PRIMARY REFORM.

There is one law THE JOURNAL will make a fight for the next legislature and that is reform in the nominating system. The present way of picking a slate of precinct delegates and then picking the vote and then forming a new slate in the county convention is all wrong and is breaking down from its own inherent weakness.

The only right way to make nominations is by direct vote of the members of a party on the Australian ballot plan. If there are five Republican candidates for sheriff, or any party, at the primary of that party their names appear alphabetically and the voter indicates with a cross the one he thinks should be the party candidate. The friends of all the candidates turn out to the primary, and the aspirant having the largest vote is the party nominee. So with the aspirants for each office. Each voter knows best who should be the nominee of his party.

E. W. Hingham, the author of the Australian ballot law and registration law in this state, is a candidate for the legislature in the Clackamas-Multnomah district and will lead the fight in the next legislature for direct nomination and to perfect the registration law and to prevent the emasculation of the Australian ballot law—which will again be attempted. The plan of the bosses is to try to change the ballot law so that a party ticket can be voted by making one cross for the whole ticket to insure election of the yellow dog on the ticket if there is one there.

With direct nomination and the pure Australian ballot and perfected registration the power of bossism would be broken. The fact that in the southern states where the people have direct nomination there have been no scandals over the election of senators and no such corruption of the legislatures as we have in the north, ought to convince anyone that the delegate nominating system is the chief cause of rotten politics. With direct nomination an official who makes a good record could appeal directly to the rank and file of his party instead of having to satisfy the bosses.

THE NICARAGUA BILL AND ITS FATE.

The Chronicle is an administration organ. The Chronicle puts forth the best and most reliable Washington news of any San Francisco papers. In the Chronicle on Thursday was a special dispatch from the National Capital which showed that the Nicaragua Canal bill would be buried in committee this session. The reasons given are two-fold: 1—Those who champion the Hay-Pauncefote treaty say that if it is not ratified, the Canal bill will not pass. 2—The Hanna-Payne men declare that the Nicaragua Canal bill will surely be left in committee if the Hanna-Payne Ship Subsidy bill fails of passage. The Hay-Pauncefote treaty is a virtual measure to permit the United States to pay all the cost of construction and maintenance of the Nicaragua Canal, and let the British Government pay how it shall be run—all, of course, for the greater glory and benefit of Great Britain in time of war.

The Hanna-Payne Ship Subsidy bill is a cunningly devised scheme to give great sums to Atlantic liners, owned by wealthy syndicates and already making vast profits, and to permit the few drab-birds to go to the vessels which carry our commerce abroad. The spread of the American merchant marine would be fostered by this bill in about the same ratio that an immense subsidy to the Pullman Palace Car Company would encourage the commercial advantages of Arizona and Nevada.

And yet the absolutely necessary Nicaragua canal is to be laid on the shelf, because interested senators—great champions of the administration—can not get through one pernicious measure, and because the administration itself cannot prevail upon the senate to ratify a treaty which is a gigantic diplomatic blunder on the part of Secretary of State Hay.

In the presence of this opposition to the Nicaragua canal bill, that of the great transcontinental railroads glows with the sacred fire of Patriotism.—*Sacramento Bee (Rep.).*

OUR RELATIONS WITH TURKEY

There Are No New Developments in the Situation.

A special to the New York Times from Washington says: Although the department of state is silent as to the course to be pursued toward Turkey, in case the Sultan persists in ignoring the demand of the United States for the payment of the indemnity which the Sultan has admitted to be just and due, it is ascertained from one of the foreign legations that there is evidently a purpose on the part of the United States government to try the effect of a demonstration to constrain the payment promised. The foreign representative who learned this has mentioned it with astonishment to some of his associates, and it has undoubtedly found its way to the several courts in Europe.

The intimation is heard here that the German government has signified its disapproval of the published proposition that in case of a suspension of diplomatic relations with Turkey the interests of the United States shall be turned over to Germany.

Germany is engaged in an effort to ingratiate itself with the Sultan. Forth and would look upon the invitation to take care of the United States in Turkey as an embarrassment.

No conjecture is indulged in at the Department of State as to the mission of Abdul Pasha, the Turkish Admiral, who is reported to have started for this country to arrange for the building of a ship of war, that is to be paid for at the value of the vessel plus the amount of the indemnity for the losses at Harput and Marash.

The Government would not listen to any such proposition, and, if it did, it is believed that when the ship was delivered to the Sultan it would be sold to the United States.
