SHIFTS THOMAS H. TONGUE

The above head line is from the Roseburg Review. It says that Hon. Thomas H. Tongue, candidate for re-election to congressional honors in the First Oregon District, is a typical politician. A statesman is a typical politician. A statesman who wants the state to do something for him.

Although Mr. Tongue has his ear to the ground to catch the faintest sound and his eye glued to the weather vane of public sentiment, he has failed to please the people. He has danced attendance when corporate greed beckoned and sneezed dutifully when the money power took snuff.

While following the band wagon of his party he has held up the penny of immediate advantage so close to his eyes that it has shut out a vision of the glories of the eternal principles that keep humanity. The Oregonian, well knowing the vacillating nature of Mr. Tongue, has given convincing proof of his instability and unfitness to represent his constituency in congress. Formerly he was a rabid advocate of free trade with Puerto Rico, but later developments show his inconsistency and complete surrender to the trusts. His vote for Puerto Rican tariff is prima facie evidence of his paltering. He has been on all sides of the money question and all things to all men.

ped herbs and dressing on the fish

then fold the paper and turn up the

edges. Bake in moderate heat over
