IS M'KINLEY'S HEALTH FAILING?

By Associated Press to the Journal. New York, May 21.—The Herald says: Republican members of Congress who were in the city last night said the selection of a candidate for Vice-President to run with President McKinley was as perplexing a problem as ever, and that the matter had taken on a new phase. This is caused by the state of the President's health.

They will not even breathe a doubt that the president is likely to serve four years more yet they are satisfied that more than usual care must be taken in providing for the Presidential succession.

The information that comes from Washington is that while the President's condition is not alarming, it is of a character to cause uneasiness among his intimate friends, to whom the facts are known.

At recent conferences in Washington it has been assumed that Governor Roosevelt was entirely out of consideration, and his name was not pressed.

Other names were considered among them being those of Cornelius N. Bliss, Secretary Long, Senator Lodge, Governor Shaw, of Iowa; Senator Cullom, of Illinois; Senator Wolcott, of Colorado, and General E. S. Otis, of Rochester, N. Y.

When all was said and done it was agreed that the candidate for Vice-President, who met all present and other exigencies, had not been discovered.

SUBLIME PORTE WANTS A NAVY

New York, May 21.—Rear-Admiral Ahmed Fakhri, said that his mission to this country had no connection with any work of diplomacy.

In speaking of the report that he had any proposals to make this country concerning the indemnity claimed by the United States from Turkey because of injuries suffered by missionaries during the Armenian troubles, he said to a Tribune reporter: "My business is that of an engineer, not of a diplomat. Of diplomatic relations, therefore, I have no right to speak. That falls to the duty of our Turkish minister at Washington."

"From what I could learn of the desires of the Sultan in conversation with him he is anxious to increase the progress of his navy."

"Our navy must be put on a basis with Western countries and it seemed that there could be no better place to learn modern methods of construction than in America."

"I was selected for the mission because I am the engineer-in-chief of the Turkish navy."

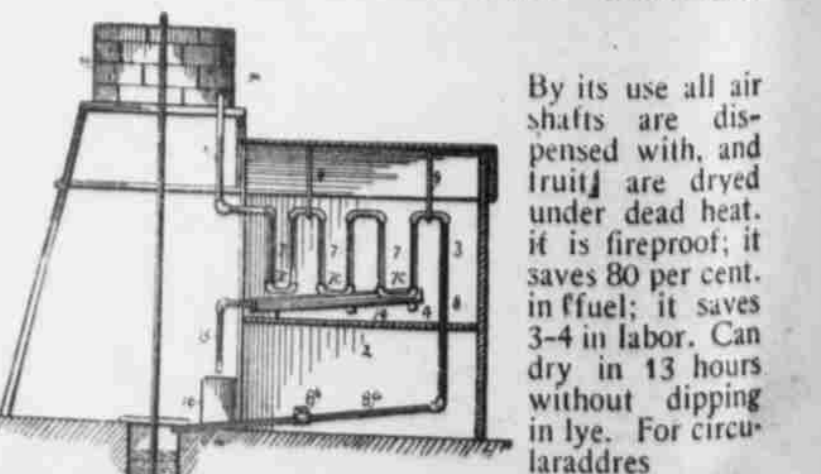
