WHERE OUR TAXES GO.
The taxpayer who is interested in discovering the causes why his burden is so heavy can find food for thought in the report of the Marion county commissioners' court, published in this issue.
The case of the State vs. Ramp cost the county \$78.90, and the defendant was acquitted by the jury with great promptness. Mr. Ramp was accused of injuring a bicycle path, an offense for which the law imposes a penalty; yet on the trial there was not the slightest evidence produced to show that he had so much as left a mark on the path. The trial was a farce, and an expensive farce for Marion county taxpayers. Whose fault this was in this particular case makes little difference. The point is that the taxpayers must put up \$78.90, over half of which goes for officers' fees, for the prosecution of a case in which there was not the slightest chance for conviction even on the undisputed evidence of the witnesses for the prosecution.
There are too many of such cases, and they all help to swell the present enormous interest-bearing debt of Marion county.
It is not a party question, but one in which the taxpayers are vitally interested as citizens. Although the Oregonian says that the election of even a constable by the opposition to the Republican party will tend to kill all our expected trade with the Orient; yet the voters are inclined to take a different view and fill at least the minor offices with men who they have reason to expect will not encourage petty prosecutions for the sake of the fees that can be made out of them.
A REMARKABLE OBJECT LESSON
During the past two years the city of

Salem has given the world several remarkable object lessons. Not least among these is the fact that the entire community has been able to lay aside all personal and partisan interests to be enabled to better the condition of the public, to give all lighter burdens of taxation to carry, and at the same time to give us a better public service. In short the fact has been demonstrated that we can get more for our money. This has not been done by strife and up-heavals, but by the earnest co-operation of a good people, all interested in obtaining the desired end.
This commendation has also proven that the best of Republicans, the best of Democrats, the best of Populists, and in fact the good men of all shades of belief, can come together and accomplish a good purpose in common, and yet not lose their political identity. Republicans who took part in this non-partisan movement are today as highly respected within the councils of their party as before. Democrats who stood shoulder to shoulder with those same Republicans are Democrats today, and Populists who assisted the two old parties in lifting off the burdens of taxes are today better Populists, and all are better men for their coming together in this move for the common good.
The record they have made in pulling the city out of the financial hole into which the push had steered her has attracted the attention of cities and towns, not only all over Oregon and this coast, but well across the continent. It is only a few days since THE JOURNAL published a letter from an official in a Wisconsin city asking particulars about our 4 per cent. home loan. That letter interesting and important in its indications though it was, seems to have escaped publication in our enterprising morning contemporary.
But the lesson has been working, and there is nothing in Salem's recent history of which her citizens, without regard to party, are quite so proud as they are of the present county and its record.
Without regard to party, because no party can claim the credit. Without

the assistance and even the leadership of the best class of Republicans, no such results could have been accomplished. And further, the push politicians of no party would have been capable of carrying out such a reform.
The movement was a revolt against the push and against push methods, without regard to the particular party name under which the push was in this instance masquerading. Its influence is not yet spent, but is strongly at work in the county politics. Let the voters become convinced that any candidate on either ticket would be dominated by push influences in either party, and that candidate will be snored under so deep that he will never more be heard of.
This is the point around which the county fight is really centered; and it is a point upon which the bi-partisan candidates have a distinct advantage over all the Republicans except those who have proved that they will not stand in with any push. The push is powerful and well organized in county as well as city, and some of the candidates are finding it extremely difficult to convince the voter that if elected they will be entirely independent of the organization that is straining every nerve to put them into office.
For Food and Dairy Commissioner, William Schulmerich, the Democratic People's nominee for State Dairy and Food Commissioner, is a resident of Washington county, where he has been engaged in the dairy business for a number of years, conducting one of the most successful dairies in that section of the state.
He was born in Eldorado county, California, and is a German. With his parents he came to Oregon in 1875, when he was 14 years of age. Notwithstanding he was born in this country, he speaks the German language, and is the only nominee on the state ticket who is a German.
Mr. Schulmerich has made a financial success of the dairy business when others have failed. He has done this because he has made a thorough study of the business. He has done much to advance the interest of the state dairy association, in a practical way, and has been very active in bringing to notice all efforts of adulteration in the dairy line.
He is at present the vice president of the state association, and has a large acquaintance with state dairymen, all of whom recognize his fitness and capacity to properly administer the duties of the office to which he aspires.

WOOL MARKET BLOCKED
Growers So Far Have Declined to Sell at This Time--Market Open in a Month.
PENDLETON, May 25.--One million pounds of wool has been hauled to Pendleton, by team and rail, and now awaits the action of the local market. So far, no sales of consequence have been made in Pendleton, and the prospect appears to be poor for any immediate opening up of the market. The history of wool for the past year since the 1899 crop was sold, has been that of the quoting of stiff prices during the winter, and the raising of expectations on the part of the growers that the 1900 clip would be sought at the figures that then were paid. Later, the market dropped off and the London sales have indicated that the prospects is not good for any improvement.
Buyers who have looked into the conditions here and at other Eastern Oregon points do not expect to see wool move out with the same ease as last season, when the entire clip was sold in a few weeks. It is thought that the local market will open up in about a month, and that from that time on the clip will be sold quickly. No one thinks that the growers will hold their wool, as they did two years ago.
The experience of both wool and wheat growers during the past few seasons in holding their products has not been such as to argue that as a profitable manner of handling stuff on the market. Large losses have been sustained by the dropping of the prices, and both farmers and sheepmen are inclined to take advantage of the best prices offered during the normal selling season, and not to speculate any more as in former years.
Last winter, buyers came out from the east and offered in many instances fifteen cents for wools of this section. Over in Wallawa county, the sheepmen sold in most cases, and secured in advance the best prices then quoted. Now, with the 1900 clip in the warehouses, the market does not justify any such figures, and the sheepmen, who then could have contracted at higher prices, will be compelled to accept at least two cents per pound less. The promise, however, is that the 1900 wool will bring good prices, and it is likely that one or two cents a pound better than 1899 will be realized.
In the measure, the less amount now to be realized than in the winter is offset by the extra good quality of the wools, which are universally better than for many years past. The wools are certainly of the best grade, and should be in demand in the east--E. Oregonian.
