THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS.

The constitutional amendments to be voted on at the June election are five in number, and but one, the woman's suffrage amendment, has received much consideration from the press.

The "Municipal Indebtedness Amendment" provides that no city, town, school district or other municipal corporation shall become indebted to an amount exceeding five per cent of the assessed valuation of its property. It is a substitute for the present section 10 of art. XI of the constitution which limits the legal indebtedness of counties to \$5000.

The amendment is simply calculated to legalize the debts which have been incurred, in numerous instances, in excess of the constitutional limit, and leave the way open for a fresh start in the noble industry of bond-mongering. It should be defeated. There has been entirely too much of the business of piling up debt for "posterity" to pay. We are treading on the line of the interest burden which is already grievous, and which, by the way, threatened under push management to bankrupt this city, not long ago, and instead of removing restrictions, municipal running in debt ought to be discouraged.

The Judiciary Amendment provides for increasing the number of supreme court justices to five, and takes off all limit on the number of circuit judges. This question was well threshed out at the last session of the legislature, when an attempt was made to ignore the constitution altogether in this matter. It was found, however, that by providing more clerical aid for the supreme judges business could be greatly expedited, and there seems to be no need of changing the constitution, unless for the purpose of providing more places for tax-payers.

The "Inheritance Amendment" is quite long and is very broad in its provisions. The effect would be to increase the power of corporations over the individual and allow them to still more effectively monopolize natural resources and ride rough shod over whoever should oppose. It should be overwhelmingly defeated.

The "Repeating Amendment" is for the purpose of striking from the constitution section 10 of Article 1, relating to free negroes and mulattoes, which has been a dead letter for nearly forty years, and may as well be wiped off the book. Of the "Equal Suffrage Amendment" it is hardly necessary to speak. It is a

question for each individual to decide for himself, and has been publicly agitated until all have probably made up their minds.

STAND BY THESE MEN.

In J. Y. McClellan the Union ticket has put up a strong and able man for assessor. Mr. McClellan has charge of the K. L. Hubbard dairy farm and has not been able to open the county canvass, hence we bespeak for him the same cordial support that is given the rest of the ticket. All the other candidates have been out over the county but Mr. Weeks, Mr. McClellan and Mr. Brown, the latter the sawmill manager at Stayton, and Mr. Weeks a dairyman on Howell Prairie. All three of these candidates are men of the best character and are well qualified for their respective positions. We would like to see them lead the ticket, as they are not able to leave their duty for the sake of being elected. Such men will tend to their duty far better sometimes than men who neglect their own business to run after an office.

WAS YOUNG MR. HART INVITED?

The Republican managers have committed a singular error of judgment in nominating a candidate for district attorney almost entirely without regard for the right of the people to have a man in that office who has some experience as a criminal lawyer. Mr. Hart is respectable as county superintendent, but as an aspirant for the office of public prosecutor in the second largest district in the state he cuts a sorry figure. His election would simply put the criminal practice in the hands of the ablest criminal lawyers in each county, because the state could win no cases without employing them, and if an accused man had no money to hire them of course they would be helping the state about half the time and worse than ever would big criminals go unpunished. It is almost impossible to convict a big thief now, but under Hart only the little fish would ever be caught.

The Salem Statesman published an account of how, after the union nominee, J. A. Jeffrey, had concluded his speech at Jefferson, Hart bobbed up from somewhere, dramatically ascended the platform, and made a spellbinder of a speech, in which he asserted that Jeffrey's claim that he had invited Hart to take part in a joint discussion was not true—that he had never received such an invitation. Upon this statement of Hart's to a Marion county audience—and as intelligent an audience as can be found in the state—the Statesman assumes that Hart has wiped up the floor with Jack Jeffrey.

Now it is a question of fact, and while no one expects the statesman, or any other campaign newspaper to get everything exactly right in the heat of a campaign, the public has a right to

expect a candidate for district attorney to adhere pretty close to the truth before a public audience. We desire to ask Mr. Hart, and he can reply in this paper free of expense, if prior to Jeffrey's speech at Independence on May 12 and in his speech at Dallas on the 14th, if he was not invited by letter to join Mr. Jeffrey in discussion at both places? Also was there not published an invitation to joint discussion in the Polk County Itemizer of the issue dated May 11th?

It would be easy to convict young Hart of lack of modesty in running for the second highest judicial office in the district. But he is exposed by his own statements to a charge of untruthfulness that he owes it to himself to refute before the people of Oregon.

comply with the law and close the tax list within the same year that it was levied. In this he did right, because extensions of the time for paying taxes are taken advantage of by the big taxpayers, and the county has to pay interest on the warrants that are out because the taxes are not in the treasury.

I will not descend to the depths of a personal controversy with R. J. Hendricks and C. B. Irvine in a matter where we are financially interested. I have been out for a week on the county canvass, and have sought to keep the campaign free from personalities. I have spoken well of all the gentlemen on the other ticket, and shall continue to do so. For this I deserve no credit, as it is the only decent and American way to carry on a contest for votes.
