THE COLLEGE ATHLETES

Annual Field Meet on June 2.—Forecast of the Results.

The Sixth Annual Field Meet of the I. A. A. O., which will be held at the state fair grounds on June 2, promises to be the best athletic event ever held in the state. The athletes at the different colleges are running into perfect form for the contest and it is predicted that a number of records will be broken.

The signal triumph of the University of Oregon men at Seattle on the 19th inst. leads many to believe that the Eugene men will again be victorious at the coming meet, but others are of the opinion that U. O. will meet her Waterloo when she bumps up against the husky fellows from the State Agricultural College. It is conceived by all that U. O. is the strongest team in the Northwest and could probably give O. A. C., or any other institution the worst of it in a dual meet; but, where a number of minor colleges are competing, they will win points which in a dual contest would be more likely to go to U. O. than to O. A. C. For instance, it is not thought that U. O. will win any of the jumps in the coming contest, as Heater of Pacific College will no doubt win the vault and broad jump, while Buckingham (W. U.) is a better man in the high jump than is Knox, the (U. O.) freshman.

The sprints will be hotly contested and some of the present records may go to pieces. Bishop (U. O.) ran close to "whirlwind" Calkins at Seattle in both the 100 and 200 yd dashes, and will probably stand out even chances against Regan (W. U.) and Colvig (O. A. C.) Redmond (U. O.) and Redd (O. A. C.) are the last men in the quarter and the race between them will be well worth witnessing.

Kenworthy (P. C.), Wilkins (W. U.), Burnett and Stimpson (O. A. C.) will bid for honors in the half mile, while Stimpson and Wilkins will meet again in the mile. Payne, the Eugene freshman, will doubtless figure prominently in the event also.

Palmer (O. A. C.) and Heater (P. C.) will be the best men in the hurdle race, although Smith (U. O.) may cut some figure in these events. Huffman will win the mile walk for the O. A. C., and Reuben Sanders (W. U.) will probably carry off first place in the shot put. Smith (U. O.) will not have things all his own way in the hammer throw, as Burroughs (O. A. C.) and James (P. U.) are both throwing near the 120-foot mark.

Altogether the meet promises to be a closely contested one, as each particular college seems to be sure of winning.
