PASSION PLAY IN SALEM

Moving Pictures at the First M. E. Church Tuesday May 1.

Before introducing the Passion Play a lot of war pictures are presented—bombardments, the forts, and the debarbing of the army at Baalrub; training the Rough Riders, etc. Some very attractive humorous pictures are also given. The high divers are so realistic that you can hear the water splash; and in the run of the New York fire department you can hear the clang of the bells, with a lively imagination. The Express wishes that all might see the exhibition for the purpose of stimulating inquiry into the wonderful secrets of electricity and applied science, if there were no higher lesson in the incidents of the life of Jesus.
