HOUSEHOLD SERVICE ON THE

INSTALLMENT PLAN.

A number of Salem ladies have established a circuit for doing kitchen work on the installment plan. A Chinaman comes one or two hours in the day and does up the work, while the lady of the house does the cooking and prepares the salads and desserts. This relieves her of the heaviest drudgery. So with other work.

It seems that such a circuit plan of doing kitchen work, or other house work could be planned for having the work done by white or colored help as well as Chinese.

A woman or man who would establish a circuit for the day and put in say eight or ten hours, divided into one or two hour sections, could find employment and families could pay say 50 cents an hour per week, or five families would not one person from \$4 to \$6 a week.

Washing is done on this plan. Laundry goes from house to house and wash and iron. Mending could be done on the same plan, as could be dusting and cleaning. What is needed is a woman with the patience and intelligence to organize the circuit and organize the work on the new basis.

The dish washing and the preparing of meats, fish, vegetables and fruit, in fact all the rough dirty work could thus be done for a number of households by competent persons, who could have their own home and family life and thus become useful and self-respecting helpers.

There is general inquiry why the convicts are not worked more on the roads under the Leoney bill. Supt. Lee and Gov. Geer seem to think they cannot do anything for want of an appropriation to buy more teams and machinery. As most of the roads at this season need repairing it would seem that a gang of men with pick and shovel and wheelbarrows could put many a mile of road in order. The people would like to see at least the roads leading to and from the state institutions in the city put in first-class order. The state owns so much property that it is impossible to keep up those roads out of taxes because the state pays none. The people and especially the farmers would like to see a little more done under the Leoney law the next few months if it is only patching up the bad places. The law is liberal in its terms and was one of the best acted last session. The governor should stretch his authority a little in this matter if necessary.
