THE RECORDS CONTRADICT.

STATESMAN'S WILFUL EDITORIAL LIE

SHOWN UP BY THE COUNTY RECORDS

All Abusive Attempts to Villify Sheriff Durbin Fall Flat When Put to the Test of Fact.

The Statesman under its present management never received more than \$100 to \$200 for publishing a sheriff's delinquent tax notice of sale, which can be proved by all the sheriff's for sixteen years back, up to John Knight. And the payment was always made from the sales and delinquent payments, and never drawn from the county treasury. The Statesman does not pose as a "reformer," but it would not have the nerve to charge \$750 for about \$150 worth of work, nor would we want to put a sheriff in such a "hole," if we thought anything of him or his future. —Sunday Statesman editorial.

The above would seem to be very plain, but it is a jumbled statement. The saying clause "up to John Knight" is a good one, but smooth enturbances don't pass for the truth. Under Wrightman, who succeeded John Knight, the Statesman received \$500 in one lump for advertising delinquent taxes.

The statement "and payment was always made from the sales, * * * NEVER DRAWN FROM THE COUNTY TREASURY," is however, a whole lie and a flat one, for the above bill of five hundred dollars was paid by county warrant No. 35942, dated Dec. 10th, 1896, and the warrant was received for by C. B. Irvine, the present publisher of the Statesman.

The bill was filed May 9th, by John B. Giesy, deputy clerk, allowed May 11th, according to the court record, and the warrant issued December 10th, one day before the bill was allowed. This may be a clerical error, but it is evident that no time was lost between the time of filing the bill and the drawing of the warrant.

The above facts from the record show two point blank lies, viz, that it never charged over \$150 or \$200 for a tax list" and that the pay for the same was "never drawn from the county treasury." In addition to the above it can be said that the tax lists published by THE JOURNAL were done at about half the rate charged by the Statesman in this \$500 claim. Ever since Sheriff Durbin has been in office sheriff sale notices have been published at \$2.00 per inch, instead of \$1.00 the price formerly paid. He has given litigants the choice of several papers, and has saved them all one half on this class of work. All have been treated alike, and no favoritism shown, and that is what the papers who are fighting him can't endure.

THREATENED TO KILL

Thomas Morrison Charged With Proposing to Do Up His Better Half.

Thomas Morrison, a wood hauler was arrested Saturday afternoon by Chief of Police Gibson, on a warrant issued out of the city recorder's court. He was charged with threatening to kill his wife. The couple separated some time ago and the woman has sued for a divorce. The preliminary examination took place before City Recorder Judah this morning. After hearing the testimony of Mrs. Elizabeth Morrison, the complaining witness, Calvin Marsh, Herbert Hall and A. H. Damon, the recorder placed Morrison under \$250 bonds to keep the peace and await the action of the state circuit court. In the absence of bonds, he was turned over to the custody of Sheriff Durbin.

One More of the "Oregon" Boys Home.

Sergeant Fred A. Ramsey, the oldest son of W. M. Ramsey, of this city, returned home yesterday, his term of five years' service having expired. He enlisted in the naval service in May, 1895, and was at Mare Island, Cal., until the battleship Oregon went into commission. He has been on the Oregon ever since she went into commission until he left her in Japan a few weeks ago. He went with the Oregon from New York to Manila, and served on her there. He served on land about six weeks in the Philippines. He was at various points in the Philippine Islands, and China and Japan. He is in good health, and his present rank is that of gunnery sergeant. He has not decided whether he will re-enlist or not.

THE COUNTY BATTLE.

Marion County Delegation Agrees On a Program of Reform—Announced at Every Place.

The Republican state campaign is led by Hon. Chas. W. Fulton, of Astoria, and Mrs. Dunnaway continues to appear with him at important places and make her plea for female suffrage. This is to improve the state that the Republicans are friendly to giving the women the ballot. The county canvass has entered upon its second week. Meetings as advertised will be held three times a day until Saturday afternoon and night there will be a grand closing rally at Salem. It is doubtful if a hall large enough can be found in this city, and if it is pleasant the speaking will be held in the open air. The Republicans expect to have some big guns on hand to present their case. But the Union ticket will go through without outside help, as they have so far.

AT SCOTT'S MILLS.

