MAGNIFICENT SUCCESS

The Rose Show Exceeds All Expectations and Crowd is Immense.

Names of Prize Winners and of Children Taking Part in Bicycle Parade—About 2000 Cleared.

The Rose Show was unequivocally a grand success, and the expectations of the promoters were realized several fold. The only drawback was the lack of room to accommodate the crowds which sought admission, and had there been plenty of leeway in this respect, the receipts would undoubtedly have been much larger.

The parade of children with decorated bicycles and floats was very fine. There were over 100 children in the parade and between forty and fifty decorated bicycles.

The crowd which was gathered on the court house square was variously estimated, at from 2000 to 5000 people.

The parade started from the First M. E. church at 7:30, led by the Chemawa Indian band of 17 pieces and preceded by a colored gentlemen, Chas. Lechier, dressed at the very top notch of style, and acting as drum major. Then followed the flower covered bicycles, interspersed with beautiful little floats. The rear was brought up by two little Chinese children in a float drawn by the dog, Rastus, led by a young Chinese-American on each side.

The line of march was once around the court house square against the sun, counter marching on the curved walk east of the courthouse and thence to the city hall.

The council chamber on the second floor of the city hall, with the main hall-way, was set with tables upon which the flowers were displayed, and, in spite of the unfavorable season, the tables were covered with most beautiful specimens.

The press of visitors was so great that it was necessary for the people to pass in through the council chamber and out through the main hall of the building, and during the rendition of the musical program it was impossible to make one's way through the crowd.

The Mandolin Club played several choice selections, and Miss Ethel Raymond sang, responding to a hearty encore.

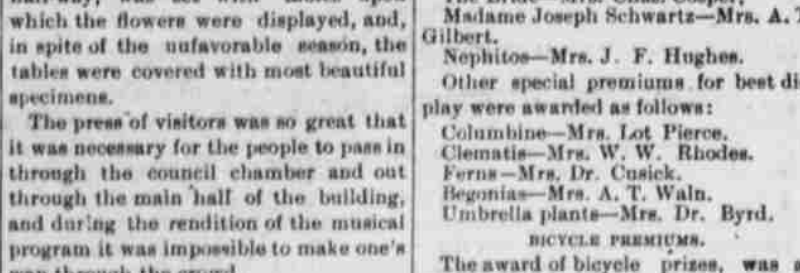
