FRUIT GROWERS MEET.

Indications That Marion County Fruit Will Be Pooled.

Saturday's Conference Resulted in Many Contracts Being Signed With Cured Fruit Association.

The meeting of the prune growers in this city Saturday gave indication that the fruit of this vicinity will be handled this season by the Northwestern Cured Fruit Association.

The meeting was held in the Circuit court room at the court house and about 50 growers were present. President William Galloway and Secretary H. E. Doach of the Cured Fruit Association were present and talked over with the growers the question of putting their fruit with the pool.

Chairman Daniel Webster, of Rose-dale called the meeting to order and briefly outlined what had been done.

H. E. Doach then addressed the meeting explaining the object of the association and its method of procedure.

As has been explained in The Journal, the growers are asked to sign contracts turning over to the association all their dried fruit and giving the association absolute control of the same.

In answer to questions, which were freely asked, Mr. Doach said that, under the present plan, each grower could pack and store his own fruit, but in that case the packing must be done under the supervision of an association inspector.

The association will put its brand upon every package of cured fruit shipped by it, and its inspectors must, therefore, have personal knowledge that every box of fruit is exactly as it is represented to be. The growers could pack the fruit with their own labor or hire the men to do it, but the association must see that it is done right in every instance, for if one man should turn over to the association poor fruit and it should be shipped, the reputation of all association fruit would suffer.

It was also explained that growers may sell their fresh fruit to canneries or for consumption fresh to any person, whether he be a member of the association or not; but the growers who belong to the combine must not sell to evaporators unless the evaporators are also members of the association.

Mr. Doach also said that he has received many letters from buyers who wish to handle the fruit represented by the association.

The growers present seemed to be very favorably impressed, and many signed contracts at the meeting, while others took contracts away with them to sign and turn in later.

New train service to the

O. R. & N.

The double train service to be established between Portland and Chicago April 22, in which the O. R. & N., the Union Pacific and the Oregon Short Line are interested, will shorten the travel time to 11 hours. Train No. 2, leaving Portland at 9:15 a. m., beginning on the date named, will be known as the Chicago-Portland special. Its equipment will be new, making it fully the equal of any train used to service from the Pacific Coast to the east. It will consist of a mail-car, baggage-car, a library-composite car, a first-class Pullman sleeper, a dining-car, two chair-cars, and a tourist sleeper. There will be but one change of cars to all Eastern points. The full time will be three days through to Chicago, or four days and two hours to New York.

The second train, known as No. 6, will leave Portland at 6:30 p. m., connecting at East Portland, with the Southern Pacific's overland train from San Francisco, and will carry through equipment to Chicago via the Union Pacific and the Chicago & Northwestern, and also the equipment for the Washington division of the O. R. & N., in connection with the Great Northern for St. Paul. This train will reach Spokane at 10 a. m. A dining-car will be furnished for breakfast into Spokane, and for dinner on corresponding train leaving Spokane at 3:45 p. m. The new schedule as arranged, will supply the most complete service ever furnished on the O. R. & N., as provides increased service in Eastern Oregon, where it is greatly needed, and gives immediate connection with the Washington division at Pendleton. At this point there is a large interchange of traffic, on account of the various mining districts of Baker County, the Coeur d'Alene, the Republic and Kootenai mining camps. Portland is greatly benefited by this change in as much as increased service is given from Eastern Oregon and Idaho.

No. 2, will arrive in Chicago in 9:30 a. m.; No. 6, at 7:45 a. m., as at present.

The Westbound train out of Chicago, corresponding with No. 2, is No. 1. This train will arrive at Portland at 4 p. m. The train corresponding with the east-bound No. 6, is No. 3, out of Chicago. This will reach Portland at 7:30 a. m. Westbound train No. 1, will leave Chicago at 9:30 p. m., and Omaha at 8:20 a. m., the following day. The time will be reduced two hours and 45 minutes. No. 3, westbound train will leave Chicago at 10:30 p. m., and Omaha at 3:25 p. m., the next day.

The service on the Union Pacific on all these trains include Buffet-smoking-library cars, and dining cars. No. 6, will carry a daily ordinary sleeper to Kansas City, with change enroute to ordinary cars to Chicago.