In this beautiful little Quaker city of homes and schools, eight miles east of Silverton, there was a goodly crowd assembled. Heavy rains fell on Friday and Saturday and made travel arduous, but roads much better than we expected.

Hon. J. B. Dimick was introduced by the son, who has been principal of the schools here for three years and is a teacher with few superiors in the county. The Scott Mills' people pride themselves on their good schools, and more than one citizen earnestly pleaded with us to give them a law that would raise the grades in the schools.

Frank Durbin here appeared for the first time to take young Hart's place, but put in his whole time, not on Hart, who is still running for district attorney, but on our county ticket, and we thought it was well spent. He grew witty at A. B. Hudson's expense, and said that he had not learned his speech well that Hofer had written for him.

Capt. Poorman and McKinley's pension commissioner had not done his duty by the old soldiers and roasted H. Clay Evans. Good for it, and all the old soldiers present said amen. He made the usual pledge that if elected all the Republican candidates for the legislature would oppose all appropriations for the higher institutions of education—not a dollar above the common branches. Lot Pearce favored a state board of equalization and all elections held in November.

Hall said about the wittiest thing that was said. He said both sides agree on all the main propositions, but want the offices and use economy and reduction of expenses as a pretext.

Young Scott announced that some of the Republican lawyers of Salem were fighting him and that one of them would have to refund \$1500 to the county if he was elected. He would practice economy and had no other aspiration than to make a good record while in office. A county judge who knew nothing of the law would be continually making blunders that would be expensive and appeals would be taking to the higher courts in ordinary matters. The people should put in a man who would give right decisions at the time and save expenses.

J. N. Smith spoke on national issues entirely. The republican party had put silver on par with gold at 16 to 1. Expansion was needed to land our goods in the orient. Our country was not only to be a great manufacturing center but the great center of the universe. The doctor grew really eloquent along this line.

Frank Durbin made a statement that pleased the people of Scott's Mills very much. He had not turned out a drunkard and neglected his family as had been represented to them would be the case two years ago if he was elected sheriff.

E. Hofer confined himself to showing that taxes were too high and while admitting that reductions in salaries and expenses had been made the past two years, the Republican county government was like the old Dutchman's horses that "kept fat on rye straw and not half threshed at that." There was no reason why this county could not be run for about the same as other well-governed counties.

J. A. Jeffrey closed the debate with a plea for the whole ticket, including Dr. Daly for congress. He said Finger did not claim his election because he had been a soldier in the Philippines, but because he was competent. He replied to Frank Davey by saying that the people did not want more wind and gymnastics on this campaign, but facts and a business discussion. After the biggest dinner of the whole trip all started for Mt. Angel through the rain.

Professor Brinkerhoff was a resident of Salem for some 18 months, and left here in March with his family, going to Rico, Colo., for the benefit of a daughter who was troubled with asthma. No particulars have yet been received as to the cause of his death. Deceased was about 65 years of age, and had been a very successful teacher for about 40 years, and had also been engaged in evangelistic work. He came here from Oakfield, Iowa, where a great part of his life had been spent.

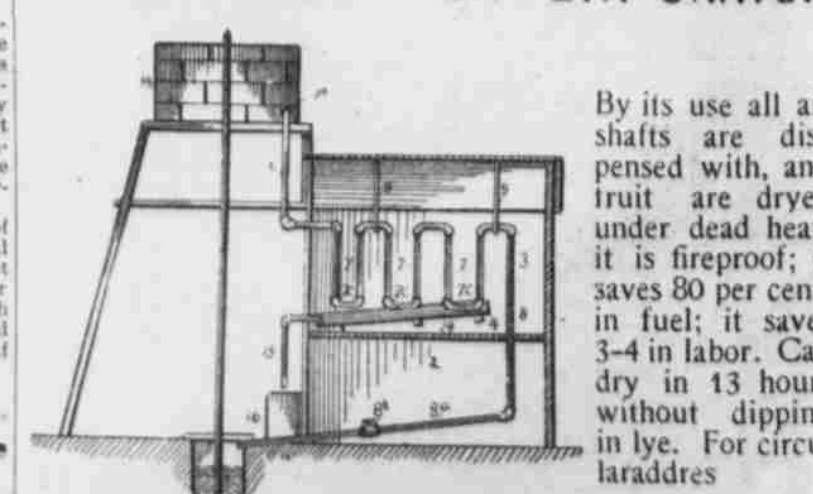
