CROP WEATHER BULLETIN

Bulletin of Conditions as to Grain,
Hops, Spuds, Fruit and Vegetables.

GENERAL SUMMARY.

West of the Cascade mountains the
temperatures during the week have been
quite equable, while to the east of these
mountains they have been very change-
able, with widely divergent extremes.
As a whole, it has averaged slightly
warmer than the previous week, and has
been much warmer than it was at this
time a year ago. The day temperatures
west of the Cascades ranged between 62
and 76 degrees, and the night tempera-
tures between 42 and 53 degrees. East
of the mountains the day temperatures
ranged between 62 and 82 degrees, and
the night temperatures between 39 and
54 degrees.

Showers occurred pretty generally
over the state Tuesday afternoon and
Wednesday, and east of the mountains
they were attended by thunder and
excessive rainfalls over limited areas.
Not much, if any, rain fell on other days
of the week, but a good portion of the
time has been cloudy, and vegetation in
general would be benefited by more
sunshine.

Farm Work—Seeding and planting are
nearly finished in all sections.

Winter Wheat—Winter wheat is now
beginning to head in while in the Colum-
bia River Valley it is about all headed.
In the Willamette valley and the Coast
district the crop is only doing fairly well,
but in all other sections it is remark-
ably thrifty.

Spring Wheat—Spring wheat is stool-
ing nicely, and is generally in excellent
condition.

Corn—Corn is mostly all up and its
cultivation is in active progress.

Oats—Oats are making a good growth,
although quite a number of complaints
are heard of damage being done to them
by cut worms and insects.

Barley—Barley in general looks well,
and in the Plateau district the cut
worms have stopped working in the
fields, after having done considerable
damage.

Hops—Hops have made a favorable
growth during the week and no unfavor-
able reports regarding this crop have
been received.

Gardens—Potatoes are about all
planted, and their cultivation is now in
progress. Vegetables of all kinds are
doing well.

Grass—Pasture is good in all sec-
tions and the hay outlook is very prom-
ising.

Stock—Reports from the Willamette
valley and Southern Oregon state that
sheep shearing is in progress and that
the wool clip is heavy. The stock in all
sections is in a good condition.

Fruit—A fair crop of strawberries is
being marketed, and cherries will soon
be ripe. Other fruit has made good
progress, except that in Klamath county
a hard freeze occurred on the 17th,
which killed nearly all of the pears and
prunes.

WILLAMETTE VALLEY.

Dunsty, Benton county, H. T. Bristow.
—Good growing weather during the last
week. All kinds of crops look well.
Rain on 16th and 16th. Fall crops in-
dicate an early harvest. Garden plant-
ing about done. Grass is good and
stock is fat. Sheep shearing has begun,
with heavy clip. The prospect for the
Italian prune crop is better than it was
earlier in the season.

Turner, Marion county, W. M. Hil-
lary.—Potato and corn planting com-
pleted. All kinds of grain doing well.
Spring wheat promises to be better than
the fall sown. Blackberries and raspber-
ries in bloom; prospects good for a full
crop. Gooseberries and currants less
than average. Sheep shearing is in
progress and the clip is heavier than
usual. The mild winter was favorable to
wool growth. More farmers are sell-
ing cream to butter factory than ever be-
fore.

Boona Vista, Polk county, L. D. Bald-
win.—The last week has been mostly
cloudy and warm; favorable to growth
of grain and vegetables. Gardens are
growing fast. Seeding is finished. Far-
mers all busy working summer fallow.

Wheatland, Yamhill county, A. P.
Magness.—Fall wheat still looks yellow
from the effects of the cold weather.
Spring grain looks well, but needs
warmer weather. Weeds are making a
good start in gardens on account of long
continued wet weather and lack of cultiva-
tion.
