A HARD NUT.

Pardon Granted to a Well-Known Character of the Coast.

Governor Greer has granted a full pardon to John C. Manning, of Marshfield, who was convicted in May, 1895, of arson and has served a five-year sentence. The pardon, which was asked for by many of the prominent citizens of Coos county, restores him to the rights of citizenship.

Manning is an old sailor and one of the "characters" of Coos Bay, and during his variegated career has sustained enough hard knocks to kill half a dozen ordinary men.

He was washed off of Tillamook Rock when the light house was being constructed there, being then in the employ of the government, but the surf and rocks could make no impression on him and the ocean was glad to get rid of him again.

He has a scar diagonally across his nose, the reminder of a blow that would have finished any one but Johnny Manning.

He fell from one of the small passenger steamers in the bay, one day, while intoxicated, and was not missed. Fortunately some ladies upon the "look-out" at Empire City, three miles away were watching the boat through a field glass, and saw him go. They made their way down town, and told what they had seen. Some men put out in a boat and met Manning as he came floating down with the tide. He had on a heavy overcoat and as he lay quietly facedownward, the back and shoulders of the coat retained air enough to float him, his body and head being completely submerged. He had been in that condition for over half an hour, when pulled out. He was taken to the dock and rolled over a barrel. To illustrate his reputation at that time, an insurance agent heard the news at the stage above indicated, and instantly replied, "well, tell them I'll insure him for 10 per cent."

A few minutes later the drowned man showed signs of life and in a day or two he was as good as new.

PORTO RICO TARIFF.

Republicans justify Their Vote to impose Tariffs on American Territory.

The Dallas Chronicle contained the following: Senator Simon says the overwhelming sentiment of his people compels him to vote against the Puerto Rican tariff bill. Malcolm A. Moody voted for the bill. Since then Republican conventions have been held in ten counties out of sixteen in his district, and if from these one single vote will go to the congressional convention against Mr. Moody, there is not a man in Oregon knows it. The senator had better put his ear to the ground again.

Referring to the above Senator McBride telegraphs as follows:

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 10, 1900. HONORABLE SEN. E. C. CHANDLER: I am gratified to learn that Republicans of Eastern Oregon sustain the vote of an overwhelming majority of the Republican senators and Republican representatives in congress on the tariff bill. I voted for the bill because it is right. It removes 85 per cent of the duties now in force and empowers the Puerto Rican legislature to substitute its own system of revenue for the temporary measure provided in the tariff. I cannot believe the people of Oregon desire me to vote against the only practicable measure of relief for the distressed people of Puerto Rico nor to impose upon these impoverished people the burden of our own internal revenue and war revenue taxes instead of the very low tariff left in effect by the bill supported by the Republican majority. I am not disposed to accept the advice nor to follow the leadership of the democratic party either on constitutional or economic questions. Geo. W. McBride.
