GRANDMA LOONEY DEAD

Passed Away at Jefferson Early Monday Morning.

Sketch of a Venerable Pioneer and Remarkable Woman of Oregon.

Grandma Roby Looney died Monday May 7, at 2:40 a. m. at Jefferson aged 92 years.

Her demise was not unexpected, as she had been lingering on the verge of the shadowy land for several days and it was thought she had not many hours life on Saturday. But she lingered amid her circle of loved ones until the dawn of another week and passed away in peaceful sleep, her mind remaining unclouded to the last.

Grandma Looney's maiden name was Ruby Crawford Bond. She was born March 18, 1808 near Covington, Kentucky. At the age of nine years she with her parents removed to Alabama, and on March 16, 1827, she was married to Jesse Looney, a native of Tennessee. Mr. and Mrs. Looney came to Oregon in 1843 with a family of six children, crossing the plains. To them more children were born in Oregon and ten are now living. The five sons and five daughters were present at her bedside. Grandma Looney is believed to be the last pioneer mother of 1843 who brought her family to Oregon overland. She was descended from revolutionary stock, one of her ancestors being George Walton, the first governor of Georgia, who was a signer of the Declaration of Independence and also of the Articles of Confederation.

Mrs. Looney was herself one of the most remarkable women and most widely known persons in Western Oregon. Until the railroad was built, they kept the overland stage station at her house, all the coaches stopping for meals and to change horses.

With her husband she early imbibed a dislike for slavery in the South, and resolved to remove to and raise their family in a free territory. Although her people and her husband's people were slaveholders, they determined to leave the institution far behind, and their influence was cast to keep Oregon a free state.

Grandma Looney was a public-spirited woman, and her presence at the state fair at Salem in her large family tent was always a noted feature of interest to pioneers from all over the state. It is but a few years ago that she was at the fair as usual, greeting her friends and surrounded by her offspring, and relatives numbering over a hundred in the state.

The funeral services will be held at the late home of the deceased on Tuesday at 1 p. m., Rev. P. S. Knight officiating. Burial will take place at the family burying ground at Looney's Butte.

PRIVATE TAX COLLECTOR

Mr. Bingham's Claim Against Marion County Does Not Stand.

Supreme Court Declares All Such Contracts Void and Made Without Authority.

The supreme court of Oregon affirmed the decree in the suit brought against Multnomah county to enforce a private tax collecting contract.

The suit was brought to annul and declare void a contract entered into which provided that a private lawyer, one Noble, should collect the delinquent taxes of 1897 and 1898, prepare corrected tax lists, etc., and receive as compensation all sums received by him in excess of the amount of the tax and its actual cost lawfully expended.

The supreme court holds that the plaintiff comes within the rule that an individual taxpayer may, by a suit in equity, restrain the misapplication of public funds or property. Continuing, the opinion says, in part:

"The plaintiff is entitled to maintain this suit if the contract is void, as we think it is. It is not only in effect an agreement by the board of county commissioners to use the general governmental machinery in the collection of delinquent taxes for the benefit, primarily, of a private individual, but it undertakes to interfere with the discharge of the duties assigned by law to other officers, and is, therefore, beyond the power of the board of commissioners to make. . . . It undertakes to interfere with the duties of the county clerk by providing in advance that an alias warrant for the collection of delinquent taxes shall be ordered issued by that tribunal, and again, by providing that he shall bid in for the county all property offered for sale for which there are no other bidders.

A more serious and insurmountable objection, however, is that the board of County Commissioners undertakes by the contract to interfere with the duties of the County Clerk by stipulating how and from what date he shall make delinquent tax-lists, when his duty in that regard is especially prescribed by statute, and the Board of County Commissioners of County Court has no control over him, except, to see that he faithfully executes the duties of his office."

It is also held that the clerk has no right to go outside of the tax roll for information regarding descriptions of property.
