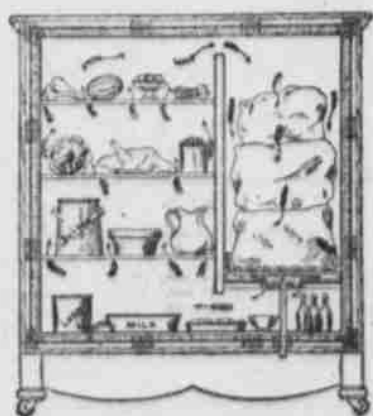

IS PREST. KRUGER DEAD OR ALIVE

Reports From Kroonstadt Show Him to Be Very Sick

ROBERTS WITHIN THIRTY MILES OF THE TRANSVAAL CAPITAL

Army to Be Recuperated When Pretoria is Reached -- Colonial Rebels Surprise British at Douglas

LONDON, June 1.—With Johannesburg added to the list of British towns, the nation eagerly awaits a similar transformation at Pretoria. Measures of resistance which Roberts will encounter during the thirty miles which separate the gold reef city from the former seat of government is a matter of conjecture. Once there, recuperation of forces will probably occur, while flying columns will be sent in various directions to stamp out the opposition, establish garisons and occupy important railroad points. The only development reported from the seat of war, is the statement from Cape Town, that the colonial rebels recently surprised a small body of British, at Douglas, killing sixteen, including Colonel Spence.

IS PREST. KRUGER DEAD OR ALIVE?

LONDON, June 1.—A dispatch from Kroonstadt dated May 29, reports President Kruger very ill, and that the station master at Kroonstadt says the president is dead. This is not credited.

HAWAIIAN ISLAND CONSULATE CLOSES

SAN FRANCISCO, June 1.—Advices from Honolulu state that on June 14 the United States consulate in Honolulu will be closed for all time. The Democrats in the Hawaiian Island will hold a convention on June 11 to select delegates to the national convention at Kansas City.

ENGLISH SCHEME TO ENTER CHINA

"Boxers" Trouble Said to be a Diplomatic Stroke to Effect Lodgment in Peking.

SHANGHAI, June 1.—A detachment of over 400 international blue jackets has arrived at Peking.

WASHINGTON, June 1.—Nothing has been heard from Admiral Kempff since he announced the landing of the marines at Tien-Tsin. It is hinted in diplomatic circles that a sudden increase of activity on the part of the "Boxers" is part of a plan by England or other European powers to secure lodgment in Peking.

It is further intimated that the plan proved abortive, owing to the alertness of other European powers represented in Chinese waters.

FOR STARVING INDIA

SENATOR PERKINS WANTS AN APPROPRIATION MADE.

Hale Responds by Asking Why England Don't Spend Her Money There Instead of On the Boers.

WASHINGTON, June 1.—In the senate, Perkins presented a petition from various organizations and individuals in California asking congress to make an appropriation for the relief of the starving people of India. In 1897 Perkins said he had procured ships to carry to India provisions given by the citizens of California, Oregon, Washington, Nebraska, Kansas and Iowa.

The provisions aggregated 4,000 tons. No official acknowledgment has ever been received of the donation. Perkins' resolution brought from Hale a bitter attack on Great Britain. He demanded to know what England had been doing for the starving millions in India, while pouring out an unlimited treasure to crush two republics in Africa.

The conferees on the naval appropriation bill reported a disagreement on the subject of armor plate. Teller in the course of his remarks on the armor plate subject said the Republicans were getting ready for campaign contributions, and would no doubt conduct a campaign on the same lines as in 1896.

Then all producing concerns were assessed, especially the national banks. Hanna denied the assertion. The senate voted to insist upon the senate armor plate provision, and the naval bill was sent back to the conferees.

MURDER IN PORTLAND.

NAOMI MORSE IS SHOT ON WILLAMETTE HEIGHTS.

Her Husband Probably Committed the Deed and is Supposed to Have Killed Himself.

