A SUCCESSFUL TRAP

Bentley & Co's. Substitute for the Shovelers Who Struck for Higher Wages.

The trap rigged by D. S. Bentley & Co. for loading wagons with dirt, in the excavation they are making for the foundation of the new Odd Fellows Temple, works as successfully as some of the trapset by the Beers for the British.

It consists of a deep trench into which the wagons are driven. Over the deep part is a bridge and in the middle of said bridge there is a hole. A pair of horses cross the bridge dragging a scraper full of dirt and as it reaches the aforesaid hole the scraper is dumped and the dirt falls into the wagon below.

Saturday afternoon a Jorcasat man held his stop watch on the crew as they were working apparently at the ordinary speed. Three pairs of horses, three drivers, and two men handling the scrapers, filled a wagon in just three minutes. When the load is completed, an extra pair of horses are put on to help draw the wagon up the steep incline.

This extra pair of horses, the three pair on the scrapers, four drivers and two men handling scrapers, working as above noted, will do the work of 25 men working at the rate attained by the 15 men who struck for higher wages a few days ago.

(Of course there will be work with shovels, but on the whole, it would seem that the strike will prove a profitable thing for the contractors.)
