Tomorrow the Last Day—Don't be a Foolish Virgin.
By a lapetus penitentiary, The JOURNAL stated Saturday that the registration of voters would close at midnight Tuesday. It should have said 5 o'clock p. m. as that is the hour fixed by law for the closing of the books. The county clerk must then write the word "closed" after the last name in each precinct, and no more entries can be made under any circumstances. If any lists come in from notaries or justices after the clock strikes 5 they will be shot out by the provisions of law, no matter when the voter may have registered with the notary.
Any voters who have not attended to this matter should drop everything and make for the court house. County Clerk Hall will keep his office open this evening as long as there is any business in sight, and it will not close at noon Tuesday.

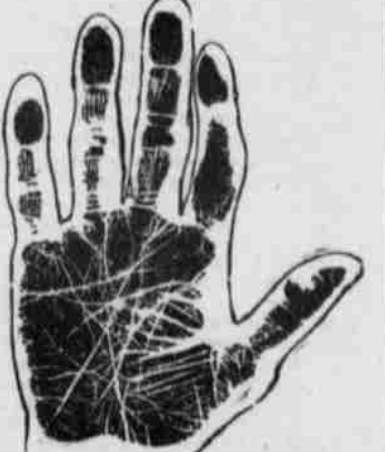
