PROGRESS MAKING

Marion County Republicans Reform Platform.

Different Steps Taken by Manager Wrightman to Save the Ship.

On April 3, John H. Scott, for county judge, and I. C. Needham, for commissioner, published this card:

We, the undersigned nominees of the Republican party of Marion County, Oregon, for the respective offices of county judge and county commissioner of said county, believing that a public office is a public trust, and that public affairs can be run upon the same economical and businesslike basis as a successful private enterprise; wish to announce to the people of this county, that when elected to the respective offices for which we are nominated, we will give to the people an economical, businesslike and just administration, and we will use all means within our power to reduce the present excessive burden of taxation.

Next a committee of Republican county managers drew up a platform for the county judge and commissioner to stand upon as follows:

The candidates for county judge and county commissioner hereby pledge themselves to the strictest economy in conducting the business of the county, restricting the expenditures to actual necessities for the protection of public interests and public property, and with a determination to place the county of Marion upon a 'do it right' basis and out of debt, while at the same time reducing the tax levy to the lowest possible limit, and the candidates for all other places upon the county ticket pledge themselves to earnest and faithful co-operation with the county court in reaching the results aforesaid.

Next step in the evolution comes A. W. Prescott, who offers with John H. Scott and is the Salem reporter for the Oregonian and says:

The Republicans of Marion County are planning to meet the opposition in the coming campaign by making a presentation of figures showing the decrease in county expenses during the last 10 years. One set of figures is that which shows the current expense of the county for each fiscal year ending October 1. The first two years in the list were under a Democratic administration. The figures are as follows:

In the last campaign the Republicans pledged their candidates to make a reduction of \$10,000 in running expenses. The year 1897 was the first one in which the new administration had control through the whole year, and the year 1897 was the last one in which the new administration did not participate at all. A comparison of the two years show a reduction of \$29,224.

The above figures are taken from tables made up at the request of, and already published in THE JOURNAL, and they are embodied in the platform adopted by the Democratic County Convention and on which the opposition candidates stand.

The people may well rejoice that THE JOURNAL's agitation of Marion county financial affairs is bearing fruits of repentance, in the bosoms of the Republican candidates. But the would-be Republican reformers should adhere to the facts. Mr. Prescott says above:

The first two years in the list were under a Democratic administration. The figures are as follows: 1891, \$100,021; 1892, \$103,451.

Now what are the facts. T. L. Davidson, was appointed county judge of Marion County by Governor Penoyer July 1, 1891, and held the office up to July 2, 1892. He sat with two Republican county commissioners on the county commissioners court. In all fairness, does that constitute two years of Democratic county government? It is a little raw, to say the least.

The reductions under Judge Terrell the past three years from \$80,170 a year to \$51,940 a year, was the result of persistent agitation and exposure on the part of THE JOURNAL. But the county is still in debt and taxes higher than ever. If the fight for retrenchment had not been made the county might now be \$300,000 in debt.

The Chicken Thieves. Chief of Police Gibson went to Jefferson this morning to bring back Willie Bruke, one of the boys for whom warrants were issued in the chicken-stealing cases. He went to Jefferson and was detained there by the officers, who notified Chief Gibson. He will probably be sent to the Reform school. That the chicken thieves were not all committed by these boys is shown by the fact that losses aggregating \$32 fowls have been reported for last night.

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MAY FESTIVAL.

Three Concerts Next Week—An Epoch-Marker in the Musical History of Salem. The May festival of the Willamette Valley Choral Union, to be held next week in the First M. E. church of this city, deserves the special notice and patronage of all citizens interested in the growth of everything that elevates the morals of a city and brings it into prominence as a city of culture.

The purpose of this choral union is to develop the singing in choruses of the masterpieces of music. During the Salem festival, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of next week, will be sung Mendelssohn's oratorio, St. Paul and Haydn's Creation, two massive works for soloists and chorus orchestra.

The soloist will be Mrs. Rose Bloch Bauer of Portland, Soprano; Miss Lillian Robin of Salem, Contralto; Mr. J. W. Heicher, of Portland, Tenor; Mr. Irving M. Glen of Eugene, Bass. The large orchestra consists of the best obtainable players from Portland, Eugene, Corvallis and Salem.

The chorists are made up of members of the choral societies of Salem, Albany, Eugene, Corvallis and Dallas. Mr. Francesco Seley of Salem, will conduct the performance of St. Paul on Thursday night, May 10, and the Creation will be conducted by Mr. Clifford Nash of Eugene, the following evening. Neither hard work, time nor money have been spared to make this festival the most brilliant musical effort in Salem's history and it will undoubtedly mark an epoch in the progress of musical culture in the Willamette Valley.

These five societies have united for the better rendering of the grand oratorio and other large choral works; and it is to the interest of Salem people to make this festival a financial success by attending in large numbers every one of the three concerts in the series.

The price of tickets has been reduced from \$2 to \$1.50 for transferable course tickets, and from \$1 to 75c for single admission tickets. All tickets may be reserved without extra charge. The reserved seats are now open at Dearborn's or season tickets, and will open Tuesday morning for single tickets to the first concert.
