is not like ours; but when one takes an impartial view of society either in America or Europe, can we honestly feel very proud of that social condition? With crowded penitentiaries, reform schools, insane asylums, with armies of tramps, with thousands of saloons and hundreds of thousands of liquor-imbruted men and women, with homes of prostitutes abounding in every town, none of which eye sores are found in the Transvaal; can we afford to boast much of our civilization? Will the introduction of railroads and labor-saving machinery compensate South Africa for the social evils which belong to what we call civilization? Nor can we say much in favor of a civilization which spends millions of pounds in a war of conquest, and cannot afford to save the starving population of India from death. Families have always abounded among the Hindus, we are told. English civilization should prevent mothers from selling girls into Mohammedan harems for a few cents with which to buy food for a few days longer. Before wasting money for war, it is the duty of a nation to feed its own hungry people.

The bait which is attracting the English is the great gold reef of the Rand and the great diamond bed of Kimberley. But for these, the Boers would have remained unmolested. It is to secure absolute possession of these two greatest wealth producers of the world that the armies of Great Britain have gathered in South Africa. It is a war of humanity against gold. Can any one hesitate where to take his stand? Unless tainted by commercial greed, without honor, without mercy, we must side with humanity. Have we sunk so low that we value gold more than human beings? Has greed of gain rendered us deaf to the cry for help? If so, then we are nearing the time when as a republic we shall be lost to sight.

It has been said by a deep thinker that more is involved in this South African war than appears at first sight; that the fate of all republics is trembling in the balance. If they are so cankered by mammon-worship that they are not interested in one another, then the experiment of republicanism is a failure, and it is certain that they will be succeeded by monarchy in some form. Whereas, if they stand together, monarchy will disappear in Great Britain, and a movement toward a government by the people will gain greater force, and all the monarchies will rapidly pass away.

One thing is very certain, the Boers are ready to make any sacrifice to preserve their nationality, their religion, their autonomy, and they are made of that stuff that never yielded to king nor priest. Through their veins runs the blood of these heroes, pre-eminent among heroes, who sacrificed the fruits of years of toil, who opened the dikes of Holland and let in the North Sea, destroying not only the Spanish troops but their own fertile lands and flourishing villages; and of those Hugenots who to preserve religious liberty left home and fortune and emigrated to foreign lands. The Dutch and French ancestors of the Boers never yielded, and these Boers will emulate the bravery and heroism of their ancestors.

The effect on England of the death of her strongest, brightest and best, the very flower of her youth, is frightful to contemplate. The continental nations are only just recovering from the effects of those Napoleonic wars which destroyed them physically and intellectually the best. All nations are bound together, and each is in some respect responsible for the others. So we are responsible for national degradation which we can prevent, and it is our duty to intervene.

And we should be especially interested in the Boers, for the Boers, the Spanish inquisition would still rule Europe. But for a Dutchman, William of Orange, the English people would hardly have won the freedom they now enjoy.

Express your sympathy with the Boers often enough and the administration will heed the popular cry. Action is near at hand, and the administration cannot afford to antagonize the mass of the voters. Let a cry go up from every city and village in the land, and the government will find a way.

to preach Great Britain. Even should the government fail in its duty, yet the persistent out-cry, presented every day and voiced now by one and now another, will be read by the people of England, who are no fools, and will strengthen the peace party, which comprises some of the best men and women in Great Britain.

May all Christians throughout the world, who value the teachings of Christ more than worldly prosperity, who really believe in the Easter triumph of light over darkness, of love over hate, of spirit over matter, unite in a continued, unvaried and energetic protest against this most un-Christian war, nor cease until the Great Republic, greatest of all the nations in wealth, in military strength, shall emphatically declare that the South African Republics must be allowed the same freedom which in our weakness France has lost as to secure. The hope of the Boers rests on the action of the United States. May that action be taken which shall benefit equally both of the belligerents, which shall bless the English equally with the Boers; and in time to come both parties will return thanks to that nation which coined the teaching of that Prince of Peace, whom both profess to love and honor.