PORTLAND, June 1.—The body of Naomi Morse was found this morning near Willamette Heights park, with a bullet hole just over the heart. The woman was formerly Naomi Clute of this city, and was married seven months ago to Riley L. Morse, of Tacoma. They went to Tacoma to live. The woman's father, in this city, learning that Morse was not supporting his daughter, brought her back to Portland.

Three days ago Morse appeared here. Yesterday Morse and his wife were together all day, and in the evening they boarded the street car and went to Willamette Heights. They entered the park and a few minutes later the street car conductor heard cries "Murder, help," and two shots were fired. A search was instituted, but the body was not found until this morning. Morse has disappeared.

Thirty minutes after the shooting a third shot was heard in the direction of the Willamette river, and many suppose that Morse killed himself, but his body has not been found.

TROUBLE BREWING IN SAMOAN ISLANDS

The Mataafa faction claim they have not given up the right to govern the island, under a guarantee given by the Berlin treaty. Affairs on the island of Tutuila are running smoothly under American control.

MARION CO. CANVASS

REPUBLICAN DELEGATION RENEW THEIR WAR ON THE NORMAL SCHOOLS.

Trying to Bake Down the Populist Plums in Their Mad Search for Votes.

AT BUTTEVILLE.
Lot L. Pearce recited the pledges made and agreed upon by the five Republican legislative candidates.

First—Opening registration books before November election each four years, and to change June election to November.

Second—State board of equalization to equalize between counties, to be elected.

Third—Opposed to appropriations for normal schools.

Scott followed and regretted so few were out, as he had not met many people in this part of the county. His age was underrated because he had cut off his mustache and it made him look ten years younger than he really was. He hoped to make a record that would remove all doubts as to his being old enough to fill the position.

The tax levy was higher than last year, but this was to pay off the debt. The county had long been in debt and a few mills had been added to pay off the debt.

It was important to have an attorney for county judge. Some one should be in there who knew something about law. Mr. Elder had said at Silverton that he knew nothing about law.

W. W. Hall said he was known to all the people of Butteville and asked to be returned upon his record. The county in two years would be out of debt before another election, on an eight mill levy. Then the county could be run on a six mill levy. It was now 10:40.

Murphy read the Dinamor affidavit, which is as follows:

That as window dresser he made a display of curios furnished by Murphy; that the placards were made by another party and without the knowledge or consent of Murphy. As soon as Jos. Meyers & Sons found that objection had been raised they removed the obnoxious placards and articles. Murphy denied here more emphatically than ever before that he had any articles in his possession or had ever taken any from any Catholic church.

Chas. Lembeck, for assessor, made his maiden speech in his home precinct and was cordially greeted. He promised to treat all fairly if elected.

Henry Keene spoke for the farmers on both legislative tickets.

A. B. Hudelson said if he went to the legislature he would never vote to pay a clerk more than he got per day himself.

Geo. W. Weeks spoke of the reform work of the Grange, as the meeting was held in a grange hall.

J. B. Dimick gave one of his rousing appeals to the taxpayers.

All the Citizens' candidates were presented in due form and made a favorable impression.

F. W. Durbin was given an ovation, as were several of the opposition speakers. The Salem trio that was attacking him would not be doing so if he had not made them pay three years' taxes in one year.

J. A. Jeffrey closed the debate for the opposition, with a pleasant reference to his opponent for the office of district attorney, the county superintendent of schools of Polk county, Mr. Hart, and also to the Republican candidate for county superintendent of schools in Marion county, against whom the Democratic-Citizens' ticket had no candidate. If Moore was elected there would be more county superintendents in office than ever before.

Dr. Smith said if the opposition had no bones or machine, they could only refer to the record of individuals. He then proceeded to say that all public work must be let by contract. The Republicans did not have to promise to go in and organize the legislature. He talked against all the various normal schools as usual.

AT HUBBARD.
J. L. Calvert was made chairman. E. Hofer opened the debate. A. R. Hudelson said if sent to the legislature he would seek to reduce railroad fares and freight. Geo. Weeks said that he felt it was a wrong principle to come before the people and seek an office. It was a
