COUNTY CANVASS

Proceeding Along in a Pleasant Manner.

Little Doc Smith Putting in all His Time on The Journal Man.

At Marion, Poorman opened the debate with a shot at Hofer, who at Jefferson had claimed to be the author of the insurance tax law. That was when he was a Republican. Poorman said when he went out of the party he took all the reform with him.

He renewed his promises made at Jefferson. The great cost of submitting a matter of county expenditure to a vote of the people was Scott's theme. The people were largely to blame for the criminal expenses of Marion county. He promised to pay strict attention to our roads and bridges, cut down the pauper expenses. He had been a school teacher and could figure out the cost of a bridge.

Smith again reviewed all that had been said by others. He said they were not making promises. They were not promising to run the county at \$40,000 a year. He thought Bingham as tax collector was a grafter. He spent all his time as before on The Journal man.

Lot Pearce endorsed the reform propositions. In the past he said there had been a large floating vote that had no right to the ballot. He should oppose all useless commissions, clerkships and jobs. He asked no verdict but that he had done his duty as he expected to make this county his home.

C. D. Hartman of Scott's Mills, for representative was introduced and advocated changes in our roads in this county. He was much more pleased with the way the roads were handled in Clackamas county where the taxes were collected in cash.

Moore for county superintendent of schools said he favored removing his office from all political influences. Lieut. Murphy said he would give the people as nearly as possible a non-partisan administration of the office.

A. B. Huddelson said that he would favor a reduction in the freight on the railroads and 3 cents a mile for fares. The rate on wheat was 6 cents a bushel. He renewed his pledges made at Turner.

Jeffrey handled some of the propositions of the Republican speakers. All favored primary reform. He eulogized Oregon and especially Marion county. All should vote for that party which would give them the best county government. Not all expenditures in a county was to be laid at the doors of a few courts. He asked Moore if a man could run the schools of a county and also practice law. He renewed his pledges made at Turner.

W. W. Elder said he would give the county a non-partisan business administration if elected, and run the county finance as carefully as he would his own business.

J. B. Dimick gave his experience as a senator fourteen years ago. The bosses in the party at his heels had been barking ever since. He elicited a great deal of applause. He told a story of an Irishman who hauled wheat to Butteville. There was an opposition boat that had cut prices, and the other boat offered to haul it for the same price. But Farmer Guerin said: "No—no!—I'll not haul the boat that made them do it." So in Marion county it is the tax-payer's duty to vote for the party that made those fellows poor as reformers. (Applause.) He paid his respects to Tom Tongue for getting in private pension bills for men who had rested thirty years under a charge of desertion.

Frank Durbin made a plain business statement of his conduct of the office. He made his critics look both ways for Sunday as he does at every meeting. He showed again that P. T. Wrightman formulated the petition and headed it asking that Durbin's salary, at the figure fixed in the flag bill, \$1500 be raised to \$2000. It was done.

Flag's bill gave him \$1912, counting rent, board of prisoners, light, water and all. Wrightman again admitted that \$1200 for expenses, and figuring out what was counted as rent, etc., would leave him \$100 a year cash salary. That was the flag bill. The crowd caught on and gave Durbin an ovation for showing up the injustice of the flag bill.

Mr. Klug, for recorder, was presented and made a favorable impression. E. Hofer related Dr. Smith's strictures, that THE CAPITAL JOURNAL had collected \$750 for advertising the delinquent tax roll of 1898 that turned in only \$3000.

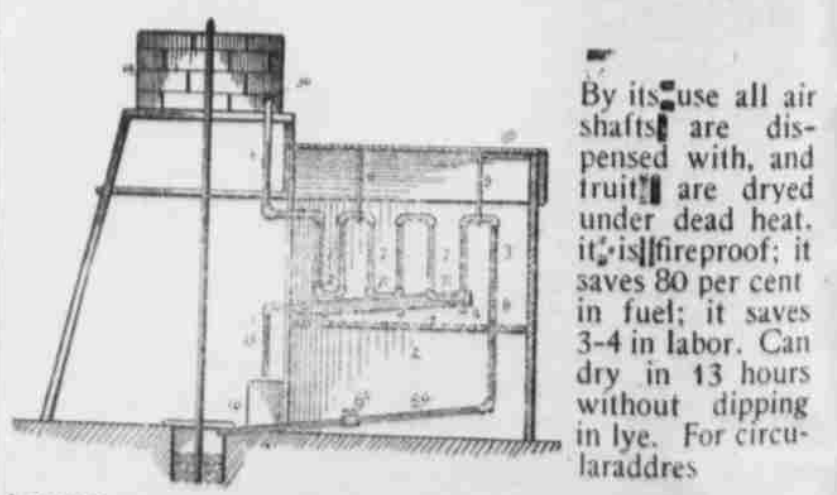
