**MEMORIAL DAY EXERCISES**

Military Organizations to Take Part—Evening Program at the Methodist Church.

Decorations Day will be observed in this city by a parade and appropriate exercises at the cemetery and a special service at the First M. E. church in the evening.

**EX-GOVERNOR LORD.**

Writes From Argentina—Gets "The Journal" 35 Days After Publication.

Ex-Governor Lord, now minister to Argentina, writes to a friend in this city under date of April 16, after being in Buenos Ayres something over two months. He says that he finds that city a pleasant place to live. The climate is unsurpassed for clear skies and salubrious atmosphere. The city is large, handsome and a very busy place, being the center for the shipment of all goods to and from Argentina. The governor's family enjoy the place, there being so much that is novel and interesting.

The JOURNAL reaches there about 35 days after publication. Referring to the late illness of Mayor Bishop, noted in The JOURNAL, Governor Lord had just received the news, and expresses great gratification at the prospects of his early recovery.

There are 11 daily newspapers in Buenos Ayres: 2 English, 1 French, 1 German, 2 Italian and 5 Spanish; and several weeklies devoted to specialties, such as agriculture, commerce, medicine, etc.

The governor mentions the new post-office, in the negotiations for the site of which his legal services were so efficiently rendered, and hopes that the building has been started and will be an ornament to the city; neither hope being destined for fulfillment.

Judging from the tone of his letter, the genial ex-governor is very well satisfied with his surroundings, and is enjoying the experience.

**TRAINMEN'S EXCURSION.**

Salem Will Be Visited by Thousands of People On Next Sunday.

Now that the conductors' excursion is over, interest centers in the excursion to this city of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, on next Sunday, June 3. It will be run on the same lines as the excursions heretofore so successfully engineered by the railroad boys. The fare will be \$1 for the round trip from all points, and the number of people coming will be only limited by the number of cars procurable.

At the fair grounds a grand amusement program will be carried out, consisting of bicycle races, trick riding, cake walks, a baseball game between the Torpedoes and the All Portlanders, etc. Prizes aggregating several hundred dollars will be distributed among the successful contestants. Four of the best bands in the state will be in attendance, and a grand time is assured for all who attend.

Salem is the popular objective point for excursions of this kind, as the city has well proved its ability to handle, entertain and feed all the people that the railroads can bring here in one day. And they are not fed on dishwasher soap, nor hash, either.

One half mile dash, professional—First prize, \$10 cash; second prize, \$5 cash.
