with pressure for two minutes. Keep
your hand firm on the sheet, then raise
hand gently.
Only use a small amount of the acid
mixture on your palms, just enough to
color the palm. Do not have in streaks
on the palms because that will make it
blur on the impression sheet.
Directions: how to remove the stains
from your palms: Wash hands in vine-
gar thoroughly; then use soap as usual.
After impression of hands has been
