MR. HART REPLIES.

States His Qualifications for the Office of District Attorney.
 DALLAS, Ore., May 4, 1900.
 EDITOR JOURNAL: In justice to myself and those who nominated me, I desire to correct some statements that have been made in your columns regarding my candidacy for the office of district attorney. I do not think these statements were made through malicious motives, but rather from a misapprehension of facts; and, therefore, presume that you will accord me space for a statement of the facts.

It has been urged against me that I am very young, too young, to hold the office of District Attorney. You are thirty-one years of age, and have been a resident of this district for fifteen years. Mr. Jeffrey my opponent, is also thirty-one years of age, but has resided in this district less than two years.

Again, it has been said that I am just out of school and have never had a case in court. The records show that I passed the required examination before our supreme court and was admitted to the bar in 1895. My opponent was also admitted in 1895, hence you are mistaken when you say that he has been a practicing lawyer for 10 years. You are also mistaken when you say that he was prosecuting attorney for four years. My experience in the law includes both criminal and civil cases; and I have practiced in all state courts, Justice, County, Circuit, and Supreme, and also in the Federal Court, in all of which I have had reasonably good success. If any one doubts these statements, let him consult the records of the courts. As to my ability as a lawyer, I am willing to leave that to my clients, to the attorneys who have been associated with me, or who have tried cases against me, and to the judges before whom I have appeared as counsel.

It is true, I have been superintendent of schools in Polk county for two terms, and so far as I know have given satisfaction to the patrons and teachers of the schools. At the same time the work of the office has not materially interfered with my law practice, owing to the fact that Polk is a small county and the work of the office is not more than half as much as in some of the larger counties. If I am elected to the office of district attorney, every criminal will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law, but I shall not use the office to persecute any one. Every one will be treated with fairness and consideration. Please give this letter space in your paper in the interests of justice.
