## THE ARTIST'S CONCERT FOR DISTRICT ATTORNEY

May Musical Festival of the Willamette Valley Choral Society

Opens With a Fine Attendance at the M. E. Church—Mendelssohn's St. Paul Tonight.

The second annual May Festival of the Willamette Valley Choral Union was inaugurated on Wednesday evening at the First M. E. church under the most favorable auspices.

The large auditorium of the largest church in the city was filled by the cultured music lovers of the Capital City, with many from Portland, Eugene and towns near by. It was clearly the most notable gathering of artists and lovers of music ever seen in Salem.

The church had been prepared for the occasion by the erection of an extension to the platform, making room for the performers and their instruments, and an expansive array of chairs for the chorus.

About 8 o'clock, the hour named for the commencement of the concert, the people began to arrive, and half an hour later the seats were nearly all occupied.

The program, while it comprised comparatively few numbers, covered a wide range of the musician's art, and was full and rich, occupying nearly two hours.

A simple love of music, with no technical education in the art, has no business trying to go into details, but those competent to judge pronounced the different numbers perfect in every way.

The Hidden String Quartet, consisting of Mr. and Mrs. Reginald L. Hidden, first violins; Emil Thielhorn, viola, and Ferdinand Conrad, violoncello, opened the concert with a string quartet, Op. 76, No. 1, in G. Haydn, in four movements, which, translated, means that they played four "pieces." The first, Allegro con spirito, was the "prettiest" thing of the kind ever heard by this reporter.

The next, Adagio sostenuto, was equally effective in a different way, and won an encore which, in turn, brought a prolonged round of applause.

The other two movements, Minuetto presto and the finale, Allegro ma non troppo, met with a similar warm reception from the listeners. If a lay member may be permitted to pass judgment upon this quartet of performers, it would be that with perfect technical execution they combine that art which conceals art. There is not the slightest suggestion of the machine made about their music, and through it all vibrates a certain human note which finds its way to the heart of the least cultured.

The next number was a soprano solo, Jeanne D'Arc, Bordeaux, by Salem's young prima-donna, Miss Ethel Raymond. It is needless to say that she acquitted herself creditably, showing power of dramatic expression, as well as musical training. She was obliged to respond to a persistent encore.

LeRoy L. Gerner, Salem's leading young violinist, executed a violin concerto in G minor, by Bruch, with piano accompaniment by Prof. Edw. Tillson, showing technical skill. The accompaniment was especially fine.

Miss Rita Hansen, of Eugene, with a contralto solo in two parts, Berceuse, by Godard, and a Madrigal, by Victor Harris, captured the audience, and was obliged to respond to an encore. She has a full rich voice, showing careful cultivation.

The concluding number was a piano sonata in E minor op. 7, Grieg, by Prof. Edw. Tillson. The popular but unassuming young master of the piano was greeted with a prolonged ovation when he came forward. He made the instrument literally dance, the platform being springy, and was interrupted several times by irrepressible applause.

This evening, in the same church, the Willamette Valley Choral Society will render Mendelssohn's oratorio "St. Paul." The soloists will be Mrs. Rose-Bloch-Bauer, soprano, of Portland; Miss Lillian Roblin, contralto, Salem; J. W. Belcher, tenor, Portland; Irving M. Glenn, basso, Eugene; Francesco Seley, conductor, Salem.

With the orchestra of eighteen skilled professional musicians and a large chorus of best singers of five cities and towns, this will be something grand and should not be missed.

As this evening's oratorio is quite long, patrons are urged to be in their seats by 8 o'clock if possible.
