THE FRUIT MARKET

Movements of Green Fruits to the East From California.

Reports of Pacific Coast Fruit Sales and Shipment.

By Associated Press to the Journal.

SACRAMENTO, May 14.—The rains have made no great difference in the cherry shipments, except that they have been retarded. Elips fruit has, of course, suffered from the wet, as in that condition it has a tendency to split. But the bulk of the crop is not yet ripe, even in the eastern districts. With warm, dry weather, from this time on, the cherry crop will mature rapidly and shipments will start in force. Now about a car a day is going forward. The earlier shipments have been made up from different districts, no one locality ripening sufficient fruit at one time to fill a car. But now local carload shipments are in order, and the first fall carload from Placer County, is on its way East. The Railroad Company does not allow cars to be opened after starting from the original shipping point, for the purpose of completing the load. Up to the present time about fifteen carloads of cherries, from all sources, have been shipped this season, making no account of express shipments.

To July 1st, the maximum carload will be 24,000 pounds, as it was last season. This is for the accommodation of shippers, as in the earlier months of the season it is often difficult to make up a large quantity from one locality. After July 1st, the regular minimum of 24,000 pounds will be in force. Experience last year showed the advance of the minimum from 24,000 to 26,000 pounds to be disadvantageous to growers. Delinquency in various ways, but there is no prospect of any change this season.

"The outlook is not quite so favorable for California fruit in the East this year as it was last season," says Mr. Day. "The Eastern fruit crop bids fair to be much better than it was in 1909, and this of course affects the market for the California fruit. This is especially the case with peaches, which last year were in scanty supply from Eastern orchards. Georgia will have, at a conservative estimate, 3,000 carloads. Estimates have been as high as 4,000 or 7,000, but such figures are extravagant. Indeed, the expectation of 3,000 cars may be greatly cut down by unfavorable weather. But Georgia will be an important factor in the fruit market this season, and the peach industry is one of much promise, despite some disaster in the past. She may be regarded as California's most formidable competitor in peach production, especially in the business of the West and New Jersey the peach is declining, through disease and the exhaustion of orchards.

"In a general way, Eastern fruit prospects may be called good for the coming season, though it is yet too early to know just what to expect.

"One thing that cuts considerable figure, so far as California interests are concerned, is the transportation of fruit, especially bananas. Few people realize what an enormous quantity of bananas is consumed in this country. The average of annual imports of bananas is 16,000,000 bunches. The business is in the hands of the Banana Trust, which owns plantations and controls transportation. Eastern dealers are now starting it. The trust has put up the price of reduced importation. The fruit used to sell as low as 50 to 75 cents a bunch, but has lately been more than three times that price, owing to the operation of the trust.

"In regard to packing and the quality of the fruit shipped to the East, the only suggestion I can make is to send the best and pack it in the best possible way. There is much to be gained from this point, as California growers and shippers pretty generally understand the importance of keeping inferior fruit and badly packed fruit out of the Eastern market. More or less perfect fruit, or good fruit improperly packed, finds its way East, but while it is an evil the injury from this source, I am pleased to say, is not very great, so far as my observation goes.

"If you are not familiar with the figures of apple production in the East you may be surprised to learn the extent of the crop of this fruit. It is about 60,000,000 barrels a year, and a barrel, roughly speaking, is equal to three of your boxes of apples. All apples in the East are sold by the barrel, and the box is there unknown for this description of fruit. And yet of the 60,000,000 barrels of Eastern apples, never more than 3,000,000 are exported.

"There are many varieties of the apple superior, in my opinion, to the New York fruit, but as a general proposition it will not pay to grow the Eastern California for shipment to the East, the freight being too great to allow a profit. And there are some varieties such as the Spitzenberg, of superior quality, but yet so uncertain in their yield that growers cannot be recommended to plant them. I could dispose of all the barrels of Spitzenberg at good prices, but the fruit is not so good. This variety is little grown anywhere.

Mr. Day has just received advice from New York to the effect that frost has done great damage to growing fruit in the Catskill district, on the Hudson river, about fifty miles above New York. Strawberries, cherries, apples, Bartlett pears, plums, and other fruit, which are largely grown in this district, have been seriously affected. The temperature is reported to have gone as low as 26 degrees. While other Eastern districts yet report no injury, the damage done on the Hudson will to a certain extent affect the favorably later on the market for California fruit in New York City.
